### **Definitions of "Bide" as a verb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “bide” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Dwell.*
- *Remain or stay somewhere.*



## Synonyms of "Bide" as a verb (7 Words)

<b>abide</b>	Dwell. <i>Many unskilful Men do <b>abide</b> in our City of London.</i>
<b>remain</b>	Stay the same remain in a certain state. <i>A more intractable problem <b>remains</b>.</i>
<b>remain behind</b>	Stay the same; remain in a certain state.
<b>stay</b>	Stay put in a certain place. <i>Please <b>stay</b> the bloodshed.</i>
<b>stay behind</b>	Stay behind.
<b>stay put</b>	Stay put in a certain place.
<b>visit</b>	Pay a brief visit. <i>He shall <b>visit</b> earth in mercy.</i>

## Associations of "Bide" (30 Words)

<b>abide</b>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i>I said I would <b>abide</b> by their decision.</i>
<b>await</b>	(of an event or circumstance) be in store for (someone). <i>We <b>await</b> the proposals with impatience.</i>
<b>bear</b>	(of a vehicle or boat) convey (passengers or cargo). <i>I cannot <b>bear</b> his constant criticism.</i>
<b>delay</b>	The act of delaying inactivity resulting in something being put off until a later time. <i>The train was <b>delayed</b>.</i>
<b>devour</b>	Destroy completely. <i>More and more green space has been <b>devoured</b> by new sprawling estates.</i>
<b>domicile</b>	Law the residence where you have your permanent home or principal establishment and to where whenever you are absent you intend to return every person is compelled to have one and only one domicile at a time. <i>The tenant is <b>domiciled</b> in the United Kingdom.</i>
<b> dwell</b>	Inhabit or live in; be an inhabitant of. <i>This kind of fish <b>dwells</b> near the bottom of the ocean.</i>
<b> dweller</b>	A person or animal that lives in or at a specified place. <i>The majority of urban <b>dwellers</b> live in small apartments.</i>
<b>eagerly</b>	With eagerness; in an eager manner. <i>Fans of the show are <b>eagerly</b> awaiting the new season.</i>
<b>endurance</b>	The power to withstand hardship or stress. <i>She was close to the limit of her <b>endurance</b>.</i>
<b>endure</b>	Face and withstand with courage. <i>It seemed impossible that anyone could <b>endure</b> such pain.</i>
<b>forbear</b>	A person from whom you are descended. <i>He modestly <b>forbears</b> to include his own work.</i>
<b>habitant</b>	An inhabitant. <i>The <b>habitant</b> farmhouses of old Quebec.</i>
<b>hesitantly</b>	With hesitation; in a hesitant manner. <i>He speaks <b>hesitantly</b> and his voice is shaky.</i>

<b>hold</b>	Be capable of holding or containing. <i>He felt carefully with his feet for a <b>hold</b> and swung himself up.</i>
<b><u>inhabit</u></b>	Inhabit or live in be an inhabitant of. <i>Sweet memories <b>inhabit</b> this house.</i>
<b>inhabitant</b>	A person who fulfils the residential or legal requirements for being a member of a state or parish.
<b><u>lifelong</u></b>	Continuing through life. <i>From <b>lifelong</b> habit.</i>
<b>live</b>	Remain alive. <i>The race car driver <b>lived</b> through several very serious accidents.</i>
<b><u>living</u></b>	The condition of living or the state of being alive. <i>Flowers were for the <b>living</b>.</i>
<b>patience</b>	The capacity to accept or tolerate delay, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious. <i>I have run out of <b>patience</b> with her.</i>
<b>patiently</b>	With patience; in a patient manner. <i>The assembled hordes waited <b>patiently</b> to get in.</i>
<b>persevere</b>	Be persistent, refuse to stop. <i>His family <b>persevered</b> with his treatment.</i>
<b><u>persist</u></b>	Be persistent refuse to stop. <i>The child <b>persisted</b> and kept asking questions.</i>
<b>populate</b>	Form the population of (a place). <i>A cosy rural town <b>populated</b> with friendly folk.</i>
<b><u>reside</u></b>	(of a quality) be present or inherent in something. <i>The meaning of an utterance does not wholly <b>reside</b> in the semantic meaning.</i>
<b>stay</b>	Stay behind. <i>Tactics used to <b>stay</b> in power.</i>
<b>tarry</b>	Leave slowly and hesitantly. <i>A length of <b>tarry</b> rope.</i>
<b>uneasily</b>	With anxiety or apprehension. <i>His personality sits <b>uneasily</b> with his origins.</i>
<b>wait</b>	Serve as a waiter or waitress in a restaurant. <i>I had to <b>wait</b> my turn to play.</i>
