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Associations of "Bidden" (30 Words)

absentee	One that is absent or not in residence. <i>Absentee pupils.</i>
<u>absenteeism</u>	Habitual absence from work. <i>High levels of absenteeism caused by low job motivation.</i>
afresh	In a new or different way. <i>She left the job to start afresh.</i>
<u>anew</u>	In a new or different and typically more positive way. <i>Starting life anew in a fresh place.</i>
attendance	The act of being present (at a meeting or event etc). <i>She is being blamed for the museum s low attendances.</i>
auctioneer	A person who conducts auctions by accepting bids and declaring goods sold.
command	Be in command of. <i>A gruff voice commanded us to enter.</i>
conscienceless	Lacking a conscience. <i>Brash unprincipled and conscienceless.</i>
<u>consumerism</u>	The theory that an increasing consumption of goods is economically beneficial. <i>The growth of consumerism has led to many organizations improving their service to the customer.</i>
<u>covet</u>	Yearn to possess (something, especially something belonging to another). <i>She covets her sister s house.</i>
covetous	Having or showing a great desire to possess something belonging to someone else. <i>Jealous of his success and covetous of his possessions.</i>
<u>envious</u>	Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another’s advantages. <i>I m envious of their happiness.</i>

excessive	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i>Excessive charges.</i>
exorbitant	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Some hotels charge exorbitant rates for phone calls.</i>
<u>expensive</u>	Costing a lot of money. <i>Expensive clothes.</i>
grasping	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>They were regarded as grasping landlords.</i>
greed	Reprehensible acquisitiveness; insatiable desire for wealth (personified as one of the deadly sins). <i>The colonists greed for African land.</i>
hope	Grounds for feeling hopeful about the future. <i>He was their best hope for a victory.</i>
immoderate	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i>Immoderate laughter.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
<u>longing</u>	Prolonged unfulfilled desire or need. <i>Miranda felt a wistful longing for the old days.</i>
<u>morale</u>	The confidence, enthusiasm, and discipline of a person or group at a particular time. <i>The team's morale was high.</i>
point	Mark a psalm text to indicate the points at which the music changes. <i>The dog pointed the dead duck.</i>
request	The verbal act of requesting. <i>To have our ideas taken seriously is surely a reasonable request.</i>
starting	Bulging or protruding as with fear. <i>With eyes starting from their sockets.</i>
<u>unconscionable</u>	Unreasonably excessive. <i>Unconscionable spending.</i>
usurious	Relating to or characterized by usury; extortionate. <i>Usurious interest rate.</i>
want	Hunt or look for want for a particular reason. <i>I want to go home now.</i>
weariness	Extreme tiredness; fatigue. <i>Weariness overcame her after twelve hours and she fell asleep.</i>
