- *A moment in the theatre when the lights on stage are suddenly dimmed.*
- *A temporary loss of consciousness.*
- *A momentary loss of consciousness.*
- *Dark curtains put up in windows to cover lights during an air raid.*
- *A period when all lights must be turned out or covered to prevent them being seen by the enemy during an air raid.*
- *Darkness resulting from the extinction of lights (as in a city invisible to enemy aircraft).*
- *Partial or total loss of memory.*
- *The failure of electric power for a general region.*
- *A suspension of radio or tv broadcasting.*
- *A temporary loss of memory during a period of alcohol intoxication.*
- *A suppression of information, especially one imposed on the media by government.*

<b>amnesia</b>	Partial or total loss of memory. <i>They were suffering from <b>amnesia</b>.</i>
<b>brownout</b>	A reduction in or restriction on the availability of electrical power in a particular area. <i>The cities are experiencing <b>brownouts</b> as air conditioners are switched into overdrive.</i>
<b><u>censorship</u></b>	Counterintelligence achieved by banning or deleting any information of value to the enemy. <i>The regulation imposes <b>censorship</b> on all media.</i>
<b><u>collapse</u></b>	A sudden failure of an institution or undertaking. <i>He suffered a <b>collapse</b> from overwork.</i>
<b><u>coma</u></b>	A prolonged state of deep unconsciousness, caused especially by severe injury or illness. <i>She went into a <b>coma</b>.</i>
<b>dimout</b>	Darkness resulting from the extinction of lights (as in a city invisible to enemy aircraft).
<b>electricity failure</b>	Keen and shared excitement.
<b><u>faint</u></b>	A spontaneous loss of consciousness caused by insufficient blood to the brain. <i>She hit the floor in a dead <b>faint</b>.</i>
<b>fainting fit</b>	A spontaneous loss of consciousness caused by insufficient blood to the brain.
<b>loss of consciousness</b>	Euphemistic expressions for death.
<b>memory loss</b>	The cognitive processes whereby past experience is remembered.
<b>passing out</b>	The motion of one object relative to another.
<b>period of oblivion</b>	The interval taken to complete one cycle of a regularly repeating phenomenon.
<b>power cut</b>	Possession of the qualities (especially mental qualities) required to do something or get something done.
<b>power failure</b>	A very wealthy or powerful businessman.
<b>reporting restrictions</b>	The news as presented by reporters for newspapers or radio or television.
<b>silence</b>	The avoidance of mentioning or discussing something. <i>She was reduced to <b>silence</b> for a moment.</i>

**suppression**

The restraint or repression of an idea, activity, or reaction by something more powerful.

A **suppression** of the newspaper.

**swoon**

A spontaneous loss of consciousness caused by insufficient blood to the brain.

I fell down in a **swoon**.



## Usage Examples of "Blackout" as a noun

- *The total information blackout on the series of meetings.*
- *I never was drunk to the point that I had a blackout.*
- *She peered out through the blackout curtains.*

### **breakdown**

A mental or physical breakdown.  
***Breakdowns** could totally disrupt production.*

<b>colander</b>	A perforated bowl used to strain off liquid from food after washing or cooking.
<a href="#">computer</a>	A person who makes calculations, especially with a calculating machine.
<b>connect</b>	Connect fasten or put together two or more pieces. <i>By 1892 most of the village had been <b>connected</b> to the mains.</i>
<b>cordless</b>	A cordless phone. <i>I keep the <b>cordless</b> with me at all times.</i>
<b>curfew</b>	The time that the curfew signal is sounded. <i>The whole area was immediately placed under <b>curfew</b>.</i>
<b>cyberspace</b>	A computer network consisting of a worldwide network of computer networks that use the TCP/IP network protocols to facilitate data transmission and exchange. <i>I stayed in <b>cyberspace</b> for just a few minutes.</i>
<b>dawn</b>	The earliest period. <i>It started to <b>dawn</b> and we had to get up.</i>
<b>electricity</b>	The supply of electric current to a building for heating, lighting, or powering appliances. <i>The regional <b>electricity</b> companies.</i>
<b>enmesh</b>	Involve (someone) in a difficult situation from which it is hard to escape. <i>Whales <b>enmeshed</b> in drift nets.</i>
<a href="#">generator</a>	Someone who originates or causes or initiates something. <i>He was the <b>generator</b> of several complaints.</i>
<b>gossamer</b>	So thin as to transmit light. <i><b>Gossamer</b> cobwebs.</i>
<b>interlock</b>	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>A dress in soft <b>interlock</b>.</i>
<b>interlocking</b>	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>An <b>interlocking</b> of arms by the police held the crowd in check.</i>
<a href="#">internet</a>	A computer network consisting of a worldwide network of computer networks that use the TCP/IP network protocols to facilitate data transmission and exchange. <i>An <b>internet</b> connection.</i>

<b>interweave</b>	Blend closely. <i>Wordsworth's political ideas are often interwoven with his philosophical and religious beliefs.</i>
<b><u>mesh</u></b>	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>A 100 <b>mesh</b> screen.</i>
<b>momentary</b>	Lasting for a very short time; brief. <i>A <b>momentary</b> lapse of concentration.</i>
<b>net</b>	Net curtains. <i>Wales did find the <b>net</b> in the 32nd minute.</i>
<b>network</b>	Connect as or operate with a network. <i>A support <b>network</b>.</i>
<b><u>night</u></b>	The darkness of night. <i>He was not allowed to go out on weekday <b>nights</b>.</i>
<b>online</b>	By means of the internet or other computer network. <i>The new power plant will go <b>online</b> this month.</i>
<b>outage</b>	A temporary suspension of operation (as of computers). <i>There will be a network <b>outage</b> from 8 to 10 a m.</i>
<b>seine</b>	Catch fish with a seine. <i>A <b>seine</b> boat.</i>
<b>strict</b>	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. <i><b>Strict</b> standards.</i>
<b>telecommunication</b>	The branch of technology concerned with telecommunication. <i>The <b>telecommunications</b> market.</i>
<b><u>web</u></b>	The flattened weblike part of a feather consisting of a series of barbs on either side of the shaft. <i>The trees cast a delicate <b>web</b> of shadows over the lawn.</i>
<b>wireless</b>	A radio. <i><b>Wireless</b> broadband.</i>
