Associations of "Betrayed" (30 Words)

apostasy	The abandonment or renunciation of a religious or political belief or principle. <i>The execution of their leader for apostasy brought widespread criticism.</i>
apostate	Abandoning a religious or political belief or principle. <i>An apostate Roman Catholic.</i>
betrayal	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>These developments represented a betrayal of democracy.</i>
betray	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
cheat	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>We were cheated by their clever sounding scheme.</i>
cheating	A deception for profit to yourself.
deceit	The act of deceiving. <i>A web of deceit.</i>
deceive	Be false to; be dishonest with. <i>I didn't intend to deceive people into thinking it was French champagne.</i>
defection	The desertion of one's country or cause in favour of an opposing one. <i>His defection from the Labour Party.</i>
defector	A person who abandons their duty (as on a military post). <i>Staff interviewed escapees and defectors to the West.</i>
disloyal	Deserting your allegiance or duty to leader or cause or principle. <i>Disloyal mutterings about his leadership.</i>
duplicity	Acting in bad faith; deception by pretending to entertain one set of intentions while acting under the influence of another. <i>The president was accused of duplicity in his dealings with Congress.</i>
faithless	Without religious faith. <i>They were ungodly and faithless.</i>
fraudulence	The quality of being fraudulent.

humbug	Trick or deceive. <i>Poor Dave is easily humbugged.</i>
infidelity	Disbelief in a particular religion, especially Christianity. <i>Her infidelity continued after her marriage.</i>
perfidious	Deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>The perfidious Judas.</i>
perfidy	The state of being deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>Hapsburg perfidy.</i>
proselytize	Convert or attempt to convert (someone) from one religion, belief, or opinion to another. <i>Davis wanted to share his concept and proselytize his ideas.</i>
quisling	A traitor who collaborates with an enemy force occupying their country. <i>He had the Quisling owner of the factory arrested.</i>
rebel	Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance. <i>Tory rebels.</i>
renegade	Become a renegade. <i>Renegades and Deserters of Heaven who renounce their God for the Favour of Man.</i>
traitor	Someone who betrays his country by committing treason. <i>He was a traitor to his own class.</i>
traitorous	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. <i>When his traitorous actions were discovered he was imprisoned.</i>
treacherous	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Memory is particularly treacherous.</i>
treachery	Betrayal of trust. <i>The treachery of language.</i>
treason	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>Doubt is the ultimate treason against faith.</i>
treasonable	(of an offence or offender) punishable as treason or as committing treason. <i>There was no evidence of treasonable activity.</i>
trick	Deceive somebody. <i>He did conjuring tricks for his daughters.</i>
turncoat	A disloyal person who betrays or deserts his cause or religion or political party or friend etc. <i>They denounced him as a turncoat.</i>
