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Associations of "Begged" (30 Words)

appeal	Request earnestly (something from somebody); ask for aid or protection. <i>I appealed to his sense of justice.</i>
asking	The verbal act of requesting.
beseech	Ask (someone) urgently and fervently to do something; implore; entreat. <i>You have got to believe me Violet beseached him.</i>
cadge	Obtain or seek to obtain by cadging or wheedling. <i>He cadged fivers off old school friends.</i>
conjure	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>They hoped to conjure up the spirit of their dead friend.</i>
crave	Have a craving, appetite, or great desire for. <i>Will craved for family life.</i>
desperately	Used to emphasize the extreme degree of something. <i>The soil desperately needed potash.</i>
entreat	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>His friends entreated him not to go.</i>
entreaty	Earnest or urgent request. <i>An entreaty to stop the fighting.</i>
exhortation	An address or communication emphatically urging someone to do something. <i>Exhortations to consumers to switch off electrical appliances.</i>
implore	Beg someone earnestly or desperately to do something. <i>I implore mercy.</i>
invitation	A situation or action that tempts someone to do something or makes a particular outcome likely. <i>A club with membership by invitation only.</i>
mendicant	A member of a mendicant order. <i>Mendicant friars.</i>

necessary	Determined, existing, or happening by natural laws or predestination; inevitable. <i>See when they need a tactful word of advice and do the necessary.</i>
need	Have or feel a need for. <i>They need to win tomorrow.</i>
perforce	Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
<u>petition</u>	Write a petition for something to somebody request formally and in writing. <i>The organization is petitioning the EU for a moratorium on the patent.</i>
<u>plea</u>	A formal statement by or on behalf of a defendant or prisoner, stating guilt or innocence in response to a charge, offering an allegation of fact, or claiming that a point of law should apply. <i>Her plea of a headache was not entirely false.</i>
<u>plead</u>	Make an allegation in an action or other legal proceeding especially answer the previous pleading of the other party by denying facts therein stated or by alleging new facts. <i>She pleaded not guilty.</i>
<u>please</u>	Give satisfaction. <i>Would you like a drink Yes please.</i>
<u>pray</u>	Address a prayer to God or another deity. <i>Ladies and gentlemen pray be seated.</i>
propitiate	Win or regain the favour of (a god, spirit, or person) by doing something that pleases them. <i>The pagans thought it was important to propitiate the gods with sacrifices.</i>
request	A tune or song played on a radio programme typically accompanied by a personal message in response to a listener's request. <i>The computer is busy servicing requests from other processes.</i>
<u>solicit</u>	Make a solicitation or entreaty for something request urgently or persistently. <i>Historians and critics are solicited for opinions by the auction houses.</i>
<u>solicitation</u>	The act of asking for or trying to obtain something from someone. <i>He was a regular target for solicitation of funds.</i>
suppliant	Making or expressing a plea, especially to someone in power or authority. <i>A suppliant sinner seeking forgiveness.</i>
suppliant	One praying humbly for something. <i>Suplicants prostrate themselves on the floor.</i>
supplicate	Ask or beg for something earnestly or humbly. <i>He supplicated the King for clemency.</i>

Hunt or look for want for a particular reason.
*He is **wanted** by the police in connection with an arms theft.*

woo

Try to gain the love of (someone), especially with a view to marriage.
*He **wooed** her with quotes from Shakespeare.*
