Definitions of "Beg" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “beg” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Ask for food or money as charity.*
- *Ask to obtain free.*
- *Make a solicitation or entreaty for something; request urgently or persistently.*
- *Ask for (something) earnestly or humbly.*
- *(of a dog) sit up with the front paws raised expectantly in the hope of a reward.*
- *Ask formally for (permission to do something).*
- *Call upon in supplication; entreat.*
- *Ask someone earnestly or humbly for something.*
- *Dodge, avoid answering, or take for granted.*
- *Acquire (food or money) from someone by begging.*

appeal for	Request earnestly (something from somebody); ask for aid or protection.

ask for money	Inquire about.
ask for the loan of	Direct or put; seek an answer to.
<u>beseech</u>	Ask (someone) urgently and fervently to do something; implore; entreat. <i>You have got to believe me Violet beseeched him.</i>
call for	Stop or postpone because of adverse conditions, such as bad weather.

<u>entreat</u>	Ask someone earnestly or anxiously to do something. <i>A message had been sent entreating aid for the Navahos.</i>
have temporarily	Undergo.
implore	Beg earnestly for. <i>He implored her to change her mind.</i>
look for	Look forward to the probable occurrence of.
plead for	Offer as an excuse or plea.
plead with	Appeal or request earnestly.
<u>pray</u>	Address a prayer to God or another deity. <i>I prayed that James wouldn't notice.</i>
pray to	Address a deity, a prophet, a saint or an object of worship; say a prayer.
press for	Squeeze or press together.
receive as a loan	Receive a specified treatment (abstract).
request	Express the need or desire for. <i>The chairman requested that the reports be considered.</i>
seek	Go to or towards. <i>A liquid seeks its own level.</i>
seek alms	Go to or towards.
seek charity	Try to get or reach.
<u>solicit</u>	Make a solicitation or petition for something desired. <i>My neighbor keeps soliciting money for different charities.</i>
solicit money	Incite, move, or persuade to some act of lawlessness or insubordination.
sue for	Institute legal proceedings against; file a suit against.
take as a loan	Interpret something in a certain way; convey a particular meaning or impression.
tap	Walk with a tapping sound. <i>Tap a cask of wine.</i>
use temporarily	Use up, consume fully.

appeal	(law) a legal proceeding in which the appellant resorts to a higher court for the purpose of obtaining a review of a lower court decision and a reversal of the lower court's judgment or the granting of a new trial. <i>An appeal to the public to keep calm.</i>
asking	The verbal act of requesting.
<u>beseech</u>	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>They earnestly beseached his forgiveness.</i>
cadge	Obtain or seek to obtain by cadging or wheedling. <i>He cadged fivers off old school friends.</i>
<u>conjure</u>	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together. <i>She conjured him to return.</i>

<u>crave</u>	Plead or ask for earnestly. <i>Will craved for family life.</i>
<u>desperately</u>	In a way that shows despair. <i>He looked around desperately.</i>
<u>entreat</u>	Ask someone earnestly or anxiously to do something. <i>A message had been sent entreating aid for the Navahos.</i>
entreaty	Earnest or urgent request. <i>An entreaty to stop the fighting.</i>
exhortation	A communication intended to urge or persuade the recipients to take some action. <i>Exhortations to consumers to switch off electrical appliances.</i>
implore	Call upon in supplication; entreat. <i>I implore mercy.</i>
<u>invitation</u>	A tempting allurements. <i>She threw the invitation away.</i>
mendicant	A member of a mendicant order. <i>A mendicant friar.</i>
necessary	The action or item needed. <i>It s not necessary for you to be here.</i>
need	Have need of. <i>The basic human need for food.</i>
perforce	Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
<u>petition</u>	Reverent petition to a deity. <i>The Act allowed couples to petition for divorce after one year of marriage.</i>
<u>plea</u>	A request made in an urgent and emotional manner. <i>He changed his plea to not guilty.</i>
<u>plead</u>	Make an allegation in an action or other legal proceeding especially answer the previous pleading of the other party by denying facts therein stated or by alleging new facts. <i>She pleaded with them not to gag the boy.</i>
<u>please</u>	Cause to feel happy and satisfied. <i>Oh please is that meant to be a serious argument.</i>
<u>pray</u>	Address a prayer to God or another deity. <i>Ladies and gentlemen pray be seated.</i>

propitiate	Win or regain the favour of (a god, spirit, or person) by doing something that pleases them. <i>The pagans thought it was important to propitiate the gods with sacrifices.</i>
request	A tune or song played on a radio programme typically accompanied by a personal message in response to a listener's request. <i>The computer is busy servicing requests from other processes.</i>
solicit	Make a solicitation or entreaty for something request urgently or persistently. <i>Historians and critics are solicited for opinions by the auction houses.</i>
solicitation	Request for a sum of money. <i>A woman arrested for solicitation.</i>
suppliant	Making or expressing a plea, especially to someone in power or authority. <i>A suppliant sinner seeking forgiveness.</i>
suppliant	Someone who prays to God. <i>A suppliant serf before an ill tempered monarch.</i>
supplicate	Make a humble, earnest petition. <i>He supplicated the King for clemency.</i>
want	Hunt or look for want for a particular reason. <i>Want the strength to go on living.</i>
woo	Make amorous advances towards. <i>Pop stars are being wooed by film companies eager to sign them up.</i>
