<b>be on the lookout</b>	Be priced at.

<b>be on your guard</b>	Form or compose.
<b>be wary</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>keep a sharp lookout</b>	Allow to remain in a place or position or maintain a property or feature.
<b>keep your eyes open</b>	Retain possession of.
<b>look out</b>	Be oriented in a certain direction, often with respect to another reference point; be opposite to.

Keep in mind.

*Be early to bed tonight **mind**.*

**mind out**

Pay close attention to; give heed to.

**watch out**

Find out, learn, or determine with certainty, usually by making an inquiry or other effort.

- *We should beware the incompetence of legislators.*



## Associations of "Beware" (30 Words)

### attentive

Taking heed; giving close and thoughtful attention.  
*The hotel has a pleasant atmosphere and **attentive** service.*

### burglar

A person who commits burglary.

### cagey

Characterized by great caution and wariness.  
*A **cagey** avoidance of a definite answer.*

### careful

Full of cares or anxiety.  
*His mother had always been **careful** with money.*

<b>carefully</b>	In a way that deliberately avoids harm or errors; cautiously. <i>He listened <b>carefully</b> to the way people spoke.</i>
<b>carefulness</b>	The quality of being careful and painstaking. <i>I admired the <b>carefulness</b> of his work.</i>
<b>caution</b>	An amusing or surprising person. <i>Business advisers have sounded a note of <b>caution</b>.</i>
<b>cautious</b>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>Reserved and <b>cautious</b> never making swift decisions.</i>
<b>caveat</b>	A warning against certain acts. <i>A <b>caveat</b> against unfair practices.</i>
<b>chary</b>	Characterized by great caution and wariness. <i><b>Chary</b> of the risks involved.</i>
<b>circumspect</b>	Heedful of potential consequences. <i>Physicians are now more <b>circumspect</b> about recommending its use.</i>
<b>circumspection</b>	The quality of being wary and unwilling to take risks; prudence. <i><b>Circumspection</b> is required in the day to day exercise of administrative powers.</i>
<b>discreet</b>	Unobtrusively perceptive and sympathetic. <i>A <b>discreet</b> silence.</i>
<b>discreetly</b>	With discretion; prudently and with wise self-restraint. <i>She coughed <b>discreetly</b>.</i>
<b>discretion</b>	Freedom to act or judge on one's own. <i>She knew she could rely on his <b>discretion</b>.</i>
<b>gingerly</b>	In a gingerly manner. <i>Jackson sat down very <b>gingerly</b>.</i>
<b>heed</b>	Pay close attention to give heed to. <i>He spends without <b>heed</b> to the consequences.</i>
<b>modesty</b>	Freedom from vanity or conceit. <i>With typical <b>modesty</b> he insisted on sharing the credit with others.</i>
<b>pickpocket</b>	A thief who steals from the pockets or purses of others in public places. <i>I think someone <b>pickpocketed</b> me in Brighton on my way to the station.</i>
<b>pocket</b>	Enclose as though in a pocket. <i>Local politicians were found to have been <b>pocketing</b> the proceeds of fund raisers.</i>
<b>precaution</b>	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>We never took <b>precautions</b>.</i>

<b>prudence</b>	Discretion in practical affairs. <i>We need to exercise <b>prudence</b> in such important matters.</i>
<b>prudent</b>	Acting with or showing care and thought for the future. <i>A <b>prudent</b> manager.</i>
<b>purse</b>	A sum of money spoken of as the contents of a money purse. <i><b>Purse</b> ones s lips.</i>
<b>solicitous</b>	Full of anxiety and concern. <i>He was <b>solicitous</b> to cultivate her mamma s good opinion.</i>
<b>thief</b>	A criminal who takes property belonging to someone else with the intention of keeping it or selling it. <i>The <b>thief</b> stole the drugs from a doctor s surgery.</i>
<b>wallet</b>	A pocket-size case for holding papers and paper money.
<b>warn</b>	Give (someone) cautionary advice about their actions or conduct. <i>Traffic signals <b>warned</b> of fog.</i>
<b>warning</b>	Notification of something, usually in advance. <i>They gave little <b>warning</b> of their arrival.</i>
<b>wary</b>	Openly distrustful and unwilling to confide. <i>They were <b>wary</b> in their movements.</i>
