## Beg as a Verb

### Definitions of "Beg" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “beg” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Ask for food or money as charity.*
- *Ask to obtain free.*
- *Make a solicitation or entreaty for something; request urgently or persistently.*
- *Ask for (something) earnestly or humbly.*
- *(of a dog) sit up with the front paws raised expectantly in the hope of a reward.*
- *Ask formally for (permission to do something).*
- *Call upon in supplication; entreat.*
- *Ask someone earnestly or humbly for something.*
- *Dodge, avoid answering, or take for granted.*
- *Acquire (food or money) from someone by begging.*

<b>adjure</b>	Urge or request (someone) solemnly or earnestly to do something. <i>I <b>adjure</b> you to tell me the truth.</i>
<b>appeal for</b>	Request earnestly (something from somebody); ask for aid or protection.
<b>appeal to</b>	Request earnestly (something from somebody); ask for aid or protection.
<b>ask for</b>	Require or ask for as a price or condition.
<b>ask for money</b>	Inquire about.
<b>ask for the loan of</b>	Direct or put; seek an answer to.
<b><u>beseech</u></b>	Ask (someone) urgently and fervently to do something; implore; entreat. <i>You have got to believe me Violet <b>beseech</b>ed him.</i>
<b>call for</b>	Stop or postpone because of adverse conditions, such as bad weather.

<b><u>entreat</u></b>	Ask someone earnestly or anxiously to do something. <i>A message had been sent <b>entreating</b> aid for the Navahos.</i>
<b>have temporarily</b>	Undergo.
<b>implore</b>	Beg earnestly for. <i>He <b>implored</b> her to change her mind.</i>
<b>look for</b>	Look forward to the probable occurrence of.
<b>plead for</b>	Offer as an excuse or plea.
<b>plead with</b>	Appeal or request earnestly.
<b><u>pray</u></b>	Address a prayer to God or another deity. <i>I <b>prayed</b> that James wouldn't notice.</i>
<b>pray to</b>	Address a deity, a prophet, a saint or an object of worship; say a prayer.
<b>press for</b>	Squeeze or press together.
<b>receive as a loan</b>	Receive a specified treatment (abstract).
<b>request</b>	Express the need or desire for. <i>The chairman <b>requested</b> that the reports be considered.</i>
<b>seek</b>	Go to or towards. <i>A liquid <b>seeks</b> its own level.</i>
<b>seek alms</b>	Go to or towards.
<b>seek charity</b>	Try to get or reach.
<b><u>solicit</u></b>	Make a solicitation or petition for something desired. <i>My neighbor keeps <b>soliciting</b> money for different charities.</i>
<b>solicit money</b>	Incite, move, or persuade to some act of lawlessness or insubordination.
<b>sue for</b>	Institute legal proceedings against; file a suit against.
<b>take as a loan</b>	Interpret something in a certain way; convey a particular meaning or impression.
<b>tap</b>	Walk with a tapping sound. <i><b>Tap</b> a cask of wine.</i>
<b>use temporarily</b>	Use up, consume fully.

<b>appeal</b>	(law) a legal proceeding in which the appellant resorts to a higher court for the purpose of obtaining a review of a lower court decision and a reversal of the lower court's judgment or the granting of a new trial. <i>An <b>appeal</b> to the public to keep calm.</i>
<b>asking</b>	The verbal act of requesting.
<b><u>beseech</u></b>	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>They earnestly <b>beseached</b> his forgiveness.</i>
<b>cadge</b>	Obtain or seek to obtain by cadging or wheedling. <i>He <b>cadged</b> fivers off old school friends.</i>
<b><u>conjure</u></b>	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together. <i>She <b>conjured</b> him to return.</i>



<b><u>crave</u></b>	Plead or ask for earnestly. <i>Will <b>craved</b> for family life.</i>
<b><u>desperately</u></b>	In a way that shows despair. <i>He looked around <b>desperately</b>.</i>
<b><u>entreat</u></b>	Ask someone earnestly or anxiously to do something. <i>A message had been sent <b>entreating</b> aid for the Navahos.</i>
<b>entreaty</b>	Earnest or urgent request. <i>An <b>entreaty</b> to stop the fighting.</i>
<b>exhortation</b>	A communication intended to urge or persuade the recipients to take some action. <i><b>Exhortations</b> to consumers to switch off electrical appliances.</i>
<b>implore</b>	Call upon in supplication; entreat. <i>I <b>implore</b> mercy.</i>
<b><u>invitation</u></b>	A tempting allurements. <i>She threw the <b>invitation</b> away.</i>
<b>mendicant</b>	A member of a mendicant order. <i>A <b>mendicant</b> friar.</i>
<b>necessary</b>	The action or item needed. <i>It s not <b>necessary</b> for you to be here.</i>
<b>need</b>	Have need of. <i>The basic human <b>need</b> for food.</i>
<b>perforce</b>	Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs <b>perforce</b> have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
<b><u>petition</u></b>	Reverent petition to a deity. <i>The Act allowed couples to <b>petition</b> for divorce after one year of marriage.</i>
<b><u>plea</u></b>	A request made in an urgent and emotional manner. <i>He changed his <b>plea</b> to not guilty.</i>
<b><u>plead</u></b>	Make an allegation in an action or other legal proceeding especially answer the previous pleading of the other party by denying facts therein stated or by alleging new facts. <i>She <b>pleaded</b> with them not to gag the boy.</i>
<b><u>please</u></b>	Cause to feel happy and satisfied. <i>Oh <b>please</b> is that meant to be a serious argument.</i>
<b><u>pray</u></b>	Address a prayer to God or another deity. <i>Ladies and gentlemen <b>pray</b> be seated.</i>

<b>propitiate</b>	Win or regain the favour of (a god, spirit, or person) by doing something that pleases them. <i>The pagans thought it was important to <b>propitiate</b> the gods with sacrifices.</i>
<b>request</b>	A tune or song played on a radio programme typically accompanied by a personal message in response to a listener's request. <i>The computer is busy servicing <b>requests</b> from other processes.</i>
<b>solicit</b>	Make a solicitation or entreaty for something request urgently or persistently. <i>Historians and critics are <b>solicited</b> for opinions by the auction houses.</i>
<b>solicitation</b>	Request for a sum of money. <i>A woman arrested for <b>solicitation</b>.</i>
<b>suppliant</b>	Making or expressing a plea, especially to someone in power or authority. <i>A <b>suppliant</b> sinner seeking forgiveness.</i>
<b>supplicant</b>	Someone who prays to God. <i>A <b>supplicant</b> serf before an ill tempered monarch.</i>
<b>supplicate</b>	Make a humble, earnest petition. <i>He <b>supplicated</b> the King for clemency.</i>
<b>want</b>	Hunt or look for want for a particular reason. <i><b>Want</b> the strength to go on living.</i>
<b>woo</b>	Make amorous advances towards. <i>Pop stars are being <b>wooed</b> by film companies eager to sign them up.</i>
