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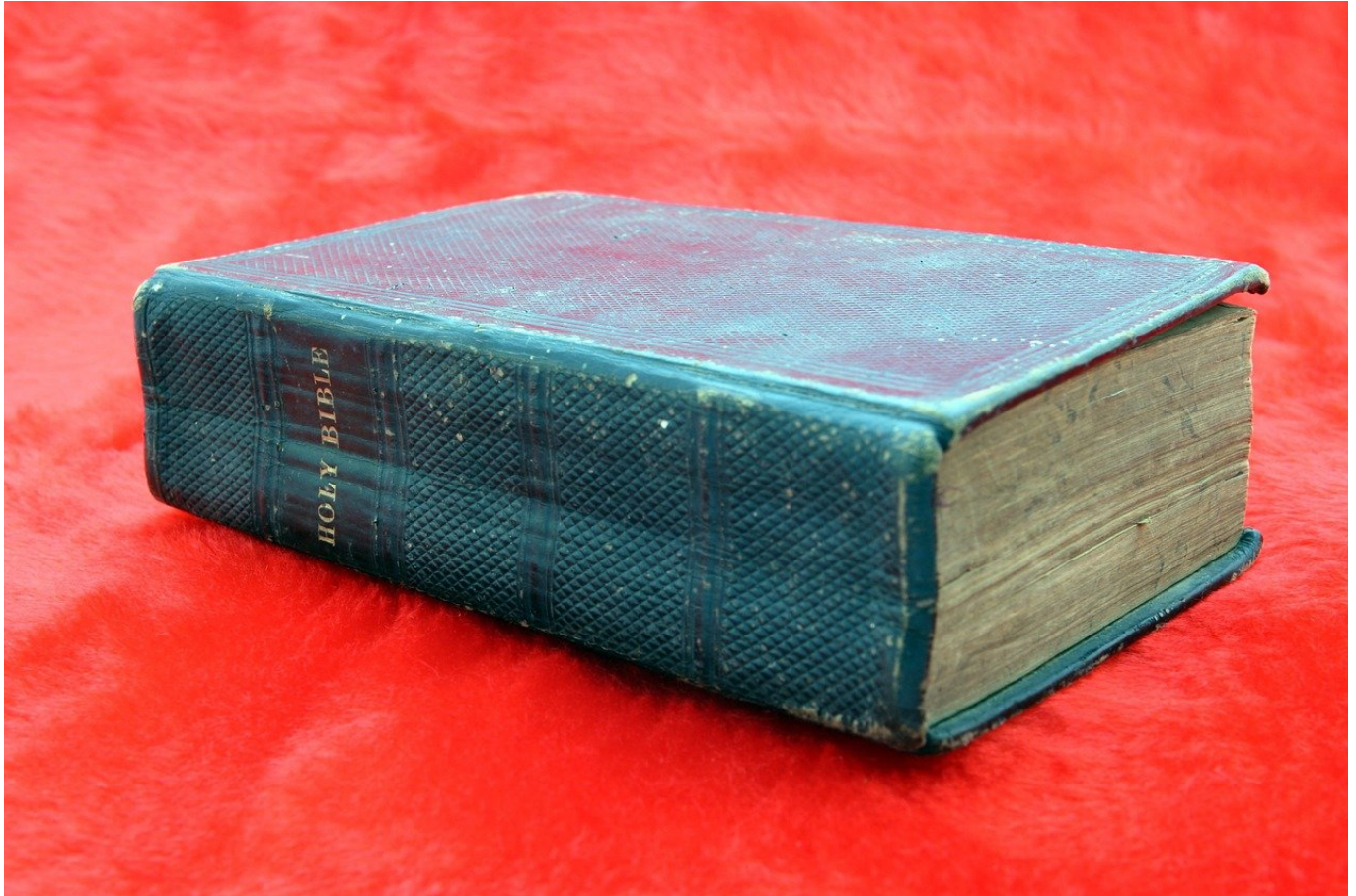

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “blasphemy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

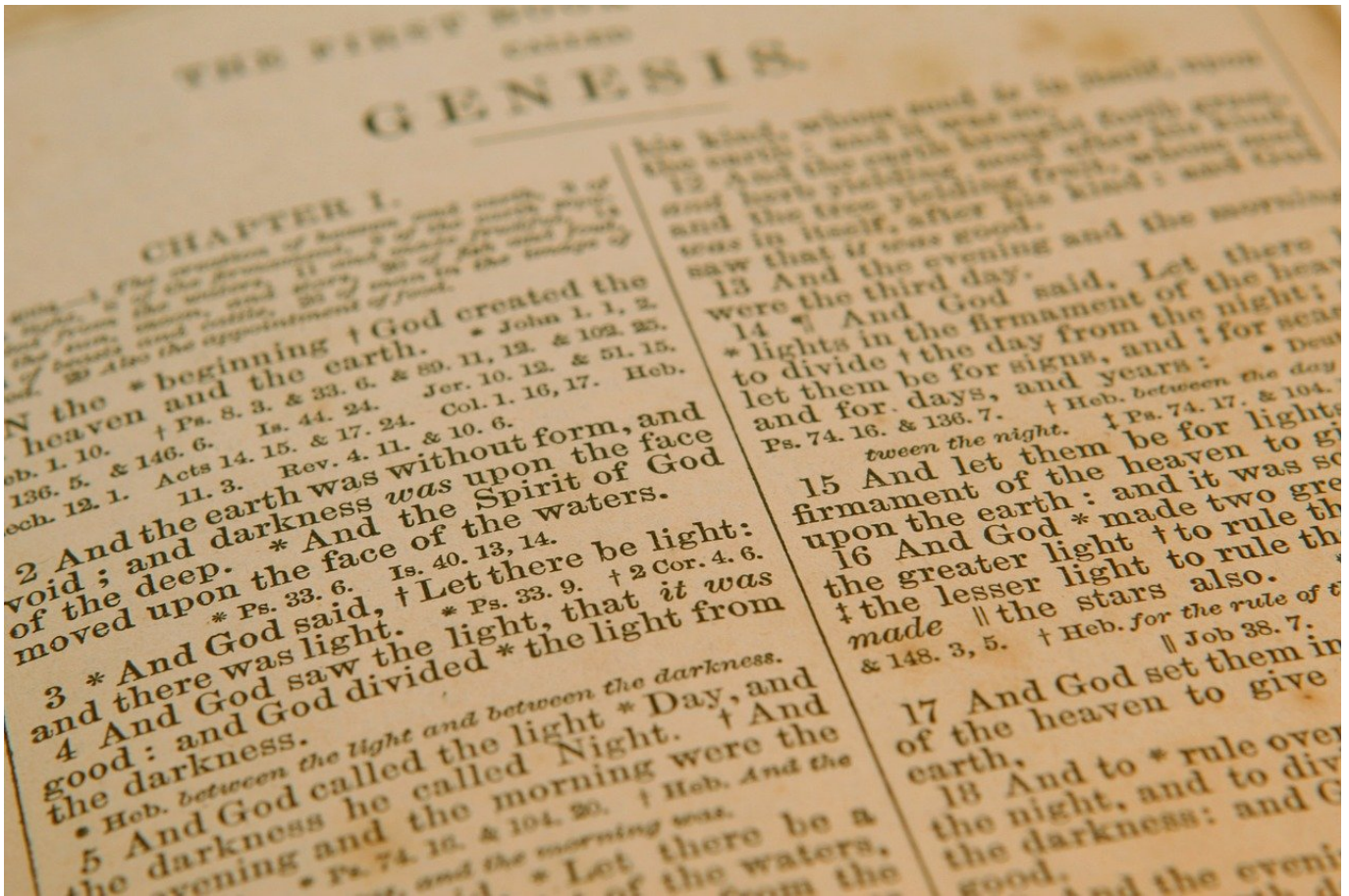
- *The action or offence of speaking sacrilegiously about God or sacred things; profane talk.*

## Synonyms of "Blasphemy" as a noun (16 Words)

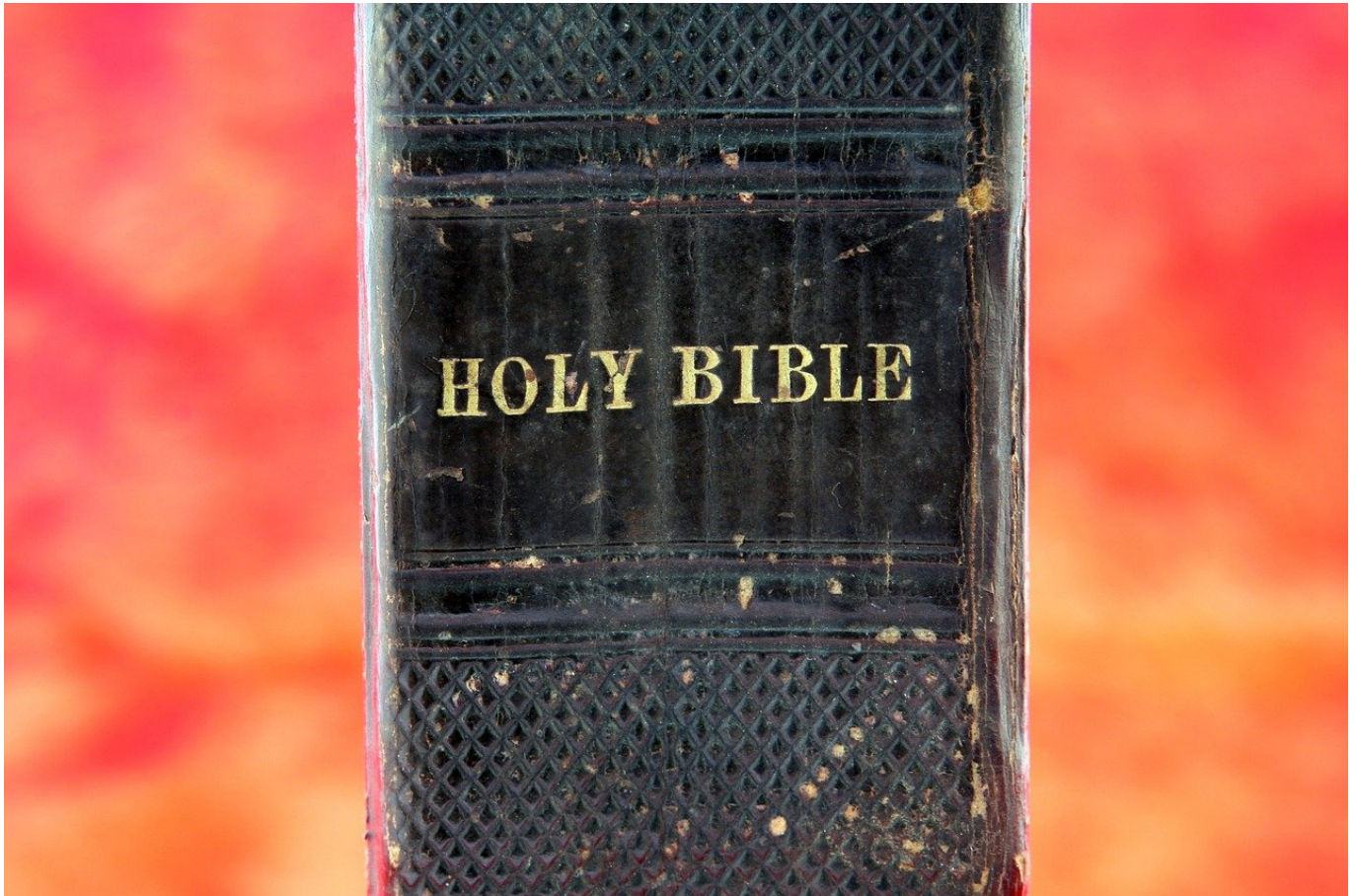
<b>curse</b>	A severe affliction. <i>She d put a <b>curse</b> on him.</i>
<b>cursing</b>	Something causing misery or death.
<b>desecration</b>	Blasphemous behavior; the act of depriving something of its sacred character. <i>The <b>desecration</b> of a grave.</i>
<b>disrespect</b>	A manner that is generally disrespectful and contemptuous. <i>Growing <b>disrespect</b> for the rule of law.</i>
<b>impiety</b>	Lack of piety or reverence. <i>He blamed the fall of the city on the <b>impiety</b> of the people.</i>
<b>impiousness</b>	Unrighteousness by virtue of lacking respect for a god.
<b>irreligiousness</b>	The quality of not being devout.

<b>irreverence</b>	A lack of respect for people or things that are generally taken seriously. <i>An attitude of <b>irreverence</b> towards politicians.</i>
<b>profanation</b>	Degradation of something worthy of respect; cheapening.
<b>profaneness</b>	Unholiness by virtue of being profane.
<b>profanity</b>	Irreligious or irreverent behaviour. <i>An outburst of <b>profanity</b>.</i>
<b>sacrilege</b>	Violation or misuse of what is regarded as sacred. <i>Putting ecclesiastical vestments to secular use was considered <b>sacrilege</b>.</i>
<b>swearing</b>	The use of offensive language. <i>There s a lot of <b>swearing</b> in the show.</i>
<b>taking the lord's name in vain</b>	The act of someone who picks up or takes something.
<b>ungodliness</b>	Impiety by virtue of not being a godly person.
<b>unholiness</b>	The quality of being unholy.



## Usage Examples of "Blasphemy" as a noun

- *He was detained on charges of blasphemy.*
- *He was screaming incomprehensible blasphemies.*



## Associations of "Blasphemy" (30 Words)

- blaspheme** Utter obscenities or profanities.  
*He has **blasphemed** against the Holy Spirit.*
- calumniate** Charge falsely or with malicious intent; attack the good name and reputation of someone.  
*He has been **calumniating** the Crown and all the conservative decencies.*
- calumny** A false accusation of an offense or a malicious misrepresentation of someone's words or actions.  
*A bitter struggle marked by **calumny** and litigation.*

<b>criticize</b>	Find fault with; express criticism of; point out real or perceived flaws. <i>The opposition <b>criticized</b> the government s failure to consult adequately.</i>
<b>curse</b>	Invoke or use a curse against. <i>She d put a <b>curse</b> on him.</i>
<b>decry</b>	Publicly denounce. <i>They <b>decry</b>ed human rights abuses.</i>
<b>defamation</b>	A false accusation of an offense or a malicious misrepresentation of someone's words or actions. <i>She sued him for <b>defamation</b>.</i>
<b>disparaging</b>	Expressive of low opinion. <i><b>Disparaging</b> remarks about council houses.</i>
<b>ecumenism</b>	The principle or aim of promoting unity among the world's Christian Churches.
<b>heresy</b>	Any opinions or doctrines at variance with the official or orthodox position. <i>Huss was burned for <b>heresy</b>.</i>
<b>impiety</b>	Unrighteousness by virtue of lacking respect for a god. <i>He blamed the fall of the city on the <b>impiety</b> of the people.</i>
<b>irreverence</b>	A disrespectful act. <i>An attitude of <b>irreverence</b> towards politicians.</i>
<b>libel</b>	Defame someone by publishing a libel. <i>If a ship does you any injury you <b>libel</b> the ship.</i>
<b>obloquy</b>	Strong public condemnation. <i>Conduct to which no more <b>obloquy</b> could reasonably attach.</i>
<b>opprobrium</b>	A state of extreme dishonor- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>The name was a by word of scorn and <b>opprobrium</b> throughout the city.</i>
<b>rail</b>	Short for railway. <i>The goods train left the <b>rails</b>.</i>
<b>reproach</b>	In the Roman Catholic Church a set of antiphons and responses for Good Friday representing the reproaches of Christ to his people. <i>Words of <b>reproach</b>.</i>
<b>revile</b>	Spread negative information about. <i>He was now <b>reviled</b> by the party that he had helped to lead.</i>
<b>sacrilege</b>	Violation or misuse of what is regarded as sacred. <i>Putting ecclesiastical vestments to secular use was considered <b>sacrilege</b>.</i>
<b>sacrosanct</b>	Must be kept sacred. <i>The individual s right to work has been upheld as <b>sacrosanct</b>.</i>

<b><u>sanctity</u></b>	The state or quality of being holy, sacred, or saintly. <i>The site of the tomb was a place of <b>sanctity</b> for the ancient Egyptians.</i>
<b><u>satire</u></b>	A play novel film or other work which uses satire. <i>A number of articles on Elizabethan <b>satire</b>.</i>
<b><u>scold</u></b>	A person who nags or grumbles constantly (typically used of a woman). <i>His mother was the village <b>scold</b>.</i>
<b>sedition</b>	Conduct or speech inciting people to rebel against the authority of a state or monarch.
<b><u>slander</u></b>	Words falsely spoken that damage the reputation of another. <i>He is suing the TV company for <b>slander</b>.</i>
<b>swear</b>	An offensive word used especially to express anger a swear word. <i>I asked him if he would <b>swear</b> a statement to this effect.</i>
<b><u>tirade</u></b>	A speech of violent denunciation. <i>A <b>tirade</b> of abuse.</i>
<b>tortious</b>	Of or pertaining to the nature of a tort. <i><b>Tortious</b> liability.</i>
<b>vilification</b>	A rude expression intended to offend or hurt. <i>The widespread <b>vilification</b> of politicians.</i>
<b>vilify</b>	Spread negative information about. <i>He has been vilified in the press.</i>
