## **Bibliography as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Bibliography" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “bibliography” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A list of the books of a specific author or publisher, or on a specific subject.*
- *A list of the books referred to in a scholarly work, typically printed as an appendix.*
- *The history or systematic description of books, their authorship, printing, publication, editions, etc.*
- *A list of writings with time and place of publication (such as the writings of a single author or the works referred to in preparing a document etc.*



## Synonyms of "Bibliography" as a noun (5 Words)

- book list** Physical objects consisting of a number of pages bound together.
- catalogue** A publication containing details of items for sale, especially one produced by a mail-order company.  
*A mail order **catalogue**.*
- list of books** A database containing an ordered array of items (names or topics).
- list of references** A database containing an ordered array of items (names or topics).
- record** Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events.  
***Record profits.***

## Usage Examples of "Bibliography" as a noun

- *A **bibliography** of his publications.*

## Associations of "Bibliography" (30 Words)

<b><u>annotate</u></b>	Add notes to (a text or diagram) giving explanation or comment. <i>The scholar <b>annotated</b> the early edition of a famous novel.</i>
<b>argot</b>	A characteristic language of a particular group (as among thieves). <i>Teenage <b>argot</b>.</i>
<b><u>bilingual</u></b>	A person who speaks two languages fluently. <i>A <b>bilingual</b> secretary.</i>
<b>buzzword</b>	A word or phrase, often an item of jargon, that is fashionable at a particular time or in a particular context. <i>The latest <b>buzzword</b> in international travel is ecotourism.</i>
<b>cant</b>	Heel over. <i>Herstories rather than histories as the <b>cant</b> phrase goes.</i>
<b>colloquialism</b>	The use of colloquialisms. <i>The <b>colloquialisms</b> of the streets.</i>
<b><u>compile</u></b>	Use a computer program to translate source code written in a particular programming language into computer-readable machine code that can be executed. <i>The figures were <b>compiled</b> from a survey of 2 000 schoolchildren.</i>
<b><u>dialect</u></b>	The usage or vocabulary that is characteristic of a specific group of people. <i>It has been said that a language is a <b>dialect</b> with an army and navy.</i>
<b>dictionary</b>	A book or electronic resource that lists the words of a language (typically in alphabetical order) and gives their meaning, or gives the equivalent words in a different language, often also providing information about pronunciation, origin, and usage. <i>The website gives access to an online <b>dictionary</b>.</i>
<b>euphemism</b>	A mild or indirect word or expression substituted for one considered to be too harsh or blunt when referring to something unpleasant or embarrassing. <i>The jargon has given us downsizing as a <b>euphemism</b> for cuts.</i>
<b>glossary</b>	An alphabetical list of words relating to a specific subject, text, or dialect, with explanations; a brief dictionary. <i>A <b>glossary</b> of Inuktitut words.</i>
<b><u>innuendo</u></b>	An allusive or oblique remark or hint, typically a suggestive or disparaging one. <i>She s always making sly <b>innuendoes</b>.</i>
<b>jargon</b>	A form of language regarded as barbarous, debased, or hybrid. <i>Legal <b>jargon</b>.</i>

<b>lexicographer</b>	A compiler or writer of a dictionary; a student of the lexical component of language.
<b>lexicon</b>	The complete set of meaningful units in a language. <i>The size of the English <b>lexicon</b>.</i>
<b>lingo</b>	A foreign language or local dialect. <i>It doesn't matter if you can't speak the <b>lingo</b>.</i>
<b>linguistic</b>	Relating to language or linguistics. <i><b>Linguistic</b> behavior.</i>
<b>literate</b>	A literate person. <i>Computer <b>literate</b>.</i>
<b>neologism</b>	A newly coined word or expression.
<b>neology</b>	The coining or use of new words or phrases; = "neologism".
<b>nomenclature</b>	The body or system of names used in a particular specialist field. <i>Biological <b>nomenclature</b>.</i>
<b>parlance</b>	A manner of speaking that is natural to native speakers of a language. <i>Medical <b>parlance</b>.</i>
<b>patois</b>	The jargon or informal speech used by a particular social group. <i>The nurse talked to me in a <b>patois</b> that even Italians would have had difficulty in understanding.</i>
<b>phonology</b>	The branch of linguistics that deals with systems of sounds (including or excluding phonetics), within a language or between different languages.
<b>slang</b>	Use slang or vulgar language. <i>Their speech was full of <b>slang</b> expressions.</i>
<b>terminology</b>	A system of words used to name things in a particular discipline. <i>Legal <b>terminology</b>.</i>
<b>translator</b>	A person who translates from one language into another, especially as a profession. <i>The <b>translator</b> of Hardy's poems into Icelandic.</i>
<b>vernacular</b>	(of architecture) concerned with domestic and functional rather than public or monumental buildings. <i><b>Vernacular</b> speakers.</i>
<b>vocabulary</b>	The words used in a particular subject or sphere of activity or on a particular occasion. <i>He had a wide <b>vocabulary</b>.</i>
<b>word</b>	The divine word of God the second person in the Trinity incarnate in Jesus. <i>He didn't say a <b>word</b> about it.</i>
