### **Definitions of "Bewilder" as a verb**

- *Cause (someone) to become perplexed and confused.*
- *Be a mystery or bewildering to.*
- *Cause to be confused emotionally.*



## Synonyms of "Bewilder" as a verb (18 Words)

<b>amaze</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>He has been <b>amazed</b> by the quality of the employees at the bank.</i>
<b>baffle</b>	Restrain the emission of (sound, fluid, etc). <i>To <b>baffle</b> the noise further I pad the gunwales.</i>
<b>beat</b>	Beat through cleverness and wit. <i>She <b>beat</b> her fists against the wood.</i>
<b>bemuse</b>	Cause to be confused emotionally. <i>He was <b>bemused</b> by what was happening.</i>
<b>discombobulate</b>	Cause to be confused emotionally. <i>This attitude totally <b>discombobulated</b> Bruce.</i>
<b>dumbfound</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>She was <b>dumbfounded</b> at the sight that met her eyes.</i>
<b>flummox</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>I was completely <b>flummoxed</b> by the whole thing.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>What kind of reception did you <b>get</b>.</i>

<b>gravel</b>	Cover an area of ground with gravel. <i>We <b>gravelled</b> the driveway.</i>
<b>mystify</b>	Make obscure or mysterious. <i>Lawyers who <b>mystify</b> the legal system so that laymen find it unintelligible.</i>
<b>nonplus</b>	Surprise and confuse (someone) so much that they are unsure how to react. <i>Diane was <b>nonplussed</b> by such an odd question.</i>
<b>perplex</b>	Complicate or confuse (a matter). <i>They were <b>perplexing</b> a subject plain in itself.</i>
<b>pose</b>	Assume a posture as for artistic purposes. <i>He <b>posed</b> her on the sofa.</i>
<b>puzzle</b>	Think hard about something because one cannot understand it. <i>She was <b>puzzled</b> by the doctor's manner.</i>
<b>stick</b>	Come or be in close contact with stick or hold together and resist separation. <i><b>Stick</b> the corner of the sheet under the mattress.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Make dull or stupid or muddle with drunkenness or infatuation. <i>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to <b>stupefy</b> her.</i>
<b>throw</b>	Throw a die out onto a flat surface. <i>Have <b>throw</b> or make a party.</i>
<b>vex</b>	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>A <b>vexing</b> problem.</i>



### **Usage Examples of "Bewilder" as a verb**

- *She was bewildered by his sudden change of mood.*
- *His reaction had bewildered her.*





## Associations of "Bewilder" (30 Words)

**addle** (of an egg) become rotten, producing no chick.  
*Addled* eggs.

<b>astonish</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>You never fail to <b>astonish</b> me.</i>
<b>astound</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>Her bluntness <b>astounded</b> him.</i>
<b>baffle</b>	A flat plate that controls or directs the flow of fluid or energy. <i>An unexplained occurrence that <b>baffled</b> everyone.</i>
<b>befuddle</b>	Make (someone) unable to think clearly. <i>This question <b>befuddled</b> even the teacher.</i>
<b>bemuse</b>	Cause to be confused emotionally. <i>He was <b>bemused</b> by what was happening.</i>
<b>confound</b>	Cause surprise or confusion in (someone), especially by not according with their expectations. <i>The rise in prices <b>confounded</b> expectations.</i>
<b>confuse</b>	Be confusing or perplexing to; cause to be unable to think clearly. <i>The points made by the authors <b>confuse</b> rather than clarify the issue.</i>
<b>discomfit</b>	Make (someone) feel uneasy or embarrassed. <i>He was not noticeably <b>discomfited</b> by her tone.</i>
<b>disconcert</b>	Cause to lose one's composure. <i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>
<b>disorder</b>	Bring disorder to. <i>The world's currency markets were in <b>disorder</b>.</i>
<b>disorient</b>	Cause to be lost or disoriented. <i>The inconsistencies of the narrative do more than merely <b>disorient</b> and challenge the reader.</i>
<b>dumbfound</b>	Greatly astonish or amaze. <i>I was <b>dumbfounded</b> by the low prices there.</i>
<b>embarrass</b>	Cause to be embarrassed cause to feel self-conscious. <i>The state of the rivers will <b>embarrass</b> the enemy.</i>
<b>faze</b>	Disturb the composure of. <i>She was not <b>fazed</b> by his show of anger.</i>
<b>flurry</b>	A small swirling mass of something, especially snow or leaves, moved by sudden gusts of wind. <i>There was a <b>flurry</b> of chicken feathers.</i>
<b>fluster</b>	Be flustered behave in a confused manner. <i>There's nothing you can do or say to <b>fluster</b> Bernie.</i>
<b>jumble</b>	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>His words <b>jumbled</b>.</i>

<b><u>maze</u></b>	Something jumbled or confused. <i>They were trapped in a menacing <b>maze</b> of corridors.</i>
<b>mystify</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i><b>Mystify</b> the story.</i>
<b><u>obfuscate</u></b>	Bewilder (someone). <i>The spelling changes will deform some familiar words and <b>obfuscate</b> their etymological origins.</i>
<b>perplex</b>	Make more complicated. <i>She was <b>perplexed</b> by her husband s moodiness.</i>
<b><u>perplexed</u></b>	Completely baffled; very puzzled. <i><b>Perplexed</b> state of the world.</i>
<b><u>puzzled</u></b>	Unable to understand; perplexed. <i>She looked <b>puzzled</b> and angry with him.</i>
<b>questioning</b>	A request for information. <i>There was no <b>questioning</b> of the decision.</i>
<b>sadden</b>	Cause to feel sorrow; make unhappy. <i>The news of her death <b>saddened</b> me.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Make senseless or dizzy by or as if by a blow. <i>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to <b>stupefy</b> her.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>He <b>surprised</b> an interesting scene.</i>
<b>surprised</b>	Taken unawares or suddenly and feeling wonder or astonishment. <i>There was a <b>surprised</b> silence.</i>
<b><u>thwart</u></b>	A structural crosspiece forming a seat for a rower in a boat. <i>He was <b>thwarted</b> in his desire to punish Uncle Fred.</i>
