- *A person who derives advantage from something, especially a trust, will, or life insurance policy.*

benefactive role	The actions and activities assigned to or required or expected of a person or group.
donee	A person who is given a power of appointment.
heir	A person legally entitled to the property or rank of another on that person's death. <i>The heir to the throne.</i>
heiress	A woman who is legally entitled to the property or rank of another on that person's death. <i>She was heiress to a 32 million textile fortune.</i>

inheritor	A person who inherits something; an heir. <i>We are the inheritors of these cultural traditions.</i>
legatee	A person who receives a legacy. <i>His sister Alice was his principal legatee.</i>

Associations of "Beneficiary" (30 Words)

benefactor	A person who gives money or other help to a person or cause. <i>A low interest loan from a benefactor allowed them to build a floor for the exhibition hall.</i>
bestow	Bestow a quality on. <i>The office was bestowed on him by the monarch of this realm.</i>
charitable	Relating to the assistance of those in need. <i>They set up a charitable trust to run the hospital.</i>
charity	Love of humankind, typically in a Christian context. <i>She found it hard to look on her mother with much charity.</i>
contribute	Contribute to some cause. <i>He contributed to a private pension.</i>
contribution	A voluntary gift (as of money or service or ideas) made to some worthwhile cause. <i>I am proud of my contribution in advancing the project.</i>
disinherit	Change one's will or take other steps to prevent (someone) from inheriting one's property. <i>The Duke is seeking to disinherit his eldest son.</i>
donate	Give to a charity or good cause. <i>All donated blood is tested for antibodies.</i>
<u>donation</u>	Act of giving in common with others for a common purpose especially to a charity. <i>The donation of carpets chairs and cutlery.</i>
donee	The recipient of funds or other benefits.
donor	Someone who gives blood or tissue or an organ to be used in another person (the host). <i>A blood donor.</i>
endowment	A quality or ability possessed or inherited by someone. <i>He tried to promote the endowment of a Chair of Psychiatry.</i>
fiduciary	Held or given in trust. <i>It is illegal for a fiduciary to misappropriate money for personal gain.</i>

fundraiser	Someone who solicits financial contributions. <i>A fundraiser for the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Society.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Cleaning the same things all the time that s what gets me.</i>
gift	Give as a present make a gift of. <i>He has a gift for comedy.</i>
give	Give entirely to a specific person activity or cause. <i>A baby given into their care by the accident of her birth.</i>
giver	A person who gives something. <i>A giver of advice.</i>
grantor	A person who makes a grant in legal form. <i>Conveyed from grantor to grantee.</i>
gratuity	A tip given to a waiter, taxi driver, etc. <i>An end of contract gratuity of 20 of the total pay received.</i>
humanitarian	Of or relating to or characteristic of humanitarianism. <i>Groups sending humanitarian aid.</i>
largess	A gift or money given (as for service or out of benevolence); usually given ostentatiously.
potlatch	Hold a potlatch.
priceless	Very amusing. <i>Darling you re priceless.</i>
receive	Receive as a retribution or punishment. <i>These aspects of civilization do not find expression or receive an interpretation.</i>
recipient	A person or thing that receives or is awarded something. <i>The recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize.</i>
selfless	Showing unselfish concern for the welfare of others. <i>An act of selfless devotion.</i>
thank	Used ironically to assign blame or responsibility for something. <i>Mac thanked her for the meal and left.</i>
voucher	A document that serves as evidence of some expenditure.
wrapper	A tobacco leaf of superior quality enclosing a cigar. <i>A sweet wrapper.</i>
