actuality	The state of existing in reality. <i>A hope that progressed from possibility to actuality.</i>
aliveness	The property of being animated; having animal life as distinguished from plant life.
animateness	The property of being animated; having animal life as distinguished from plant life.
animation	The activity of giving vitality and vigour to something. <i>Animations as backdrops for live action.</i>
beingness	The quality or state of existing, especially as distinct from having particular attributes; entity, actuality.
creature	A person or organization considered to be under the complete control of another. <i>Night sounds of birds and other creatures.</i>
entity	That which is perceived or known or inferred to have its own distinct existence (living or nonliving). <i>Entity and nonentity.</i>
essence	The central meaning or theme of a speech or literary work. <i>Conflict is the essence of drama.</i>

existence	(in certain beliefs) any of a person's successive earthly lives. <i>Our stressed out urban existence.</i>
face of the earth	A vertical surface of a building or cliff.
fact	The truth about events as opposed to interpretation. <i>There was a question of fact as to whether they had received the letter.</i>
human	A human being.
human being	Any living or extinct member of the family Hominidae characterized by superior intelligence, articulate speech, and erect carriage.
individual	A person of a specified kind. <i>Boat trips for parties and individuals.</i>
life	An account of the series of events making up a person's life. <i>The ice cream vendors were the only signs of life.</i>
life form	The period from the present until death.
lifeblood	An essential or life-giving force. <i>The movement of coal was the lifeblood of British railways.</i>

<u>living</u>	The condition of living or the state of being alive. <i>He was offered the living of St Katherine s.</i>
living entity	The financial means whereby one lives.
living soul	The financial means whereby one lives.
living thing	The experience of being alive; the course of human events and activities.
man	An adult person who is male as opposed to a woman. <i>Cro Magnon man.</i>
nature	The natural physical world including plants and animals and landscapes etc. <i>Emerson was so much more luminous a nature.</i>
<u>organism</u>	The material structure of an organism. <i>Fish and other organisms have been destroyed over large areas of the creek.</i>
person	A category used in the classification of pronouns possessive determiners and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker first person the addressee second person or a third party third person. <i>She s not a cat person.</i>
personage	A person (used to express importance or elevated status). <i>A strange personage appeared at the door.</i>
<u>psyche</u>	The immaterial part of a person; the actuating cause of an individual life. <i>Their childhood made them want to understand the human psyche and to help others.</i>
reality	Relating to reality TV. <i>We want to make the dream a reality.</i>
soul	The spiritual or immaterial part of a human being or animal, regarded as immortal. <i>Soul was politically significant during the Civil Rights movement.</i>
spirit	Any incorporeal supernatural being that can become visible (or audible) to human beings. <i>Shrines to nature spirits.</i>
substance	A particular kind of matter with uniform properties. <i>The substance of the Maastricht Treaty.</i>
woman	A disrespectful form of address to a woman. <i>He wondered whether Billy had his woman with him.</i>

<u>coexist</u>	Coexist peacefully as of nations. <i>The task of diplomacy was to help different states to coexist.</i>
<u>creature</u>	A living organism characterized by voluntary movement. <i>As fellow creatures on this planet animals deserve respect.</i>
dweller	A person who inhabits a particular place. <i>The majority of urban dwellers live in small apartments.</i>
<u>empirical</u>	Based on, concerned with, or verifiable by observation or experience rather than theory or pure logic. <i>Empirical data.</i>

essence	The intrinsic nature or indispensable quality of something, especially something abstract, which determines its character. <i>Locke's scepticism about our ability to penetrate to the real essences of things.</i>

existence	All that exists. <i>He believed in the essential unity of all existence.</i>
<u>existential</u>	Of or as conceived by existentialism. <i>Formal logicians are not concerned with existential matters.</i>
existing	Presently existing. <i>Much of the beluga caviar existing in the world is found in the Soviet Union and Iran.</i>
<u>extant</u>	Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost. <i>Specimens of graphic art found among extant barbaric folk.</i>
<u>here</u>	In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>I'm getting out of here.</i>
humankind	Human beings considered collectively (used as a neutral alternative to 'mankind'). <i>She always used humankind because mankind seemed to slight the women.</i>
hypostasis	The suppression of a gene by the effect of an unrelated gene.
<u>incarnation</u>	The form taken by a person or thing during an incarnation. <i>Rama was Vishnu's incarnation on earth.</i>
<u>inhabit</u>	Be an inhabitant of or reside in. <i>The region was inhabited by Indians.</i>
life	A sentence of imprisonment for life. <i>The battery had a short life.</i>
<u>lifelong</u>	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>The two men were to remain lifelong friends.</i>
live	Inhabit or live in be an inhabitant of. <i>Burned alive.</i>
<u>living</u>	The condition of living or the state of being alive. <i>She is a living doll.</i>
<u>organism</u>	The material structure of an organism. <i>The heart's contribution to the maintenance of the human organism.</i>

outlast	Live longer than. <i>The kind of beauty that will outlast youth.</i>
outlive	(of a person) live longer than (another person). <i>She outlived her husband by many years.</i>
populate	Be an inhabitant of or reside in. <i>The island is populated by scarcely 40 000 people.</i>
<u>presence</u>	The act of being present. <i>The memorial was unveiled in the presence of 24 veterans.</i>
protoplasm	The colourless material comprising the living part of a cell, including the cytoplasm, nucleus, and other organelles.
<u>subsistence</u>	The state of remaining in force or effect. <i>Subsistence agriculture.</i>
<u>survive</u>	Continue to live or exist in spite of (an accident or ordeal). <i>He has survived several assassination attempts.</i>
