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## Associations of "Betrayed" (30 Words)

<b>apostasy</b>	The abandonment or renunciation of a religious or political belief or principle. <i>The execution of their leader for <b>apostasy</b> brought widespread criticism.</i>
<b><u>apostate</u></b>	Abandoning a religious or political belief or principle. <i>An <b>apostate</b> Roman Catholic.</i>
<b><u>betrayal</u></b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>These developments represented a <b>betrayal</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>betrayor</b>	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
<b>cheat</b>	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>We were <b>cheated</b> by their clever sounding scheme.</i>
<b>cheating</b>	A deception for profit to yourself.
<b><u>deceit</u></b>	The act of deceiving. <i>A web of <b>deceit</b>.</i>
<b>deceive</b>	Be false to; be dishonest with. <i>I didn't intend to <b>deceive</b> people into thinking it was French champagne.</i>
<b>defection</b>	The desertion of one's country or cause in favour of an opposing one. <i>His <b>defection</b> from the Labour Party.</i>
<b>defector</b>	A person who abandons their duty (as on a military post). <i>Staff interviewed escapees and <b>defectors</b> to the West.</i>
<b><u>disloyal</u></b>	Deserting your allegiance or duty to leader or cause or principle. <i><b>Disloyal</b> mutterings about his leadership.</i>
<b><u>duplicity</u></b>	Acting in bad faith; deception by pretending to entertain one set of intentions while acting under the influence of another. <i>The president was accused of <b>duplicity</b> in his dealings with Congress.</i>
<b>faithless</b>	Without religious faith. <i>They were ungodly and <b>faithless</b>.</i>
<b>fraudulence</b>	The quality of being fraudulent.

<b>humbug</b>	Trick or deceive. <i>Poor Dave is easily <b>humbugged</b>.</i>
<b>infidelity</b>	Disbelief in a particular religion, especially Christianity. <i>Her <b>infidelity</b> continued after her marriage.</i>
<b>perfidious</b>	Deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>The <b>perfidious</b> Judas.</i>
<b>perfidy</b>	The state of being deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>Hapsburg <b>perfidy</b>.</i>
<b>proselytize</b>	Convert or attempt to convert (someone) from one religion, belief, or opinion to another. <i>Davis wanted to share his concept and <b>proselytize</b> his ideas.</i>
<b>quisling</b>	A traitor who collaborates with an enemy force occupying their country. <i>He had the <b>Quisling</b> owner of the factory arrested.</i>
<b>rebel</b>	Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance. <i>Tory <b>rebels</b>.</i>
<b>renegade</b>	Become a renegade. <i><b>Renegades</b> and Deserters of Heaven who renounce their God for the Favour of Man.</i>
<b>traitor</b>	Someone who betrays his country by committing treason. <i>He was a <b>traitor</b> to his own class.</i>
<b>traitorous</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. <i>When his <b>traitorous</b> actions were discovered he was imprisoned.</i>
<b>treacherous</b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Memory is particularly <b>treacherous</b>.</i>
<b>treachery</b>	Betrayal of trust. <i>The <b>treachery</b> of language.</i>
<b>treason</b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>Doubt is the ultimate <b>treason</b> against faith.</i>
<b>treasonable</b>	(of an offence or offender) punishable as treason or as committing treason. <i>There was no evidence of <b>treasonable</b> activity.</i>
<b>trick</b>	Deceive somebody. <i>He did conjuring <b>tricks</b> for his daughters.</i>
<b>turncoat</b>	A disloyal person who betrays or deserts his cause or religion or political party or friend etc. <i>They denounced him as a <b>turncoat</b>.</i>
