Definitions of "Billing" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “billing” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The fact of being advertised or described in a particular way.*
- *The total amount of business conducted in a given time, especially that of an advertising agency.*
- *Request for payment of a debt.*
- *The process of preparing or sending invoices.*



Synonyms of "Billing" as a noun (1 Word)

charge The price charged for some article or service.
*Our standard **charge** for a letter is 25.*

- *They can justify their billing as Premier League favourites.*
- *Faster, more accurate order fulfilment and billing.*
- *The account was worth about \$2 million a year in billings.*
- *He shared top billing with his wife.*

| bill | Send a bill to someone. <i>He was billed as the greatest tenor since Caruso.</i> |

| charge | Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>The battle began with a cavalry charge.</i> |
| cheque | A written order directing a bank to pay money. <i>Fees are payable by cheque or postal order.</i> |
| deposit | The natural process of laying down a deposit of something. <i>I had to deposit 10 of the price of the house.</i> |
| disbursement | The payment of money from a fund. <i>They established a committee to supervise the disbursement of aid.</i> |
| due | A payment that is due e.g. as the price of membership. <i>The cancellation of the concert was due to the rain.</i> |
| expenditure | An amount of money spent. <i>Cuts in public expenditure.</i> |
| expense | Charge something to an expense account. <i>Conference rooms were equipped at great expense.</i> |
| fee | A payment made to a professional person or to a professional or public body in exchange for advice or services. <i>They were faced with legal fees of 3000.</i> |
| honorarium | A payment given for professional services that are rendered nominally without charge. |
| installment | A payment of part of a debt; usually paid at regular intervals. |
| invoice | Send an invoice to someone. <i>She invoiced the company for her expenses.</i> |
| mortgage | The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>I put down a hundred thousand in cash and took out a mortgage for the rest.</i> |
| outlay | An amount of money spent on something. <i>Comparatively little financial outlay.</i> |
| payment | The act of paying money. <i>A compensation payment of 2500.</i> |
| rates | A local tax on property (usually used in the plural). |
| receivable | Amounts owed to a business, regarded as assets. <i>Accounts receivable.</i> |
| reimbursement | A sum paid to cover money that has been spent or lost. <i>The family received insurance reimbursements.</i> |
| remittance | The action of sending money in payment or as a gift. <i>Complete your booking form and send it together with your remittance.</i> |
| spending | The act of spending or disbursing money. |

tax

Levy a tax on.
