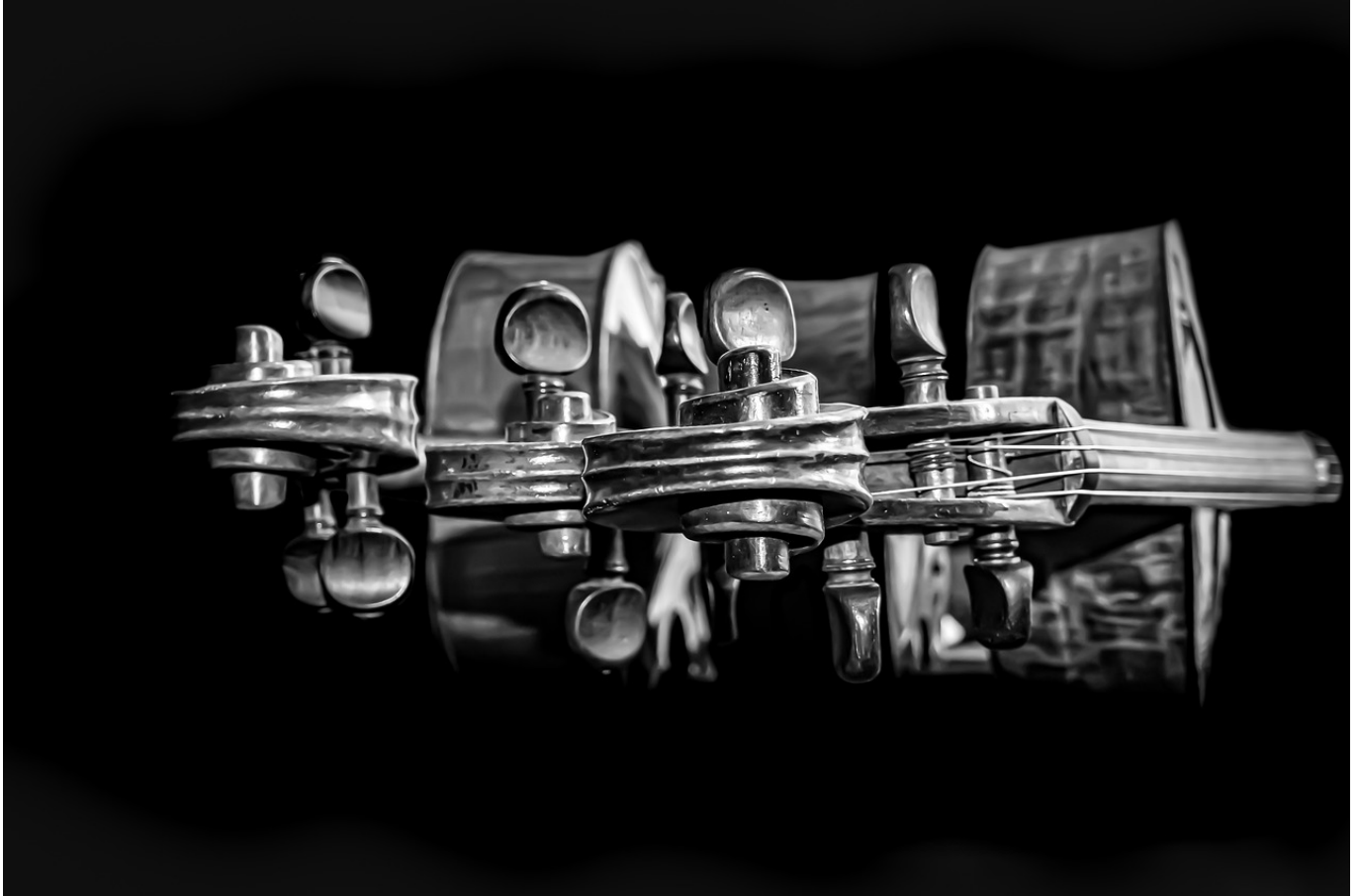

- accommodate** (of a building or other area) provide lodging or sufficient space for.
*The scientists had to **accommodate** the new results with the existing theories.*
- await** (of an event or circumstance) be in store for (someone).
*Many dangers **await** them.*
- awning** A sheet of canvas or other material stretched on a frame and used to keep the sun or rain off a shop window, doorway, or ship's deck.
- benefit** Be appropriate for; suit.
*As **benefits** a Quaker he was a humane man.*

<u>bind</u>	Of a quantifier be applied to a given variable so that the variable falls within its scope For example in an expression of the form For every x if x is a dog x is an animal the universal quantifier is binding the variable x. <i>Clay is made up chiefly of tiny soil particles that bind together tightly.</i>
<u>carry</u>	An act of carrying something from one place to another. <i>These bonds carry warrants.</i>
<u>cling</u>	A clingstone peach. <i>Sucker like discs help them to cling on.</i>
contain	Include or contain have as a component. <i>The government has already taken steps to contain the disease.</i>
detention	A punishment in which a student must stay at school after others have gone home. <i>His detention was politically motivated.</i>
embrace	An act of accepting something willingly or enthusiastically. <i>They embraced.</i>
encompass	Include comprehensively. <i>This area of London encompasses Piccadilly to the north and St James s Park to the south.</i>
entangle	Twist together or entwine into a confusing mass. <i>Fish attempt to swim through the mesh and become entangled.</i>
gnash	(of teeth) strike together; grind. <i>The dog s jaws were primed to gnash.</i>
<u>grab</u>	A mechanical device for gripping an object. <i>I ll grab another drink while there s still time.</i>
<u>grasp</u>	The act of grasping. <i>She grasped the bottle.</i>
grip	A hairgrip. <i>She was gripped by a feeling of excitement.</i>
have	Have left. <i>Are you going to have a party.</i>
hold	Support or hold in a certain manner. <i>I hold him personally responsible.</i>
<u>implicate</u>	Show (someone) to be involved in a crime. <i>By saying that coffee would keep her awake Mary implicated that she didn t want any.</i>
impound	Lock up (someone). <i>Vehicles parked where they cause an obstruction will be impounded.</i>

include	Have as a part, be made up out of. <i>Other changes included the abolition of the death penalty.</i>
let	Used in the imperative to formulate various expressions. <i>I had to wake up my flatmate Veronica to let me in.</i>
maintenance	Means of maintenance of a family or group. <i>Crucial conditions for the maintenance of democratic government.</i>
own	Have ownership or possession of. <i>His father owns a restaurant.</i>
possess	Have ownership or possession of. <i>He possesses great knowledge about the Middle East.</i>
postponement	The action of postponing something; deferral. <i>The postponement of the elections.</i>
retain	Keep in one's mind. <i>This soil retains water.</i>
retention	The continued possession, use, or control of something. <i>The retention of direct control by central government.</i>
take	Ascertain or determine by measuring computing or take a reading from a dial. <i>Winner takes all.</i>
tie	Unite written notes by a tie. <i>He stood in front of the mirror tightening his necktie.</i>
