salutation written to.

salute Make a formal salute to.

When the officers show up the soldiers have to **salute**.

troth A solemn pledge of fidelity.

A token of **troth**.

Make a vow promise.

wed Take in marriage.

Will you **wed** your daughter to him.

wedding A party of people at a wedding.

The wife of a person with a specified occupation.
