- *Grossly irreverent toward what is held to be sacred.*
- *Sacrilegious against God or sacred things; profane.*

### Synonyms of "Blasphemous" as an adjective (10 Words)

<b>blue</b>	Of a bird or other animal having blue markings. <i>Lonely and <b>blue</b> in a strange city.</i>
<b>disrespectful</b>	Showing a lack of respect or courtesy; impolite. <i><b>Disrespectful</b> in the presence of his parents.</i>
<b>godless</b>	Profane; wicked. <i>A sceptical <b>godless</b> society.</i>
<b>impious</b>	(of a person or act) wicked. <i><b>Impious</b> toward one s parents.</i>
<b>irreligious</b>	Indifferent or hostile to religion, or having no religious beliefs. <i>An <b>irreligious</b> man.</i>

<b><u>irreverent</u></b>	Showing a lack of respect for people or things that are generally taken seriously. <i>A certain <b>irreverent</b> gaiety and ease of manner.</i>
<b><u>profane</u></b>	(of language) blasphemous or obscene. <i>A talk that tackled topics both sacred and <b>profane</b>.</i>
<b>sacrilegious</b>	Involving or committing sacrilege. <i>A <b>sacrilegious</b> act.</i>
<b>ungodly</b>	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i><b>Ungodly</b> lives of lust and pleasure.</i>
<b><u>unholy</u></b>	Used to emphasize how bad something is; dreadful. <i>A father killing his son is an act against nature <b>unholy</b> and loathsome.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Blasphemous" as an adjective

## Associations of "Blasphemous" (30 Words)

<b>caitiff</b>	Despicably mean and cowardly. <i>A <b>caitiff</b> knight.</i>
<b>corrupt</b>	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>Spoke a <b>corrupted</b> version of the language.</i>
<b>debauch</b>	The practice of excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs. <i>Patrick looked utterly untouched by the previous night's <b>debauch</b>.</i>
<b><u>demonic</u></b>	Fiercely energetic or frenzied. <i>A <b>demonic</b> hurry.</i>
<b>deprave</b>	Make (someone) immoral or wicked. <i>This book would <b>deprave</b> and corrupt young children.</i>
<b><u>desecrate</u></b>	Treat (a sacred place or thing) with violent disrespect. <i>Many lanes are <b>desecrated</b> with yellow lines.</i>
<b>despicable</b>	Deserving hatred and contempt. <i>A <b>despicable</b> crime.</i>
<b>evil</b>	Of a force or spirit embodying or associated with the forces of the devil. <i><b>Evil</b> deeds.</i>

<b>flippant</b>	Not showing a serious or respectful attitude. <i>A <b>flippant</b> remark.</i>
<b>heinous</b>	Extremely wicked, deeply criminal. <i>A battery of <b>heinous</b> crimes.</i>
<b>impertinent</b>	Not pertinent to a particular matter; irrelevant. <i>Talk of rhetoric and strategy is <b>impertinent</b> to this process.</i>
<b>impious</b>	Lacking due respect or dutifulness. <i>The emperor's <b>impious</b> attacks on the Church.</i>
<b>iniquitous</b>	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. <i><b>Iniquitous</b> deeds.</i>
<b>insolent</b>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>She hated the <b>insolent</b> tone of his voice.</i>
<b>irreverent</b>	Not revering god. <i><b>Irreverent</b> scholars mocking sacred things.</i>
<b>lewd</b>	Driven by lust; preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i>She began to gyrate to the music and sing a <b>lewd</b> song.</i>
<b>libel</b>	Defame someone by publishing a libel. <i>She sued two newspapers for <b>libel</b>.</i>
<b>nauseating</b>	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>The stench was <b>nauseating</b>.</i>
<b>nefarious</b>	(typically of an action or activity) wicked or criminal. <i><b>Nefarious</b> schemes.</i>
<b>odious</b>	Extremely unpleasant; repulsive. <i>Consequences <b>odious</b> to those you govern.</i>
<b>pert</b>	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>She had a <b>pert</b> nose and deep blue eyes.</i>
<b>profane</b>	Not holy because unconsecrated or impure or defiled. <i>He was an agnostic a <b>profane</b> man.</i>
<b>ransack</b>	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>Burglars <b>ransacked</b> her home.</i>
<b>sacrilegious</b>	Grossly irreverent toward what is held to be sacred. <i>A <b>sacrilegious</b> act.</i>
<b>sinister</b>	Evil or criminal. <i>Bar <b>sinister</b>.</i>
<b>ungodly</b>	Irreligious or immoral. <i><b>Ungodly</b> lives of lust and pleasure.</i>

- vicious**      Marked by deep ill will; deliberately harmful.  
***Vicious** kicks.*
- villainous**    Relating to, constituting, or guilty of wicked or criminal behaviour.  
*A **villainous** smell.*
- wicked**        Morally bad in principle or practice.  
*Despite the sun the wind outside was **wicked**.*
