## Blase as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Blase" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “blase” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Uninterested because of frequent exposure or indulgence.*
- *Very sophisticated especially because of surfeit; versed in the ways of the world.*
- *Nonchalantly unconcerned.*

### Synonyms of "Blase" as an adjective (2 Words)

**bored** Uninterested because of frequent exposure or indulgence.  
*John was soon **bored** to tears with the work.*

**worldly** (of a person) experienced and sophisticated.  
*She was much more **worldly** than Nora and dismissed the slur.*

### Usage Examples of "Blase" as an adjective

- *The blase traveler refers to the ocean he has crossed as `the pond.*
- *His blase indifference.*
- *A petulant blase air.*
- *A blase attitude about housecleaning.*

<b><u>apathetic</u></b>	Showing little or no emotion or animation. <i>An <b>apathetic</b> electorate.</i>
<b>blithe</b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>A <b>blithe</b> seaside comedy.</i>
<b>bored</b>	Tired of the world. <i>John was soon <b>bored</b> to tears with the work.</i>
<b>callous</b>	Make insensitive or callous deaden feelings or morals. <i><b>Calloused</b> skin.</i>
<b><u>casual</u></b>	A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism. <i>She designs women's <b>casuals</b>.</i>
<b><u>crass</u></b>	(of persons) so unrefined as to be lacking in discrimination and sensibility. <i>An act of <b>crass</b> stupidity.</i>
<b>detached</b>	(of a house or other building) not joined to another on either side. <i>She may be <b>detached</b> or even unfeeling but at least she's not hypocritically effusive.</i>
<b><u>dismissive</u></b>	Showing indifference or disregard. <i>Chronic fatigue syndrome was known by the <b>dismissive</b> term housewife syndrome.</i>
<b>dispirited</b>	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>A <b>dispirited</b> and resigned expression on her face.</i>
<b>exhausted</b>	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>The day's shopping left her <b>exhausted</b>.</i>
<b>impassive</b>	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>His cold <b>impassive</b> face.</i>
<b>inattentive</b>	Failing to attend to the comfort or wishes of others. <i><b>Inattentive</b> students.</i>
<b>indifference</b>	The trait of remaining calm and seeming not to care; a casual lack of concern. <i>It cannot be regarded as a matter of <b>indifference</b>.</i>
<b>indifferent</b>	Neither too great nor too little. <i><b>Indifferent</b> to the sufferings of others.</i>
<b><u>insensitive</u></b>	Deficient in human sensibility; not mentally or morally sensitive. <i>She was remarkably <b>insensitive</b> to pain.</i>

<b>insouciant</b>	Showing a casual lack of concern. <i>An <b>insouciant</b> shrug.</i>
<b>lackadaisical</b>	Idle or indolent especially in a dreamy way. <i>She was annoyingly <b>lackadaisical</b> and impractical.</i>
<b>lazy</b>	Showing a lack of care. <i>Up a <b>lazy</b> river.</i>
<b>listless</b>	Lacking zest or vivacity. <i>He was <b>listless</b> and bored.</i>
<b>nonchalant</b>	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>Drove his car with <b>nonchalant</b> abandon.</i>
<b>prolixity</b>	Boring verbosity.
<b>regardless</b>	(usually followed by `of') without due thought or consideration. <i>He carried on <b>regardless</b> of the difficulties.</i>
<b>sleepy</b>	(of a place) without much activity. <i>Beginning to feel <b>sleepy</b>.</i>
<b>stoic</b>	Pertaining to Stoicism or its followers. <i><b>Stoic</b> courage.</i>
<b>tire</b>	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>Automobile <b>tires</b> are usually made of rubber and filled with compressed air.</i>
<b>tired</b>	(especially of a statement or idea) boring or uninteresting because overfamiliar. <i>Too <b>tired</b> to eat.</i>
<b>unconcerned</b>	Not occupied or engaged with. <i>The prisoner seems entirely <b>unconcerned</b> as to the outcome of the examination.</i>
<b>uninterested</b>	Not interested in or concerned about something or someone. <i>An <b>uninterested</b> spectator.</i>
<b>unmolested</b>	Not pestered or molested; left in peace. <i>They allowed him to pass <b>unmolested</b>.</i>
<b>untroubled</b>	Free from fear or doubt; easy in mind. <i>An <b>untroubled</b> gaze.</i>
