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
**The synonyms of “Biblical” are: scriptural, fundamentalist, orthodox**

## **Biblical as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Biblical" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “biblical” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Resembling the language or style of the Bible.*
- *Very great; on a very large scale.*
- *Of or pertaining to or contained in or in accordance with the Bible.*
- *Relating to or contained in the Bible.*
- *In keeping with the nature of the Bible or its times or people.*



## Synonyms of "Biblical" as an adjective (3 Words)

- fundamentalist** Relating to or advocating strict adherence to the basic principles of any subject or discipline.  
*The **fundamentalist** ideologies of market and state.*
- orthodox** Of the ordinary or usual type; normal.  
*They avoided **orthodox** jazz venues.*
- scriptural** Of or pertaining to or contained in or in accordance with the Bible.  
***Scriptural** quotations from Genesis.*



## Usage Examples of "Biblical" as an adjective

- *Biblical times.*
- *We need rainfall of biblical proportions to bring us back to normal.*
- *Biblical Hebrew.*
- *There is a biblical cadence in the last words he utters.*

## Associations of "Biblical" (30 Words)

- apocalypse** A cosmic cataclysm in which God destroys the ruling powers of evil.  
*The **apocalypse** of World War II.*
- apocrypha** 14 books of the Old Testament included in the Vulgate (except for II Esdras) but omitted in Jewish and Protestant versions of the Bible; eastern Christian churches (except the Coptic Church) accept all these books as canonical; the Russ.
- apostle** Each of the twelve chief disciples of Jesus Christ.  
*An **apostle** of revolution.*
- archdeacon** An ecclesiastical dignitary usually ranking just below a bishop.
- canon** A general law, rule, principle, or criterion by which something is judged.  
*Legislation which enables the Church of England General Synod to provide by **canon** for women to be ordained.*

<b><u>cathedral</u></b>	The principal church of a diocese, with which the bishop is officially associated. <i>St Paul's <b>Cathedral</b>.</i>
<b><u>christian</u></b>	Relating to or characteristic of Christianity.
<b><u>church</u></b>	Take a woman who has recently given birth to church for a service of thanksgiving. <i>The <b>church</b> was largely rebuilt at the end of the 15th century.</i>
<b>clairvoyant</b>	A person who claims to have a supernatural ability to perceive events in the future or beyond normal sensory contact. <i>He didn't tell me about it and I'm not <b>clairvoyant</b>.</i>
<b>dean</b>	United States film actor whose moody rebellious roles made him a cult figure (1931-1955). <i>He is the <b>dean</b> of foreign correspondents.</i>
<b>deist</b>	Of or relating to deism.
<b>diocese</b>	The territorial jurisdiction of a bishop.
<b>doyen</b>	A man who is the senior member of a group. <i>He became the <b>doyen</b> of British physicists.</i>
<b>evangelist</b>	The writer of one of the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John). <i>An American television <b>evangelist</b>.</i>
<b>exegesis</b>	Critical explanation or interpretation of a text, especially of scripture. <i>The task of biblical <b>exegesis</b>.</i>
<b><u>exodus</u></b>	The departure of the Israelites from Egypt. <i>The annual <b>exodus</b> of sun seeking Canadians to Florida.</i>
<b>foretell</b>	Make a prediction about; tell in advance. <i>A seer had foretold that the earl would assume the throne.</i>
<b><u>goddess</u></b>	A woman who is greatly admired, especially for her beauty. <i>Athena Nike <b>goddess</b> of victory.</i>
<b>holy</b>	A sacred place of pilgrimage. <i>Saints and <b>holy</b> men.</i>
<b><u>interpretation</u></b>	An explanation of something that is not immediately obvious. <i>The report included his <b>interpretation</b> of the forensic evidence.</i>
<b>mythological</b>	Relating to, based on, or appearing in myths or mythology. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all <b>mythological</b> symbols.</i>
<b>oracle</b>	A response or message given by an oracle especially an ambiguous one. <i>He reigned supreme as the Colonial Office's <b>oracle</b> on Africa.</i>
<b>priestess</b>	A woman priest.

<b>prophecy</b>	Deliver a sermon. <i>Jacques was <b>prophecying</b> a bumper harvest.</i>
<b>prophet</b>	In Christian use the books of Isaiah Jeremiah Ezekiel Daniel and the twelve minor prophets. <i>He is repeatedly hailed as a <b>prophet</b> of modernism.</i>
<b>recitation</b>	A public instance of reciting or repeating (from memory) something prepared in advance. <i>The <b>recitation</b> of traditional poems.</i>
<b>scriptural</b>	From or relating to the Bible. <i><b>Scriptural</b> quotations from Genesis.</i>
<b>scripture</b>	The sacred writings of a religion other than Christianity. <i>Passages of <b>scripture</b>.</i>
<b>seer</b>	A person of supposed supernatural insight who sees visions of the future. <i>Our <b>seers</b> have grown gloomier about prospects for growth.</i>
<b>theology</b>	A particular system or school of religious beliefs and teachings. <i>In Christian <b>theology</b> God comes to be conceived as Father and Son.</i>
