

altruism	Behaviour of an animal that benefits another at its own expense. Some may choose to work with vulnerable elderly people out of altruism .
benefaction	A contribution of money or assistance. An exceptional benefaction .
benignity	Kindness or tolerance toward others. <i>His air of benignity.</i>
charitableness	Generosity as manifested by practicing charity (as for the poor or unfortunate.
charity	A foundation created to promote the public good (not for assistance to any particular individuals. <i>An unemployed teacher living on charity.</i>
compassion	A deep awareness of and sympathy for another's suffering. The victims should be treated with compassion .
consideration	A considerate and thoughtful act. You can buy the books for a small consideration .
decency	The quality of conforming to standards of propriety and morality. She had the decency to come and confess.
goodness	The beneficial or nourishing element of food. A belief in the basic goodness of mankind.
goodwill	(accounting) an intangible asset valued according to the advantage or reputation a business has acquired (over and above its tangible assets. <i>A</i> goodwill gesture.
humanitarianism	The promotion of human welfare. A contribution made in the spirit of humanitarianism .
humanity	Human beings collectively. <i>He praised them for their standards of humanity and care.</i>
kind-heartedness	Sympathy arising from a kind heart.
kindness	Tendency to be kind and forgiving. It would be a kindness on your part to invite her.
social conscience	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.
thoughtfulness	Kind and considerate regard for others. I am touched by your thoughtfulness .

A person who helps people or institutions (especially with financial help. **benefactor** A low interest loan from a **benefactor** allowed them to build a floor for the exhibition hall. Beneficent or kindly. benefic A **benefic** star. beneficence Doing good; feeling beneficent. An act of kindness. benignity His air of **benignity**. Given or giving freely. **bounteous** The earth yields a **bounteous** harvest. A sum paid by the state to encourage trade. **bounty** For millennia the people along the Nile have depended entirely on its bounty. Leniency and compassion shown toward offenders by a person or agency charged with administering justice. clemency An appeal for **clemency**. Sympathetic pity and concern for the sufferings or misfortunes of others. compassion The victims should be treated with **compassion**. A feeling of liking for another person; enjoyment in their company. friendliness I was overwhelmed by the **friendliness** of the people here. The trait of being willing to give your money or time. **generosity** Diners certainly cannot complain about the **generosity** of portions. More than is usual or necessary. generous Unusually **generous** in his judgment of people. That which is pleasing or valuable or useful. goodness A belief in the basic **goodness** of mankind. (accounting) an intangible asset valued according to the advantage or goodwill reputation a business has acquired (over and above its tangible assets. kind	A group of people or things having similar characteristics. <i>Communion in both kinds</i> .
kindness	The quality of being warmhearted and considerate and humane and sympathetic. It would be a kindness on your part to invite her.
largess	A gift or money given (as for service or out of benevolence); usually given ostentatiously.
largesse	Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>Presumably public money is not dispensed with such largesse to anyone else.</i>
<u>leniency</u>	A disposition to yield to the wishes of someone. <i>The court could show leniency</i> .
liberality	The quality of being open to new ideas and free from prejudice. <i>Liberality towards bisexuality</i> .
magnanimity	, Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. Both sides will have to show magnanimity .
<u>mercy</u>	(especially of a journey or mission) performed out of a desire to relieve suffering. Distributing food and clothing to the flood victims was an act of mercy .
mildness	Good weather with comfortable temperatures. The mildness of her disease.
munificence	Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>We must be thankful for his munificence</i> .
selflessness	Acting with less concern for yourself than for the success of the joint activity. The selflessness and courage of officers killed in the line of duty.
tolerance	The capacity to endure continued subjection to something such as a drug or environmental conditions without adverse reaction. <i>The tolerance</i> of corruption.
<u>truthfulness</u>	The quality of being truthful. We have had to judge the truthfulness of the evidence.
unstinting	Given or giving without restraint; unsparing. He was unstinting in his praise.
