**nullify** Judges were unwilling to **nullify** government decisions.

opposed (of two or more things) contrasting or conflicting with each other.

Parties **opposed** to the ruling party.

**prejudicial** Causing harm or injury.

The proposals were considered **prejudicial** to the city centre.

**rebuttal** An instance of rebutting evidence or an accusation.

rescind Cancel officially.

The government eventually **rescind**ed the directive.

**skeptic** Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs.

**skepticism** Doubt about the truth of something.

**undesirable** One whose presence is undesirable.

Rounding up vagrants and drunks and other **undesirable**s.

Treat unjustly do wrong to.

The doctor may regard the patient s decision as **wrong**.
