Definitions of "Blase" as an adjective

- *Uninterested because of frequent exposure or indulgence.*
- *Very sophisticated especially because of surfeit; versed in the ways of the world.*
- *Nonchalantly unconcerned.*

Synonyms of "Blase" as an adjective (2 Words)

bored Uninterested because of frequent exposure or indulgence.
*John was soon **bored** to tears with the work.*

worldly (of a person) experienced and sophisticated.
*She was much more **worldly** than Nora and dismissed the slur.*

Usage Examples of "Blase" as an adjective

- *The blase traveler refers to the ocean he has crossed as `the pond.*
- *His blase indifference.*
- *A petulant blase air.*
- *A blase attitude about housecleaning.*

Associations of "Blase" (30 Words)

<u>apathetic</u>	Showing little or no emotion or animation. <i>An apathetic electorate.</i>
blithe	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>A blithe seaside comedy.</i>
bored	Tired of the world. <i>John was soon bored to tears with the work.</i>
callous	Make insensitive or callous deaden feelings or morals. <i>Calloused skin.</i>
<u>casual</u>	A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism. <i>She designs women's casuals.</i>
<u>crass</u>	(of persons) so unrefined as to be lacking in discrimination and sensibility. <i>An act of crass stupidity.</i>
detached	(of a house or other building) not joined to another on either side. <i>She may be detached or even unfeeling but at least she's not hypocritically effusive.</i>
<u>dismissive</u>	Showing indifference or disregard. <i>Chronic fatigue syndrome was known by the dismissive term housewife syndrome.</i>
dispirited	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>A dispirited and resigned expression on her face.</i>
exhausted	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>The day's shopping left her exhausted.</i>
impassive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>His cold impassive face.</i>
inattentive	Failing to attend to the comfort or wishes of others. <i>Inattentive students.</i>
indifference	The trait of remaining calm and seeming not to care; a casual lack of concern. <i>It cannot be regarded as a matter of indifference.</i>
indifferent	Neither too great nor too little. <i>Indifferent to the sufferings of others.</i>
<u>insensitive</u>	Deficient in human sensibility; not mentally or morally sensitive. <i>She was remarkably insensitive to pain.</i>

insouciant	Showing a casual lack of concern. <i>An insouciant shrug.</i>
lackadaisical	Idle or indolent especially in a dreamy way. <i>She was annoyingly lackadaisical and impractical.</i>
lazy	Showing a lack of care. <i>Up a lazy river.</i>
listless	Lacking zest or vivacity. <i>He was listless and bored.</i>
nonchalant	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>Drove his car with nonchalant abandon.</i>
prolixity	Boring verbosity.
regardless	(usually followed by `of') without due thought or consideration. <i>He carried on regardless of the difficulties.</i>
sleepy	(of a place) without much activity. <i>Beginning to feel sleepy.</i>
stoic	Pertaining to Stoicism or its followers. <i>Stoic courage.</i>
tire	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>Automobile tires are usually made of rubber and filled with compressed air.</i>
tired	(especially of a statement or idea) boring or uninteresting because overfamiliar. <i>Too tired to eat.</i>
unconcerned	Not occupied or engaged with. <i>The prisoner seems entirely unconcerned as to the outcome of the examination.</i>
uninterested	Not interested in or concerned about something or someone. <i>An uninterested spectator.</i>
unmolested	Not pestered or molested; left in peace. <i>They allowed him to pass unmolested.</i>
untroubled	Free from fear or doubt; easy in mind. <i>An untroubled gaze.</i>
