blood	Violence involving bloodshed. <i>Blood carries oxygen and nutrients to the tissues and carries away waste products.</i>
bloodline	Ancestry of a purebred animal. <i>The herd has British bloodlines going back 200 years.</i>
breeding	The production of animals or plants by inbreeding or hybridization. <i>That s the kind of modesty you get from good breeding.</i>
childbirth	The parturition process in human beings; having a baby; the process of giving birth to a child. <i>Historically other women assisted women in childbirth.</i>
dawn	The earliest period. <i>It was the dawn of the Roman Empire.</i>
dawning	Dawn. <i>The dawnings of civilization.</i>
delivery	An item or items delivered on a particular occasion. <i>Allow up to 28 days for delivery.</i>
derivation	The process of deducing a new formula, theorem, etc., from previously accepted statements. <i>Singer from sing or undo from do are examples of derivations.</i>
descent	The descendants of one individual. <i>The settlers were of Cornish descent.</i>
emergence	The act of coming (or going) out; becoming apparent. <i>The parasite s eggs hatch synchronously with the emergence of the wasp larvae.</i>
extraction	The action of taking out something (especially using effort or force). <i>The dentist gave her a local anesthetic prior to the extraction.</i>
family	(biology) a taxonomic group containing one or more genera. <i>Sharks belong to the fish family.</i>
genealogy	Successive generations of kin. <i>The genealogies of the kings of Mercia.</i>
genesis	A coming into being. <i>This tale had its genesis in fireside stories.</i>

giving birth	The elasticity of something that can be stretched and returns to its original length.
heritage	That which is inherited; a title or property or estate that passes by law to the heir on the death of the owner. <i>Europe's varied cultural heritage.</i>
house	The people living in a house a household. <i>The house gets a percentage of every bet.</i>
line	Space for one line of print one column wide and 1 1/4 inch deep used to measure advertising. <i>That salesman must have practiced his fast line of talk.</i>
line of descent	A mark that is long relative to its width.
lineage	The descendants of one individual. <i>A Dutch nobleman of ancient lineage.</i>
nascence	The event of being born.
nascency	The event of being born.
nativity	A nativity play. <i>The place of my nativity.</i>
origin	The point or place where something begins, arises, or is derived. <i>The terminology has its origins in America.</i>
origins	The source of something's existence or from which it derives or is derived. <i>Vegetable origins.</i>
parentage	The state of being a parent. <i>This ice cream boasts American parentage.</i>
parturition	The action of giving birth to young; childbirth. <i>The weeks following parturition.</i>
pedigree	Ancestry of a purebred animal. <i>They are looking for animals with pedigrees.</i>
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>They asked for a 10 rise in rates.</i>
start	A turn to be a starter in a game at the beginning. <i>The starting signal was a green light.</i>
stock	Farm animals such as cattle pigs and sheep bred and kept for their meat or milk livestock. <i>Government gilt edged stock.</i>

consanguineous	Relating to or denoting people descended from the same ancestor. <i>Consanguineous marriages may give rise to recessive syndromes.</i>

contraception	<p>The deliberate use of artificial methods or other techniques to prevent pregnancy as a consequence of sexual intercourse. The major forms of artificial contraception are barrier methods of which the commonest is the condom or sheath, the contraceptive pill which contains synthetic sex hormones which prevent ovulation in the female, intrauterine devices such as the coil which prevent the fertilized ovum from implanting in the uterus and male or female sterilization.</p> <p><i>One of the most important methods of contraception.</i></p>
contraceptive	<p>An agent or device intended to prevent conception.</p> <p><i>We'd been making love without contraceptives for months.</i></p>
delivery	<p>The act of delivering or distributing something (as goods or mail).</p> <p><i>Her delivery was stilted.</i></p>
disinfection	<p>Treatment to destroy harmful microorganisms.</p> <p><i>Instruments must undergo high level disinfection before reuse.</i></p>
embryo	<p>The part of a seed which develops into a plant, consisting in the mature embryo of a higher plant of a plumule, a radicle and one or two cotyledons.</p> <p><i>A simple commodity economy is merely the embryo of a capitalist economy.</i></p>
eugenic	<p>Relating to or derived from eugenics.</p> <p><i>Past eugenic policies placed restrictions on marriage and immigration.</i></p>
euthanasia	<p>The painless killing of a patient suffering from an incurable and painful disease or in an irreversible coma.</p>
german	<p>Germane.</p>
heredity	<p>A person's ancestry.</p> <p><i>The relative influence of heredity and environment.</i></p>
illegitimate	<p>A person who is illegitimate by birth.</p> <p><i>An illegitimate seizure of power.</i></p>
infertility	<p>The state of being unable to produce offspring; in a woman it is an inability to conceive; in a man it is an inability to impregnate.</p> <p><i>Chlamydia can cause infertility in women.</i></p>
italian	<p>Of or pertaining to or characteristic of Italy or its people or culture or language.</p>
miscarriage	<p>An unsuccessful outcome of something planned.</p> <p><i>The miscarriage of the project.</i></p>
origin	<p>The place where something begins, where it springs into being.</p> <p><i>The terminology has its origins in America.</i></p>

parentage	The kinship relation of an offspring to the parents. <i>A boy of Jamaican parentage.</i>
parturition	The action of giving birth to young; childbirth. <i>The weeks following parturition.</i>
pregnancy	The state of being pregnant; the period from conception to birth when a woman carries a developing fetus in her uterus. <i>A straightforward pregnancy.</i>
<u>son</u>	Used by an older person as a form of address for a boy or young man. <i>One of Norfolk's most famous sons.</i>
spaniard	A native or inhabitant of Spain.
sterility	(of non-living objects) the state of being free of pathogenic organisms. <i>The sterility of debate in the party.</i>
sterilization	Surgery to make a person or animal unable to produce offspring. <i>Disinfection and sterilization of surgical equipment.</i>
