### Definitions of "Beneficiary" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “beneficiary” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The recipient of funds or other benefits.*
- *The semantic role of the intended recipient who benefits from the happening denoted by the verb in the clause.*
- *A person who derives advantage from something, especially a trust, will, or life insurance policy.*

<b>benefactive role</b>	The actions and activities assigned to or required or expected of a person or group.
<b>donee</b>	A person who is given a power of appointment.
<b><a href="#">heir</a></b>	A person legally entitled to the property or rank of another on that person’s death. <i>The <b>heir</b> to the throne.</i>
<b>heiress</b>	A woman who is legally entitled to the property or rank of another on that person’s death. <i>She was <b>heiress</b> to a 32 million textile fortune.</i>

<b>inheritor</b>	A person who inherits something; an heir. <i>We are the <b>inheritors</b> of these cultural traditions.</i>
<b>legatee</b>	A person who receives a legacy. <i>His sister Alice was his principal <b>legatee</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Beneficiary" (30 Words)

<b>benefactor</b>	A person who gives money or other help to a person or cause. <i>A low interest loan from a <b>benefactor</b> allowed them to build a floor for the exhibition hall.</i>
<b>bestow</b>	Bestow a quality on. <i>The office was <b>bestowed</b> on him by the monarch of this realm.</i>
<b>charitable</b>	Relating to the assistance of those in need. <i>They set up a <b>charitable</b> trust to run the hospital.</i>
<b>charity</b>	Love of humankind, typically in a Christian context. <i>She found it hard to look on her mother with much <b>charity</b>.</i>
<b>contribute</b>	Contribute to some cause. <i>He <b>contributed</b> to a private pension.</i>
<b>contribution</b>	A voluntary gift (as of money or service or ideas) made to some worthwhile cause. <i>I am proud of my <b>contribution</b> in advancing the project.</i>
<b>disinherit</b>	Change one's will or take other steps to prevent (someone) from inheriting one's property. <i>The Duke is seeking to <b>disinherit</b> his eldest son.</i>
<b>donate</b>	Give to a charity or good cause. <i>All <b>donated</b> blood is tested for antibodies.</i>
<b><u>donation</u></b>	Act of giving in common with others for a common purpose especially to a charity. <i>The <b>donation</b> of carpets chairs and cutlery.</i>
<b>donee</b>	The recipient of funds or other benefits.
<b>donor</b>	Someone who gives blood or tissue or an organ to be used in another person (the host). <i>A blood <b>donor</b>.</i>
<b>endowment</b>	A quality or ability possessed or inherited by someone. <i>He tried to promote the <b>endowment</b> of a Chair of Psychiatry.</i>
<b>fiduciary</b>	Held or given in trust. <i>It is illegal for a <b>fiduciary</b> to misappropriate money for personal gain.</i>

<b>fundraiser</b>	Someone who solicits financial contributions. <i>A <b>fundraiser</b> for the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Society.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Cleaning the same things all the time that s what <b>gets</b> me.</i>
<b>gift</b>	Give as a present make a gift of. <i>He has a <b>gift</b> for comedy.</i>
<b>give</b>	Give entirely to a specific person activity or cause. <i>A baby <b>given</b> into their care by the accident of her birth.</i>
<b>giver</b>	A person who gives something. <i>A <b>giver</b> of advice.</i>
<b>grantor</b>	A person who makes a grant in legal form. <i>Conveyed from <b>grantor</b> to grantee.</i>
<b>gratuity</b>	A tip given to a waiter, taxi driver, etc. <i>An end of contract <b>gratuity</b> of 20 of the total pay received.</i>
<b>humanitarian</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of humanitarianism. <i>Groups sending <b>humanitarian</b> aid.</i>
<b>largess</b>	A gift or money given (as for service or out of benevolence); usually given ostentatiously.
<b>potlatch</b>	Hold a potlatch.
<b>priceless</b>	Very amusing. <i>Darling you re <b>priceless</b>.</i>
<b>receive</b>	Receive as a retribution or punishment. <i>These aspects of civilization do not find expression or <b>receive</b> an interpretation.</i>
<b>recipient</b>	A person or thing that receives or is awarded something. <i>The <b>recipient</b> of the Nobel Peace Prize.</i>
<b>selfless</b>	Showing unselfish concern for the welfare of others. <i>An act of <b>selfless</b> devotion.</i>
<b>thank</b>	Used ironically to assign blame or responsibility for something. <i>Mac <b>thanked</b> her for the meal and left.</i>
<b>voucher</b>	A document that serves as evidence of some expenditure.
<b>wrapper</b>	A tobacco leaf of superior quality enclosing a cigar. <i>A sweet <b>wrapper</b>.</i>
