### **Definitions of "Billing" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “billing” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The fact of being advertised or described in a particular way.*
- *The total amount of business conducted in a given time, especially that of an advertising agency.*
- *Request for payment of a debt.*
- *The process of preparing or sending invoices.*



## Synonyms of "Billing" as a noun (1 Word)

**charge** The price charged for some article or service.  
*Our standard **charge** for a letter is 25.*



## Usage Examples of "Billing" as a noun

- *They can justify their billing as Premier League favourites.*
- *Faster, more accurate order fulfilment and billing.*
- *The account was worth about \$2 million a year in billings.*
- *He shared top billing with his wife.*



## Associations of "Billing" (30 Words)

<b>acceptor</b>	An acceptor atom forming a positive hole in a semiconductor. <i>Some microorganisms can use oxygen as an electron <b>acceptor</b>.</i>
<b>account</b>	The department of a company that deals with financial accounts. <i>I can't <b>account</b> for the missing money.</i>
<b>accrue</b>	Make provision for (a charge) at the end of a financial period for work that has been done but not yet invoiced. <i>They <b>accrue</b> entitlements to holiday pay.</i>
<b>annuitant</b>	A person who receives an annuity.
<b>appropriation</b>	Incorporation by joining or uniting. <i>Dishonest <b>appropriation</b> of property.</i>
<b>bill</b>	Send a bill to someone. <i>He was <b>billed</b> as the greatest tenor since Caruso.</i>
<b>buck</b>	Of a horse to perform a buck. <i>The yung filly <b>bucked</b>.</i>
<b>cash</b>	Exchange for cash. <i>A discount for <b>cash</b>.</i>

<b>charge</b>	Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>The battle began with a cavalry <b>charge</b>.</i>
<b>cheque</b>	A written order directing a bank to pay money. <i>Fees are payable by <b>cheque</b> or postal order.</i>
<b>deposit</b>	The natural process of laying down a deposit of something. <i>I had to <b>deposit</b> 10 of the price of the house.</i>
<b>disbursement</b>	The payment of money from a fund. <i>They established a committee to supervise the <b>disbursement</b> of aid.</i>
<b>due</b>	A payment that is due e.g. as the price of membership. <i>The cancellation of the concert was <b>due</b> to the rain.</i>
<b>expenditure</b>	An amount of money spent. <i>Cuts in public <b>expenditure</b>.</i>
<b>expense</b>	Charge something to an expense account. <i>Conference rooms were equipped at great <b>expense</b>.</i>
<b>fee</b>	A payment made to a professional person or to a professional or public body in exchange for advice or services. <i>They were faced with legal <b>fees</b> of 3000.</i>
<b>honorarium</b>	A payment given for professional services that are rendered nominally without charge.
<b>installment</b>	A payment of part of a debt; usually paid at regular intervals.
<b>invoice</b>	Send an invoice to someone. <i>She <b>invoiced</b> the company for her expenses.</i>
<b>mortgage</b>	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>I put down a hundred thousand in cash and took out a <b>mortgage</b> for the rest.</i>
<b>outlay</b>	An amount of money spent on something. <i>Comparatively little financial <b>outlay</b>.</i>
<b>payment</b>	The act of paying money. <i>A compensation <b>payment</b> of 2500.</i>
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
<b>receivable</b>	Amounts owed to a business, regarded as assets. <i>Accounts <b>receivable</b>.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	A sum paid to cover money that has been spent or lost. <i>The family received insurance <b>reimbursements</b>.</i>
<b>remittance</b>	The action of sending money in payment or as a gift. <i>Complete your booking form and send it together with your <b>remittance</b>.</i>
<b>spending</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money.

**surcharge**

Mark a postage stamp with a surcharge.  
*We guarantee that no **surcharges** will be added to the cost of your holiday.*

**tax**

Levy a tax on.  
*She knew that the ordeal to come must **tax** all her strength.*

**unpaid**

(of work or a period of leave) undertaken without payment.  
*She spent most of her time fulfilling the role of **unpaid** housekeeper.*
