- *Grossly irreverent toward what is held to be sacred.*
- *Sacrilegious against God or sacred things; profane.*

Synonyms of "Blasphemous" as an adjective (10 Words)

blue	Of a bird or other animal having blue markings. <i>Lonely and blue in a strange city.</i>
disrespectful	Showing a lack of respect or courtesy; impolite. <i>Disrespectful in the presence of his parents.</i>
godless	Profane; wicked. <i>A sceptical godless society.</i>
impious	(of a person or act) wicked. <i>Impious toward one s parents.</i>
irreligious	Indifferent or hostile to religion, or having no religious beliefs. <i>An irreligious man.</i>

<u>irreverent</u>	Showing a lack of respect for people or things that are generally taken seriously. <i>A certain irreverent gaiety and ease of manner.</i>
<u>profane</u>	(of language) blasphemous or obscene. <i>A talk that tackled topics both sacred and profane.</i>
sacrilegious	Involving or committing sacrilege. <i>A sacrilegious act.</i>
ungodly	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i>Ungodly lives of lust and pleasure.</i>
<u>unholy</u>	Used to emphasize how bad something is; dreadful. <i>A father killing his son is an act against nature unholy and loathsome.</i>

Associations of "Blasphemous" (30 Words)

caitiff	Despicably mean and cowardly. <i>A caitiff knight.</i>
corrupt	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>Spoke a corrupted version of the language.</i>
debauch	The practice of excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs. <i>Patrick looked utterly untouched by the previous night's debauch.</i>
<u>demonic</u>	Fiercely energetic or frenzied. <i>A demonic hurry.</i>
deprave	Make (someone) immoral or wicked. <i>This book would deprave and corrupt young children.</i>
<u>desecrate</u>	Treat (a sacred place or thing) with violent disrespect. <i>Many lanes are desecrated with yellow lines.</i>
despicable	Deserving hatred and contempt. <i>A despicable crime.</i>
evil	Of a force or spirit embodying or associated with the forces of the devil. <i>Evil deeds.</i>

flippant	Not showing a serious or respectful attitude. <i>A flippant remark.</i>
heinous	Extremely wicked, deeply criminal. <i>A battery of heinous crimes.</i>
impertinent	Not pertinent to a particular matter; irrelevant. <i>Talk of rhetoric and strategy is impertinent to this process.</i>
impious	Lacking due respect or dutifulness. <i>The emperor's impious attacks on the Church.</i>
iniquitous	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. <i>Iniquitous deeds.</i>
insolent	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>She hated the insolent tone of his voice.</i>
irreverent	Not revering god. <i>Irreverent scholars mocking sacred things.</i>
lewd	Driven by lust; preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i>She began to gyrate to the music and sing a lewd song.</i>
libel	Defame someone by publishing a libel. <i>She sued two newspapers for libel.</i>
nauseating	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>The stench was nauseating.</i>
nefarious	(typically of an action or activity) wicked or criminal. <i>Nefarious schemes.</i>
odious	Extremely unpleasant; repulsive. <i>Consequences odious to those you govern.</i>
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>She had a pert nose and deep blue eyes.</i>
profane	Not holy because unconsecrated or impure or defiled. <i>He was an agnostic a profane man.</i>
ransack	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>Burglars ransacked her home.</i>
sacrilegious	Grossly irreverent toward what is held to be sacred. <i>A sacrilegious act.</i>
sinister	Evil or criminal. <i>Bar sinister.</i>
ungodly	Irreligious or immoral. <i>Ungodly lives of lust and pleasure.</i>

vicious	Marked by deep ill will; deliberately harmful. <i>Vicious kicks.</i>
villainous	Relating to, constituting, or guilty of wicked or criminal behaviour. <i>A villainous smell.</i>
wicked	Morally bad in principle or practice. <i>Despite the sun the wind outside was wicked.</i>
