| bother | Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>He wasn't to bother himself with day to day things.</i> |
| box in | Hit with the fist. |
| chevy | Annoy continually or chronically. |

| chivvy | Annoy continually or chronically. <i>An association which chivvies government into action.</i> |

| dog | Grip (something) with a mechanical device. <i>Photographers seemed to dog her every step.</i> |

| enclose | Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>The open fields in the parish were enclosed in 1808.</i> |
| encrust | Cover or coat with a crust. <i>The mussels encrust navigation buoys.</i> |
| fence in | Enclose with a fence. |
| <u>harass</u> | Subject to aggressive pressure or intimidation. <i>The squadron's task was to harass the retreating enemy forces.</i> |
| harry | Annoy continually or chronically. <i>The raiders then spent three months harrying and burning the area.</i> |
| <u>hassle</u> | Harass; pester. <i>You want to sit and relax and not get hassled.</i> |
| hem in | Fold over and sew together to provide with a hem. |
| hound | Harass, persecute, or pursue relentlessly. <i>His opponents used the allegations to hound him out of office.</i> |
| incrust | Form a crust or a hard layer. |

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| oppress | Cause to suffer. <i>The government oppresses political activists.</i> |
| plague | Annoy continually or chronically. <i>He has been plagued by ill health.</i> |
| provoke | Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>A teacher can provoke you into working harder.</i> |
| rack | Torture on the rack. <i>He was racked with guilt.</i> |
| ring round | Sound loudly and sonorously. |
| set upon | Decide upon or fix definitely. |
| shut in | Move so that an opening or passage is obstructed; make shut. |
| surround | Surround so as to force to give up. <i>The killings were surrounded by controversy.</i> |
| torment | Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>The sinners will be tormented in Hell according to the Bible.</i> |
| torture | Subject to torture. <i>Most of the victims had been brutally tortured.</i> |
| trouble | Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>He was not troubled by doubts.</i> |
| worry | Disturb the peace of mind of; afflict with mental agitation or distress. <i>I worry about my job.</i> |

| disaster | An event resulting in great loss and misfortune. <i>The earthquake was a disaster.</i> |
| disturb | Damage as if by shaking or jarring. <i>I ll see my patient now and we are not to be disturbed.</i> |
| enemy | A personal enemy. <i>He viewed lawyers as the real enemy.</i> |
| harass | Exhaust by attacking repeatedly. <i>Being harassed at work can leave you feeling confused and helpless.</i> |
| hardship | A state of misfortune or affliction. <i>The many hardships of frontier life.</i> |
| harry | Annoy continually or chronically. <i>He is known to harry his staff when he is overworked.</i> |
| invasion | An unwelcome intrusion into another's domain. <i>In 1546 England had to be defended from invasion.</i> |
| misadventure | An instance of misfortune. <i>The coroner recorded a verdict of death by misadventure.</i> |

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| mischance | Bad luck. <i>By pure mischance the secret was revealed.</i> |
| <u>misfortune</u> | Bad luck. <i>Never laugh at other people's misfortunes.</i> |
| <u>mishap</u> | An instance of misfortune. <i>Although there were a few minor mishaps none of the pancakes stuck to the ceiling.</i> |
| peeve | Annoy or irritate. <i>Another peeve of mine is these so called reality shows.</i> |
| persistently | In a persistent manner. <i>Prices have remained persistently high.</i> |
| <u>pester</u> | Trouble or annoy (someone) with frequent or persistent requests or interruptions. <i>She constantly pestered him with telephone calls.</i> |
| <u>plight</u> | A situation from which extrication is difficult especially an unpleasant or trying one. <i>We must direct our efforts towards relieving the plight of children living in poverty.</i> |
| presage | (of a person) predict. <i>The fever was a sombre presage of his final illness.</i> |
| <u>raid</u> | Conduct a raid on. <i>Officers raided thirty homes yesterday.</i> |
| ravage | Cause extensive destruction or ruin utterly. <i>The hurricane ravaged southern Florida.</i> |
| <u>throes</u> | Violent pangs of suffering. <i>Death throes.</i> |
| <u>tragedy</u> | Drama in which the protagonist is overcome by some superior force or circumstance; excites terror or pity. <i>His life had been plagued by tragedy.</i> |
