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## Associations of "Bidden" (30 Words)

<b>absentee</b>	One that is absent or not in residence. <i><b>Absentee</b> pupils.</i>
<a href="#"><u>absenteeism</u></a>	Habitual absence from work. <i>High levels of <b>absenteeism</b> caused by low job motivation.</i>
<b>afresh</b>	In a new or different way. <i>She left the job to start <b>afresh</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>anew</u></a>	In a new or different and typically more positive way. <i>Starting life <b>anew</b> in a fresh place.</i>
<b>attendance</b>	The act of being present (at a meeting or event etc). <i>She is being blamed for the museum s low <b>attendances</b>.</i>
<b>auctioneer</b>	A person who conducts auctions by accepting bids and declaring goods sold.
<b>command</b>	Be in command of. <i>A gruff voice <b>commanded</b> us to enter.</i>
<b>conscienceless</b>	Lacking a conscience. <i>Brash unprincipled and <b>conscienceless</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>consumerism</u></a>	The theory that an increasing consumption of goods is economically beneficial. <i>The growth of <b>consumerism</b> has led to many organizations improving their service to the customer.</i>
<a href="#"><u>covet</u></a>	Yearn to possess (something, especially something belonging to another). <i>She <b>covets</b> her sister s house.</i>
<b>covetous</b>	Having or showing a great desire to possess something belonging to someone else. <i>Jealous of his success and <b>covetous</b> of his possessions.</i>
<a href="#"><u>envious</u></a>	Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another’s advantages. <i>I m <b>envious</b> of their happiness.</i>

<b>excessive</b>	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i><b>Excessive</b> charges.</i>
<b>exorbitant</b>	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Some hotels charge <b>exorbitant</b> rates for phone calls.</i>
<b><u>expensive</u></b>	Costing a lot of money. <i><b>Expensive</b> clothes.</i>
<b>grasping</b>	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>They were regarded as <b>grasping</b> landlords.</i>
<b>greed</b>	Reprehensible acquisitiveness; insatiable desire for wealth (personified as one of the deadly sins). <i>The colonists <b>greed</b> for African land.</i>
<b>hope</b>	Grounds for feeling hopeful about the future. <i>He was their best <b>hope</b> for a victory.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i><b>Immoderate</b> laughter.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b><u>longing</u></b>	Prolonged unfulfilled desire or need. <i>Miranda felt a wistful <b>longing</b> for the old days.</i>
<b><u>morale</u></b>	The confidence, enthusiasm, and discipline of a person or group at a particular time. <i>The team's <b>morale</b> was high.</i>
<b>point</b>	Mark a psalm text to indicate the points at which the music changes. <i>The dog <b>pointed</b> the dead duck.</i>
<b>request</b>	The verbal act of requesting. <i>To have our ideas taken seriously is surely a reasonable <b>request</b>.</i>
<b>starting</b>	Bulging or protruding as with fear. <i>With eyes <b>starting</b> from their sockets.</i>
<b><u>unconscionable</u></b>	Unreasonably excessive. <i><b>Unconscionable</b> spending.</i>
<b>usurious</b>	Relating to or characterized by usury; extortionate. <i><b>Usurious</b> interest rate.</i>
<b>want</b>	Hunt or look for want for a particular reason. <i>I <b>want</b> to go home now.</i>
<b>weariness</b>	Extreme tiredness; fatigue. <i><b>Weariness</b> overcame her after twelve hours and she fell asleep.</i>
