<b>dissimulation</b>	Concealment of one's thoughts, feelings, or character; pretence. <i>His audience consisted of a <b>dissimulation</b> of birds.</i>
<b><u>duplicity</u></b>	A fraudulent or duplicitous representation. <i>The president was accused of <b>duplicity</b> in his dealings with Congress.</i>
<b><u>enchant</u></b>	Hold spellbound. <i>Isabel was <b>enchanted</b> with the idea.</i>
<b><u>enthrall</u></b>	Hold spellbound.
<b><u>fascinate</u></b>	Attract the strong attention and interest of (someone). <i>I ve always been <b>fascinated</b> by computers.</i>
<b>feint</b>	A mock attack or movement in warfare, made in order to distract or deceive an enemy. <i>A brief <b>feint</b> at the opponent s face.</i>
<b>fraud</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>Prosecutions for social security <b>frauds</b>.</i>
<b>fraudulence</b>	Something intended to deceive; deliberate trickery intended to gain an advantage.
<b>fraudulent</b>	Intended to deceive. <i><b>Fraudulent</b> psychics.</i>

<b>guile</b>	Sly or cunning intelligence. <i>He used all his <b>guile</b> and guts to free himself from the muddle he was in.</i>
<b>hoodwink</b>	Influence by slyness. <i>Staff were <b>hoodwinked</b> into thinking the cucumber was a sawn off shotgun.</i>
<b>humbug</b>	Deceive; trick. <i>Poor Dave is easily <b>humbugged</b>.</i>
<b>inducement</b>	Act of bringing about a desired result. <i>Companies were prepared to build only in return for massive <b>inducements</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>lure</u></a>	Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>The <b>lure</b> of the exotic East.</i>
<b>scam</b>	A dishonest scheme; a fraud. <i>An insurance <b>scam</b>.</i>
<b>skulduggery</b>	Underhand, unscrupulous, or dishonest behaviour or activities. <i>A firm that investigates commercial <b>skulduggery</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>sly</u></a>	Showing in an insinuating way that one has some secret knowledge that may be harmful or embarrassing. <i><b>Sly</b> as a fox.</i>
