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Associations of "Behalf" (30 Words)

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| advantage | Give an advantage to. <i>He saw some advantage in the proposal.</i> |
| assets | Anything of material value or usefulness that is owned by a person or company. |
| benefit | Derive a benefit from. <i>The social season was highlighted by debutante balls and charity benefits.</i> |
| boon | A thing that is helpful or beneficial. <i>The route will be a boon to many travellers.</i> |
| corporation | A business firm whose articles of incorporation have been approved in some state. <i>Multinational corporations.</i> |
| earnings | Something that remunerates. <i>Export earnings.</i> |
| emolument | Compensation received by virtue of holding an office or having employment (usually in the form of wages or fees). <i>The directors emoluments.</i> |
| expeditious | Marked by speed and efficiency. <i>An expeditious investigation.</i> |
| fund | Provide a fund for the redemption of principal or payment of interest. <i>A concert to raise funds for the church.</i> |
| income | Money received, especially on a regular basis, for work or through investments. <i>He has a nice home and an adequate income.</i> |
| lucre | Informal terms for money. <i>Officials getting their hands grubby with filthy lucre.</i> |
| maximize | Make the best use of. <i>He maximized his role.</i> |

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| pecuniary | Relating to or consisting of money. <i>He admitted obtaining a pecuniary advantage by deception.</i> |
| perquisite | An incidental benefit awarded for certain types of employment (especially if it is regarded as a right). <i>The perquisites of celebrity are intoxicating.</i> |
| <u>prerogative</u> | Arising from the prerogative of the Crown usually delegated to the government or the judiciary and based in common law rather than statutory law. <i>It is not a female prerogative to feel insecure.</i> |
| privilege | Bestow a privilege upon. <i>A breach of parliamentary privilege.</i> |
| privileged | Not subject to usual rules or penalties. <i>I felt I had been privileged to compete in such a race.</i> |
| proceeds | Money obtained from an event or activity. <i>Proceeds from the event will go to aid the work of the charity.</i> |
| profit | Make a profit gain money or materially. <i>The company has not profited from the merger.</i> |
| profitability | The quality of affording gain or benefit or profit. <i>Growing sales and a return to profitability.</i> |
| <u>profitable</u> | (of a business or activity) yielding profit or financial gain. <i>The investments were extremely profitable.</i> |
| profiteer | A person who profiteers. <i>A war profiteer.</i> |
| remuneration | Money paid for work or a service. <i>Adequate remuneration for his work.</i> |
| <u>sake</u> | Japanese alcoholic beverage made from fermented rice; usually served hot. <i>For your sake.</i> |
| <u>salary</u> | Pay a salary to. <i>A 15 per cent salary increase.</i> |
| <u>subsidy</u> | A sum of money granted by the state or a public body to help an industry or business keep the price of a commodity or service low. <i>A subsidy for research in artificial intelligence.</i> |
| tariff | Charge a tariff. <i>These services are tariffed by volume.</i> |
| taxable | (of goods or funds) subject to taxation. <i>Taxable income.</i> |

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| wage | Carry on (a war or campaign). <i>Wages were paid by check.</i> |
| welfare | Financial support given to those who are unemployed or otherwise in need. <i>She lives on welfare.</i> |
