### **Definitions of "Believable" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “believable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a fictional character or situation) convincing or realistic.*
- *Capable of being believed.*
- *Able to be believed; credible.*



## Synonyms of "Believable" as an adjective (15 Words)

- able to hold water** Have the skills and qualifications to do things well.
- acceptable** Judged to be in conformity with approved usage.  
*Acceptable* English usage.
- convincing** (of a victory or a winner) leaving no margin of doubt; clear.  
*A convincing story.*
- credible** Credulous.  
*A credible threat.*
- creditable** (of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful.  
*A very creditable 2 4 defeat.*
- feasible** Likely; probable.  
*It is not feasible to put most finds from excavations on public display.*

<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>She is <b>likely</b> to forget.</i>
<b>logical</b>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>The information is displayed in a simple and <b>logical</b> fashion.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	(of an argument or statement) seeming reasonable or probable. <i>A <b>plausible</b> explanation.</i>
<b>possible</b>	That may exist or happen, but that is not certain or probable. <i>Surely it is not <b>possible</b> for a man to live so long.</i>
<b>probable</b>	Apparently destined. <i>The <b>probable</b> consequences of going ahead with the scheme.</i>
<b>rational</b>	(of a number, quantity, or expression) expressible, or containing quantities which are expressible, as a ratio of whole numbers. <i>I'm sure there is a perfectly <b>rational</b> explanation.</i>
<b>reasonable</b>	(of a price or product) not too expensive. <i>A restaurant serving excellent food at <b>reasonable</b> prices.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Financially secure and safe. <i>No <b>sound</b> explanation for his decision.</i>
<b>tenable</b>	(of an office, position, scholarship, etc.) able to be held or used. <i>Such a simplistic approach is no longer <b>tenable</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Believable" as an adjective

- *She felt that Dawn's story was not quite believable.*
- *A drama that lacks believable characters.*





## Associations of "Believable" (30 Words)

<b>accuracy</b>	The quality or state of being correct or precise. <i>We have confidence in the <b>accuracy</b> of the statistics.</i>
<b>arguable</b>	Open to disagreement; not obviously correct. <i>A highly <b>arguable</b> assumption.</i>
<b>assurance</b>	Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities. <i>An <b>assurance</b> of help when needed.</i>
<b>assured</b>	Confident. <i>A tiny but <b>assured</b> income.</i>
<b>confiding</b>	Willing to tell someone about a secret or private matter and trust them not to repeat it to others. <i>First she was suspicious then she became <b>confiding</b>.</i>
<b><u>convincing</u></b>	(of a victory or a winner) leaving no margin of doubt; clear. <i>There is no <b>convincing</b> evidence that advertising influences total alcohol consumption.</i>
<b><u>credible</u></b>	Appearing to merit belief or acceptance. <i>A <b>credible</b> witness.</i>
<b>credulous</b>	Showing a lack of judgment or experience. <i>The gimmick would convince none but the most <b>credulous</b>.</i>
<b>dependable</b>	Trustworthy and reliable. <i>A <b>dependable</b> worker.</i>

<b><u>dependence</u></b>	Addiction to drink or drugs. <i>Japan s <b>dependence</b> on imported oil.</i>
<b><u>faith</u></b>	Strong belief in the doctrines of a religion, based on spiritual conviction rather than proof. <i>This restores one s <b>faith</b> in politicians.</i>
<b><u>faithful</u></b>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>Employees who had notched up decades of <b>faithful</b> service.</i>
<b><u>gullible</u></b>	Naive and easily deceived or tricked. <i>At that early age she had been <b>gullible</b> and in love.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>A <b>likely</b> looking spot.</i>
<b>persuasion</b>	A group or sect holding a particular religious belief. <i>Writers of all political <b>persuasions</b>.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	Apparently reasonable and valid, and truthful. <i>A <b>plausible</b> excuse.</i>
<b><u>possible</u></b>	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>They were living right at the edge of the <b>possible</b>.</i>
<b>presumable</b>	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
<b>presumptive</b>	Having a reasonable basis for belief or acceptance. <i>A <b>presumptive</b> diagnosis.</i>
<b><u>probable</u></b>	A person who is likely to become or do something, especially one who is likely to be chosen for a team. <i>The <b>probable</b> consequences of going ahead with the scheme.</i>
<b><u>proven</u></b>	Established beyond doubt. <i>A <b>proven</b> liar.</i>
<b>reliability</b>	The degree to which the result of a measurement, calculation, or specification can be depended on to be accurate. <i>The car s background gives me every confidence in its <b>reliability</b>.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i><b>Reliable</b> information.</i>
<b>scientifically</b>	By means of scientific methods and principles. <i><b>Scientifically</b> minded people.</i>
<b>trust</b>	An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. <i>I used only primary sources taking nothing on <b>trust</b>.</i>
<b><u>trusted</u></b>	Regarded as reliable or truthful. <i>A <b>trusted</b> adviser.</i>

- trustful** Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust.  
*Great brown eye true and **trustful**.*
- trusting** Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust- Nordhoff & Hall.  
*It is foolish to be too **trusting** of other people.*
- trustworthy** Taking responsibility for one's conduct and obligations.  
*Leave a spare key with a **trustworthy** neighbour.*
- truthfulness** The quality of being truthful.  
*We have had to judge the **truthfulness** of the evidence.*
