- *(in bridge and whist) the action of stating before play how many tricks one intends to make.*
- *A request to be present.*
- *The ordering or requesting of someone to do something.*

auction	The part of the play in which players bid to decide the contract in which the hand shall be played. <i>The books are expected to fetch a six figure sum at tomorrow s auction.</i>
bid	An attempt to get something. <i>A takeover bid.</i>
bids	An authoritative direction or instruction to do something. <i>He made a bid to gain attention.</i>
call	A direction in a square dance given by the caller. <i>The salesman s call on a customer.</i>
<u>charge</u>	The price charged for some article or service. <i>Our standard charge for a letter is 25.</i>
command	The power or authority to command. <i>An officer took command.</i>
<u>decree</u>	The issuing of a decree. <i>The decree guaranteed freedom of assembly.</i>
demand	The act of demanding. <i>A series of demands for far reaching reforms.</i>

<u>dictate</u>	A guiding principle. <i>The dictates of reason.</i>
dictation	The activity of taking down a passage that is dictated by a teacher as a test of spelling, writing, or language skills. <i>He signed and mailed his dictation without bothering to read it.</i>
direction	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>He had a terrible sense of direction.</i>
injunction	A judicial order restraining a person from beginning or continuing an action threatening or invading the legal right of another, or compelling a person to carry out a certain act, e.g. to make restitution to an injured party. <i>Injunction were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i>
instruction	A code in a program which defines and carries out an operation. <i>Our instruction was carefully programmed.</i>
mandate	A document giving an official instruction or command. <i>He called an election to seek a mandate for his policies.</i>
offers	A usually brief attempt. <i>A generous offer of assistance.</i>
order	A thing made supplied or served as a result of an order. <i>She was admitted to hospital under a guardianship order.</i>
summons	A request to be present. <i>A summons for non payment of a parking ticket.</i>
tenders	A formal proposal to buy at a specified price.

auction	Sell or offer for sale at an auction. <i>The painting was auctioned at Christie's.</i>
auctioneer	Sell at an auction.
augmentation	An addition to a coat of arms granted as a mark of special honour. <i>The augmentation of the curriculum with new subjects.</i>
bidder	Someone who makes an offer. <i>She was the highest bidder for this rare portrait.</i>
<u>boom</u>	Make a resonant sound, like artillery. <i>Thunder boomed in the sky.</i>

buy	Be worth or be capable of buying. <i>Money can t buy happiness.</i>
efficiency	An action designed to achieve efficiency. <i>She did the work with great efficiency.</i>
<u>enlarge</u>	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>She enlarged the flower beds.</i>
<u>escalate</u>	Increase in extent or intensity. <i>The disturbance escalated into a full scale riot.</i>
growth	Something grown or growing. <i>The government aims to get growth back into the economy.</i>
haggle	Wrangle (over a price, terms of an agreement, etc). <i>Let s not haggle over a few dollars.</i>
improve	Make or become better. <i>Efforts to improve relations between the countries.</i>
increase	The amount by which something increases. <i>The boss finally increased her salary.</i>
increment	A regular increase in salary on an incremental scale. <i>All sizes from 4 30 mm in 1 mm increments.</i>
<u>inflated</u>	Enlarged beyond truth or reasonableness. <i>You have a very inflated opinion of your worth.</i>
<u>inflation</u>	Lack of elegance as a consequence of being pompous and puffed up with vanity. <i>Tax allowances and excise duties were increased in line with inflation.</i>
inflationary	Characterized by or tending to cause monetary inflation. <i>Succeeding governments tried to reduce inflationary pressures.</i>
price	Determine the price of. <i>He puts a high price on his services.</i>
productivity	The quality of being productive or having the power to produce. <i>Nutrient rich waters with high primary productivity.</i>
profitability	The degree to which a business or activity yields profit or financial gain. <i>Profitability may not improve until well into next year.</i>
purchaser	A person who buys. <i>One of the club s prospective purchasers.</i>
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>It was here that the brook had its rise.</i>

sell	An act of selling or attempting to sell something. <i>It was a hard sell.</i>
<u>soar</u>	Go or move upward. <i>The cost of living continued to soar.</i>
stagflation	Persistent high inflation combined with high unemployment and stagnant demand in a country's economy.
<u>surge</u>	Increase suddenly and powerfully. <i>An upsurge in violent crime.</i>
underbid	Bid (a hand of cards) at less than the strength of the hand warrants. <i>The average player underbids his small hands.</i>
<u>upsurge</u>	A sudden forceful flow. <i>An upsurge in vandalism and violent crime.</i>
wage	Carry on (a war or campaign). <i>Napoleon and Hitler waged war against all of Europe.</i>
wholesale	At a wholesale price. <i>The wholesale destruction of these animals by poachers.</i>
