<b>bloodline</b>	Ancestry of a purebred animal. <i>The herd has British <b>bloodlines</b> going back 200 years.</i>
<b>breeding</b>	The production of animals or plants by inbreeding or hybridization. <i>That s the kind of modesty you get from good <b>breeding</b>.</i>
<b>childbirth</b>	The parturition process in human beings; having a baby; the process of giving birth to a child. <i>Historically other women assisted women in <b>childbirth</b>.</i>
<b>dawn</b>	The earliest period. <i>It was the <b>dawn</b> of the Roman Empire.</i>
<b>dawning</b>	Dawn. <i>The <b>dawnings</b> of civilization.</i>
<b>delivery</b>	An item or items delivered on a particular occasion. <i>Allow up to 28 days for <b>delivery</b>.</i>
<b>derivation</b>	The process of deducing a new formula, theorem, etc., from previously accepted statements. <i>Singer from sing or undo from do are examples of <b>derivations</b>.</i>
<b>descent</b>	The descendants of one individual. <i>The settlers were of Cornish <b>descent</b>.</i>
<b>emergence</b>	The act of coming (or going) out; becoming apparent. <i>The parasite s eggs hatch synchronously with the <b>emergence</b> of the wasp larvae.</i>
<b>extraction</b>	The action of taking out something (especially using effort or force). <i>The dentist gave her a local anesthetic prior to the <b>extraction</b>.</i>
<b>family</b>	(biology) a taxonomic group containing one or more genera. <i>Sharks belong to the fish <b>family</b>.</i>
<b>genealogy</b>	Successive generations of kin. <i>The <b>genealogies</b> of the kings of Mercia.</i>
<b>genesis</b>	A coming into being. <i>This tale had its <b>genesis</b> in fireside stories.</i>

<b>giving birth</b>	The elasticity of something that can be stretched and returns to its original length.
<b>heritage</b>	That which is inherited; a title or property or estate that passes by law to the heir on the death of the owner. <i>Europe s varied cultural <b>heritage</b>.</i>
<b>house</b>	The people living in a house a household. <i>The <b>house</b> gets a percentage of every bet.</i>
<b>line</b>	Space for one line of print one column wide and 1 14 inch deep used to measure advertising. <i>That salesman must have practiced his fast <b>line</b> of talk.</i>

<b>contraception</b>	<p>The deliberate use of artificial methods or other techniques to prevent pregnancy as a consequence of sexual intercourse. The major forms of artificial contraception are barrier methods of which the commonest is the condom or sheath, the contraceptive pill which contains synthetic sex hormones which prevent ovulation in the female, intrauterine devices such as the coil which prevent the fertilized ovum from implanting in the uterus and male or female sterilization.</p> <p><i>One of the most important methods of <b>contraception</b>.</i></p>
<b>contraceptive</b>	<p>An agent or device intended to prevent conception.</p> <p><i>We'd been making love without <b>contraceptives</b> for months.</i></p>
<b>delivery</b>	<p>The act of delivering or distributing something (as goods or mail).</p> <p><i>Her <b>delivery</b> was stilted.</i></p>
<b>disinfection</b>	<p>Treatment to destroy harmful microorganisms.</p> <p><i>Instruments must undergo high level <b>disinfection</b> before reuse.</i></p>
<b>embryo</b>	<p>The part of a seed which develops into a plant consisting in the mature embryo of a higher plant of a plumule, a radicle and one or two cotyledons.</p> <p><i>A simple commodity economy is merely the <b>embryo</b> of a capitalist economy.</i></p>
<b>eugenic</b>	<p>Relating to or derived from eugenics.</p> <p><i>Past <b>eugenic</b> policies placed restrictions on marriage and immigration.</i></p>

<b>infertility</b>	<p>The state of being unable to produce offspring; in a woman it is an inability to conceive; in a man it is an inability to impregnate.</p> <p><i>Chlamydia can cause <b>infertility</b> in women.</i></p>
<b>italian</b>	<p>Of or pertaining to or characteristic of Italy or its people or culture or language.</p>
<b>miscarriage</b>	<p>An unsuccessful outcome of something planned.</p> <p><i>The <b>miscarriage</b> of the project.</i></p>
<b>origin</b>	<p>The place where something begins, where it springs into being.</p> <p><i>The terminology has its <b>origins</b> in America.</i></p>

<b>parentage</b>	The kinship relation of an offspring to the parents. <i>A boy of Jamaican <b>parentage</b>.</i>
<b>parturition</b>	The action of giving birth to young; childbirth. <i>The weeks following <b>parturition</b>.</i>
<b>pregnancy</b>	The state of being pregnant; the period from conception to birth when a woman carries a developing fetus in her uterus. <i>A straightforward <b>pregnancy</b>.</i>
<b>son</b>	Used by an older person as a form of address for a boy or young man. <i>One of Norfolk s most famous <b>sons</b>.</i>
<b>spaniard</b>	A native or inhabitant of Spain.
<b>sterility</b>	(of non-living objects) the state of being free of pathogenic organisms. <i>The <b>sterility</b> of debate in the party.</i>
<b>sterilization</b>	Surgery to make a person or animal unable to produce offspring. <i>Disinfection and <b>sterilization</b> of surgical equipment.</i>
