| <b>implore</b>         | Beg someone earnestly or desperately to do something.<br><i>He <b>implored</b> her to change her mind.</i>   |
| <b>importune</b>       | Beg persistently and urgently.<br><i>The president would <b>importune</b> them to try harder.</i>  |
| <b><u>petition</u></b> | Write a petition for something to somebody request formally and in writing.<br><i>The custodial parent <b>petitioned</b> the court for payment of the arrears.</i>   |
| <b>plead with</b>      | Make an allegation in an action or other legal proceeding, especially answer the previous pleading of the other party by denying facts therein stated or by alleging new facts.  |
| <b>pray to</b>         | Address a deity, a prophet, a saint or an object of worship; say a prayer.   |
| <b>press</b>           | Create by pressing.<br><i><b>Pressed</b> flowers.</i>  |
| <b>supplicate</b>      | Ask or beg for something earnestly or humbly.<br><i>The plutocracy <b>supplicated</b> to be made peers.</i>  |
