- *The day of a person's birth.*
- *The anniversary of the day on which a person was born, typically treated as an occasion for celebration and the giving of gifts.*
- *The anniversary of something's origin or foundation.*

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| <b>celebratory</b>        | Used or intended to publicly acknowledge a significant or happy day or event.<br><i>The scowl was replaced by <b>celebratory</b> smiles for the seven time series champion.</i>      |
| <b>centenary</b>          | The 100th anniversary (or the celebration of it).<br><i>The stunning vitality of a musician who is nearing his <b>centenary</b>.</i>   |
| <b>centennial</b>         | Of or relating to or completing a period of 100 years.<br><i>The show is a celebration of the museum s <b>centennial</b>.</i>  |
| <b>ceremonial</b>         | Relating to or used for formal religious or public events.<br><i>A <b>ceremonial</b> occasion.</i>   |
| <b>ceremony</b>           | A formal religious or public occasion, especially one celebrating a particular event, achievement, or anniversary.<br><i>He makes a <b>ceremony</b> of addressing his golf ball.</i> |
| <u><b>commemorate</b></u> | Recall and show respect for (someone or something).<br><i>This sculpture <b>commemorates</b> the victims of the concentration camps.</i>   |
| <b>commemorative</b>      | Acting as a memorial of an event or person.<br><i>A <b>commemorative</b> plaque.</i>   |
| <b>congratulate</b>       | Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement.<br><i>She <b>congratulated</b> herself on her powers of deduction.</i>   |
| <b>congratulation</b>     | The action of expressing congratulations.<br><i><b>Congratulations</b> on a job well done.</i>   |
| <u><b>feast</b></u>       | Provide a feast or banquet for.<br><i>The Thanksgiving <b>feast</b>.</i>   |
| <b>gala</b>               | A gay festivity.<br><i>A <b>gala</b> performance by the Royal Ballet.</i>  |
| <b>gift</b>               | Present someone with a gift or gifts.<br><i>The goalkeeper <b>gifted</b> Liverpool their last minute winner.</i>   |
| <u><b>invitation</b></u>  | The action of inviting someone to go somewhere or to do something.<br><i>She threw the <b>invitation</b> away.</i>   |
| <u><b>memorial</b></u>    | A structure erected to commemorate persons or events.<br><i>A <b>memorial</b> to General Robert E Lee.</i>   |
| <b>memorialize</b>        | Be or provide a memorial to a person or an event.<br><i>We <b>memorialized</b> the Dead.</i>   |
| <u><b>observance</b></u>  | The act of noticing or paying attention.<br><i>The baby s motionless <b>observance</b> of me.</i>  |
| <b>potlatch</b>           | Hold a potlatch.   |

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| <b>reminder</b>     | A thing that causes someone to remember something.<br><i>He ignored his wife s <b>reminders</b>.</i>   |
| <b>revelry</b>      | Unrestrained merrymaking.<br><i>Sounds of <b>revelry</b> issued into the night.</i>  |
| <b>semiannual</b>   | Occurring or payable twice each year.  |
| <b>sixteenth</b>    | One part in sixteen equal parts.   |
| <b>tercentenary</b> | The 300th anniversary (or the celebration of it).<br><i>His <b>tercentenary</b> year.</i>  |
| <b>thanksgiving</b> | (in North America) an annual national holiday marked by religious observances and a traditional meal. The holiday commemorates a harvest festival celebrated by the Pilgrim Fathers in 1621, and is held in the US on the fourth Thursday in November. A similar holiday is held in Canada, usually on the second Monday in October.<br><i>He offered prayers in <b>thanksgiving</b> for his safe arrival.</i> |
| <b>triennial</b>    | Occurring every third year or lasting 3 years.<br><i>The <b>triennial</b> meeting of the Association.</i>  |
