### Definitions of "Being" as a noun

- *The nature or essence of a person.*
- *A real or imaginary living creature or entity, especially an intelligent one.*
- *Existence.*
- *A living thing that has (or can develop) the ability to act or function independently.*
- *Being alive; living.*
- *The state or fact of existing.*



## Synonyms of "Being" as a noun (33 Words)

<b>actuality</b>	The state of existing in reality. <i>A hope that progressed from possibility to <b>actuality</b>.</i>
<b>aliveness</b>	The property of being animated; having animal life as distinguished from plant life.
<b>animateness</b>	The property of being animated; having animal life as distinguished from plant life.
<b>animation</b>	The activity of giving vitality and vigour to something. <i><b>Animations</b> as backdrops for live action.</i>
<b>beingness</b>	The quality or state of existing, especially as distinct from having particular attributes; entity, actuality.
<b>creature</b>	A person or organization considered to be under the complete control of another. <i>Night sounds of birds and other <b>creatures</b>.</i>
<b>entity</b>	That which is perceived or known or inferred to have its own distinct existence (living or nonliving). <i><b>Entity</b> and <b>nonentity</b>.</i>
<b>essence</b>	The central meaning or theme of a speech or literary work. <i>Conflict is the <b>essence</b> of drama.</i>
<b>essential nature</b>	Anything indispensable.
<b>existence</b>	(in certain beliefs) any of a person's successive earthly lives. <i>Our stressed out urban <b>existence</b>.</i>
<b>face of the earth</b>	A vertical surface of a building or cliff.
<b>fact</b>	The truth about events as opposed to interpretation. <i>There was a question of <b>fact</b> as to whether they had received the letter.</i>
<b>human</b>	A human being.
<b>human being</b>	Any living or extinct member of the family Hominidae characterized by superior intelligence, articulate speech, and erect carriage.
<b>individual</b>	A person of a specified kind. <i>Boat trips for parties and <b>individuals</b>.</i>
<b>life</b>	An account of the series of events making up a person's life. <i>The ice cream vendors were the only signs of <b>life</b>.</i>
<b>life form</b>	The period from the present until death.
<b>lifeblood</b>	An essential or life-giving force. <i>The movement of coal was the <b>lifeblood</b> of British railways.</i>

<b>living</b>	The condition of living or the state of being alive. <i>He was offered the <b>living</b> of St Katherine s.</i>
<b>living entity</b>	The financial means whereby one lives.
<b>living soul</b>	The financial means whereby one lives.
<b>living thing</b>	The experience of being alive; the course of human events and activities.
<b>man</b>	An adult person who is male as opposed to a woman. <i>Cro Magnon <b>man</b>.</i>
<b>nature</b>	The natural physical world including plants and animals and landscapes etc. <i>Emerson was so much more luminous a <b>nature</b>.</i>
<b>organism</b>	The material structure of an organism. <i>Fish and other <b>organisms</b> have been destroyed over large areas of the creek.</i>
<b>person</b>	A category used in the classification of pronouns possessive determiners and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker first person the addressee second person or a third party third person. <i>She s not a cat <b>person</b>.</i>
<b>personage</b>	A person (used to express importance or elevated status). <i>A strange <b>personage</b> appeared at the door.</i>
<b>psyche</b>	The immaterial part of a person; the actuating cause of an individual life. <i>Their childhood made them want to understand the human <b>psyche</b> and to help others.</i>
<b>reality</b>	Relating to reality TV. <i>We want to make the dream a <b>reality</b>.</i>
<b>soul</b>	The spiritual or immaterial part of a human being or animal, regarded as immortal. <i><b>Soul</b> was politically significant during the Civil Rights movement.</i>
<b>spirit</b>	Any incorporeal supernatural being that can become visible (or audible) to human beings. <i>Shrines to nature <b>spirits</b>.</i>
<b>substance</b>	A particular kind of matter with uniform properties. <i>The <b>substance</b> of the Maastricht Treaty.</i>
<b>woman</b>	A disrespectful form of address to a woman. <i>He wondered whether Billy had his <b>woman</b> with him.</i>

<b>essence</b>	The intrinsic nature or indispensable quality of something, especially something abstract, which determines its character. <i>Locke's scepticism about our ability to penetrate to the real <b>essences</b> of things.</i>
<b>eternally</b>	For a limitless time. <i>His <b>eternally</b> optimistic attitude.</i>
<b>exist</b>	Have an existence be extant. <i>He could barely <b>exist</b> on such a low wage.</i>
<b>existence</b>	All that exists. <i>He believed in the essential unity of all <b>existence</b>.</i>
<b>existential</b>	Of or as conceived by existentialism. <i>Formal logicians are not concerned with <b>existential</b> matters.</i>
<b>existing</b>	Presently existing. <i>Much of the beluga caviar <b>existing</b> in the world is found in the Soviet Union and Iran.</i>
<b>extant</b>	Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost. <i>Specimens of graphic art found among <b>extant</b> barbaric folk.</i>
<b>here</b>	In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>I'm getting out of <b>here</b>.</i>
<b>humankind</b>	Human beings considered collectively (used as a neutral alternative to 'mankind'). <i>She always used <b>humankind</b> because mankind seemed to slight the women.</i>
<b>hypostasis</b>	The suppression of a gene by the effect of an unrelated gene.
<b>incarnation</b>	The form taken by a person or thing during an incarnation. <i>Rama was Vishnu's <b>incarnation</b> on earth.</i>
<b>inhabit</b>	Be an inhabitant of or reside in. <i>The region was <b>inhabited</b> by Indians.</i>
<b>life</b>	A sentence of imprisonment for life. <i>The battery had a short <b>life</b>.</i>
<b>lifelong</b>	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>The two men were to remain <b>lifelong</b> friends.</i>
<b>live</b>	Inhabit or live in be an inhabitant of. <i>Burned <b>alive</b>.</i>
<b>living</b>	The condition of living or the state of being alive. <i>She is a <b>living</b> doll.</i>
<b>organism</b>	The material structure of an organism. <i>The heart's contribution to the maintenance of the human <b>organism</b>.</i>

*The kind of beauty that will **outlast** youth.*
- outlive** (of a person) live longer than (another person).  
*She **outlived** her husband by many years.*
- populate** Be an inhabitant of or reside in.  
*The island is **populated** by scarcely 40 000 people.*
- presence** The act of being present.  
*The memorial was unveiled in the **presence** of 24 veterans.*
- protoplasm** The colourless material comprising the living part of a cell, including the cytoplasm, nucleus, and other organelles.
- subsistence** The state of remaining in force or effect.  
***Subsistence** agriculture.*
- survive** Continue to live or exist in spite of (an accident or ordeal).  
*He has **survived** several assassination attempts.*
