Definitions of "Believable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “believable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a fictional character or situation) convincing or realistic.*
- *Capable of being believed.*
- *Able to be believed; credible.*



Synonyms of "Believable" as an adjective (15 Words)

- able to hold water** Have the skills and qualifications to do things well.
- acceptable** Judged to be in conformity with approved usage.
Acceptable English usage.
- convincing** (of a victory or a winner) leaving no margin of doubt; clear.
*A **convincing** story.*
- credible** Credulous.
*A **credible** threat.*
- creditable** (of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful.
*A very **creditable** 2 4 defeat.*
- feasible** Likely; probable.
*It is not **feasible** to put most finds from excavations on public display.*

likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>She is likely to forget.</i>
logical	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>The information is displayed in a simple and logical fashion.</i>
plausible	(of an argument or statement) seeming reasonable or probable. <i>A plausible explanation.</i>
possible	That may exist or happen, but that is not certain or probable. <i>Surely it is not possible for a man to live so long.</i>
probable	Apparently destined. <i>The probable consequences of going ahead with the scheme.</i>
rational	(of a number, quantity, or expression) expressible, or containing quantities which are expressible, as a ratio of whole numbers. <i>I'm sure there is a perfectly rational explanation.</i>
reasonable	(of a price or product) not too expensive. <i>A restaurant serving excellent food at reasonable prices.</i>
sound	Financially secure and safe. <i>No sound explanation for his decision.</i>
tenable	(of an office, position, scholarship, etc.) able to be held or used. <i>Such a simplistic approach is no longer tenable.</i>



Usage Examples of "Believable" as an adjective

- *She felt that Dawn's story was not quite believable.*
- *A drama that lacks believable characters.*

accuracy	The quality or state of being correct or precise. <i>We have confidence in the accuracy of the statistics.</i>
arguable	Open to disagreement; not obviously correct. <i>A highly arguable assumption.</i>
assurance	Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities. <i>An assurance of help when needed.</i>
assured	Confident. <i>A tiny but assured income.</i>
confiding	Willing to tell someone about a secret or private matter and trust them not to repeat it to others. <i>First she was suspicious then she became confiding.</i>
convincing	(of a victory or a winner) leaving no margin of doubt; clear. <i>There is no convincing evidence that advertising influences total alcohol consumption.</i>
credible	Appearing to merit belief or acceptance. <i>A credible witness.</i>
credulous	Showing a lack of judgment or experience. <i>The gimmick would convince none but the most credulous.</i>
dependable	Trustworthy and reliable. <i>A dependable worker.</i>

<u>dependence</u>	Addiction to drink or drugs. <i>Japan s dependence on imported oil.</i>
<u>faith</u>	Strong belief in the doctrines of a religion, based on spiritual conviction rather than proof. <i>This restores one s faith in politicians.</i>
<u>faithful</u>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>Employees who had notched up decades of faithful service.</i>
<u>gullible</u>	Naive and easily deceived or tricked. <i>At that early age she had been gullible and in love.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>A likely looking spot.</i>
persuasion	A group or sect holding a particular religious belief. <i>Writers of all political persuasions.</i>
plausible	Apparently reasonable and valid, and truthful. <i>A plausible excuse.</i>
<u>possible</u>	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>They were living right at the edge of the possible.</i>
presumable	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
presumptive	Having a reasonable basis for belief or acceptance. <i>A presumptive diagnosis.</i>
<u>probable</u>	A person who is likely to become or do something, especially one who is likely to be chosen for a team. <i>The probable consequences of going ahead with the scheme.</i>
<u>proven</u>	Established beyond doubt. <i>A proven liar.</i>
reliability	The degree to which the result of a measurement, calculation, or specification can be depended on to be accurate. <i>The car s background gives me every confidence in its reliability.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. <i>Reliable information.</i>
scientifically	By means of scientific methods and principles. <i>Scientifically minded people.</i>
trust	An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. <i>I used only primary sources taking nothing on trust.</i>
<u>trusted</u>	Regarded as reliable or truthful. <i>A trusted adviser.</i>

- trustful** Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust.
*Great brown eye true and **trustful**.*
- trusting** Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust- Nordhoff & Hall.
*It is foolish to be too **trusting** of other people.*
- trustworthy** Taking responsibility for one's conduct and obligations.
*Leave a spare key with a **trustworthy** neighbour.*
- truthfulness** The quality of being truthful.
*We have had to judge the **truthfulness** of the evidence.*
