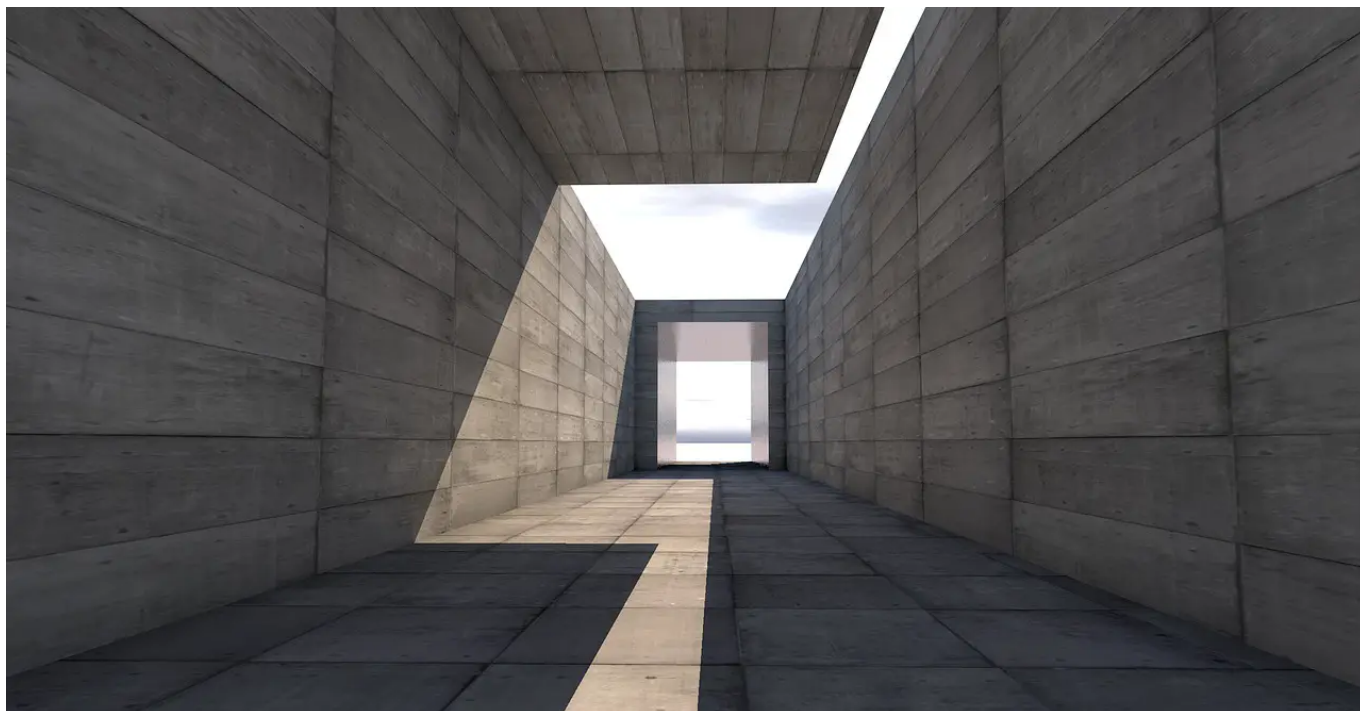

## **Beyond as an Adverb**

### **Definitions of "Beyond" as an adverb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “beyond” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Above or greater than a specified amount.*
- *More extensive or extreme than a particular point.*
- *At or to the further side of something.*
- *After a specified time or event.*
- *In addition.*
- *Farther along in space or time or degree.*
- *On the farther side from the observer.*



## Synonyms of "Beyond" as an adverb (5 Words)

<b>afar</b>	At or to a certain point or degree. <i>For months he had loved her from <b>afar</b>.</i>
<b>far away</b>	At or to a certain point or degree.
<b>far off</b>	At or to a certain point or degree.
<b>further on</b>	To or at a greater distance in time or space (‘farther’ is used more frequently than ‘further’ in this physical sense).
<b>in the distance</b>	To or toward the inside of.



## Usage Examples of "Beyond" as an adverb

- *She blurs the boundaries between reality and what lies beyond.*
- *A view of Hobart with Mount Wellington beyond.*
- *The athletes are pushing themselves to their limits and beyond.*
- *Music went on into the night and beyond.*
- *There was the terminal and, beyond, an endless line of warehouses.*
- *He could count up to a billion now, and beyond.*
- *From south of Dortmund as far as Essen and beyond.*



## Associations of "Beyond" (30 Words)

<b><u>across</u></b>	To the opposite side. <i>A crater some 30 metres <b>across</b>.</i>
<b><u>aggrandize</u></b>	Enhance the reputation of (someone) beyond what is justified by the facts. <i>He hoped to <b>aggrandize</b> himself by dying a hero's death.</i>
<b><u>amplify</u></b>	Increase the amplitude of (an electrical signal or other oscillation). <i>The manufacturers have developed a system of <b>amplifying</b> the radio signal.</i>
<b><u>bloat</u></b>	Become bloated or swollen or puff up. <i>The fungus has <b>bloated</b> their abdomens.</i>
<b>broad</b>	Broad in scope or content T G Winner. <i>A <b>broad</b> expanse of paddy fields.</i>
<b><u>broaden</u></b>	Extend in scope or range or area. <i><b>Broaden</b> the road.</i>
<b>corroboration</b>	Evidence which confirms or supports a statement, theory, or finding; confirmation. <i>There is no independent <b>corroboration</b> for this.</i>

<b>dilate</b>	Become wider. <i>His pupils were <b>dilated</b>.</i>
<b>distend</b>	Become wider. <i>Air is introduced into the stomach to <b>distend</b> it.</i>
<b>diversify</b>	Vary in order to spread risk or to expand. <i>New plants will <b>diversify</b> the habitat.</i>
<u><b>enlarge</b></u>	Make large. <i>Very often a favourite photograph is <b>enlarged</b> and framed.</i>
<b>escalation</b>	An increase to counteract a perceived discrepancy. <i>An <b>escalation</b> of violence.</i>
<b>expand</b>	Expand the influence of. <i>The dough <b>expands</b>.</i>
<b>expanded</b>	Relatively broad in shape. <i><b>Expanded</b> polystyrene.</i>
<b>expansion</b>	The political strategy of extending a state's territory by encroaching on that of other nations. <i>A small <b>expansion</b> of industry.</i>
<u><b>extend</b></u>	Continue or extend. <i><b>Extend</b> a hand.</i>
<u><b>extent</b></u>	The area covered by something. <i>Everyone will have to compromise to some <b>extent</b>.</i>
<u><b>horizon</b></u>	The great circle on the celestial sphere whose plane passes through the sensible horizon and the center of the Earth. <i>The sun rose above the <b>horizon</b>.</i>
<b>lengthen</b>	Make or become longer. <i>In the spring when the days are <b>lengthening</b>.</i>
<b>magnification</b>	Making to seem more important than it really is. <i>This microscope should give a <b>magnification</b> of about 100.</i>
<b>outreach</b>	Stretch out one's arms. <i>The growth of evangelistic <b>outreach</b>.</i>
<u><b>over</b></u>	Over the entire area. <i>The car flipped <b>over</b>.</i>
<u><b>prevalence</b></u>	The ratio (for a given time period) of the number of occurrences of a disease or event to the number of units at risk in the population. <i>He was surprised by the <b>prevalence</b> of optimism about the future.</i>
<b>reach</b>	Reach a destination either real or abstract. <i>Outside the <b>reach</b> of the law.</i>



<b><u>scope</u></b>	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>Plato even maintains religion to be the chief aim and <b>scope</b> of human life.</i>
<b><u>side</u></b>	Spin given to the cue ball in snooker and billiards by hitting it on one side. <i>Her ability to put up with his disagreeable <b>side</b>.</i>
<b>stretch</b>	Extend or stretch out to a greater or the full length. <i>Her nap had <b>stretched</b> to two hours.</i>
<b>stretching</b>	Act of expanding by lengthening or widening.
<b>swell</b>	Very good. <i>She felt herself <b>swell</b> with pride.</i>
<b>widen</b>	Become broader or wider or more extensive. <i>We should <b>widen</b> the scope of our investigation.</i>
