<b>be suited to</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
<b>be the possession of</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be the property of</b>	Be identical or equivalent to.
<b>belong to</b>	Be in the right place or situation.
<b>fit in</b>	Be agreeable or acceptable to.
<b>go</b>	Go through in search of something search through someone s belongings in an unauthorized way. <i>I tried to persuade the Chancellor not to <b>go</b>.</i>
<b>have a home</b>	Be confronted with.
<b>have a place</b>	Have left.
<b>have a rightful place</b>	Get something; come into possession of.
<b>lie</b>	(of a thing) rest flat on a surface. <i>Don t <b>lie</b> to your parents.</i>

- awning** A sheet of canvas or other material stretched on a frame and used to keep the sun or rain off a shop window, doorway, or ship's deck.
- benefit** Be appropriate for; suit.  
*As **benefits** a Quaker he was a humane man.*

<b><u>bind</u></b>	Of a quantifier be applied to a given variable so that the variable falls within its scope For example in an expression of the form For every x if x is a dog x is an animal the universal quantifier is binding the variable x. <i>Clay is made up chiefly of tiny soil particles that <b>bind</b> together tightly.</i>
<b><u>carry</u></b>	An act of carrying something from one place to another. <i>These bonds <b>carry</b> warrants.</i>
<b><u>cling</u></b>	A clingstone peach. <i>Sucker like discs help them to <b>cling</b> on.</i>
<b>contain</b>	Include or contain have as a component. <i>The government has already taken steps to <b>contain</b> the disease.</i>
<b>detention</b>	A punishment in which a student must stay at school after others have gone home. <i>His <b>detention</b> was politically motivated.</i>
<b>embrace</b>	An act of accepting something willingly or enthusiastically. <i>They <b>embraced</b>.</i>
<b>encompass</b>	Include comprehensively. <i>This area of London <b>encompasses</b> Piccadilly to the north and St James s Park to the south.</i>
<b>entangle</b>	Twist together or entwine into a confusing mass. <i>Fish attempt to swim through the mesh and become <b>entangled</b>.</i>
<b>gnash</b>	(of teeth) strike together; grind. <i>The dog s jaws were primed to <b>gnash</b>.</i>
<b><u>grab</u></b>	A mechanical device for gripping an object. <i>I ll <b>grab</b> another drink while there s still time.</i>
<b><u>grasp</u></b>	The act of grasping. <i>She <b>grasped</b> the bottle.</i>
<b>grip</b>	A hairgrip. <i>She was <b>gripped</b> by a feeling of excitement.</i>
<b>have</b>	Have left. <i>Are you going to <b>have</b> a party.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Support or hold in a certain manner. <i>I <b>hold</b> him personally responsible.</i>
<b><u>implicate</u></b>	Show (someone) to be involved in a crime. <i>By saying that coffee would keep her awake Mary <b>implicated</b> that she didn t want any.</i>
<b>impound</b>	Lock up (someone). <i>Vehicles parked where they cause an obstruction will be <b>impounded</b>.</i>

<b>include</b>	Have as a part, be made up out of. <i>Other changes <b>included</b> the abolition of the death penalty.</i>
<b>let</b>	Used in the imperative to formulate various expressions. <i>I had to wake up my flatmate Veronica to <b>let</b> me in.</i>
<b>maintenance</b>	Means of maintenance of a family or group. <i>Crucial conditions for the <b>maintenance</b> of democratic government.</i>
<b>own</b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>His father <b>owns</b> a restaurant.</i>
<b>possess</b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>He <b>possesses</b> great knowledge about the Middle East.</i>
<b>postponement</b>	The action of postponing something; deferral. <i>The <b>postponement</b> of the elections.</i>
<b>retain</b>	Keep in one's mind. <i>This soil <b>retains</b> water.</i>
<b>retention</b>	The continued possession, use, or control of something. <i>The <b>retention</b> of direct control by central government.</i>
<b>take</b>	Ascertain or determine by measuring computing or take a reading from a dial. <i>Winner <b>takes</b> all.</i>
<b>tie</b>	Unite written notes by a tie. <i>He stood in front of the mirror tightening his neck<b>tie</b>.</i>
