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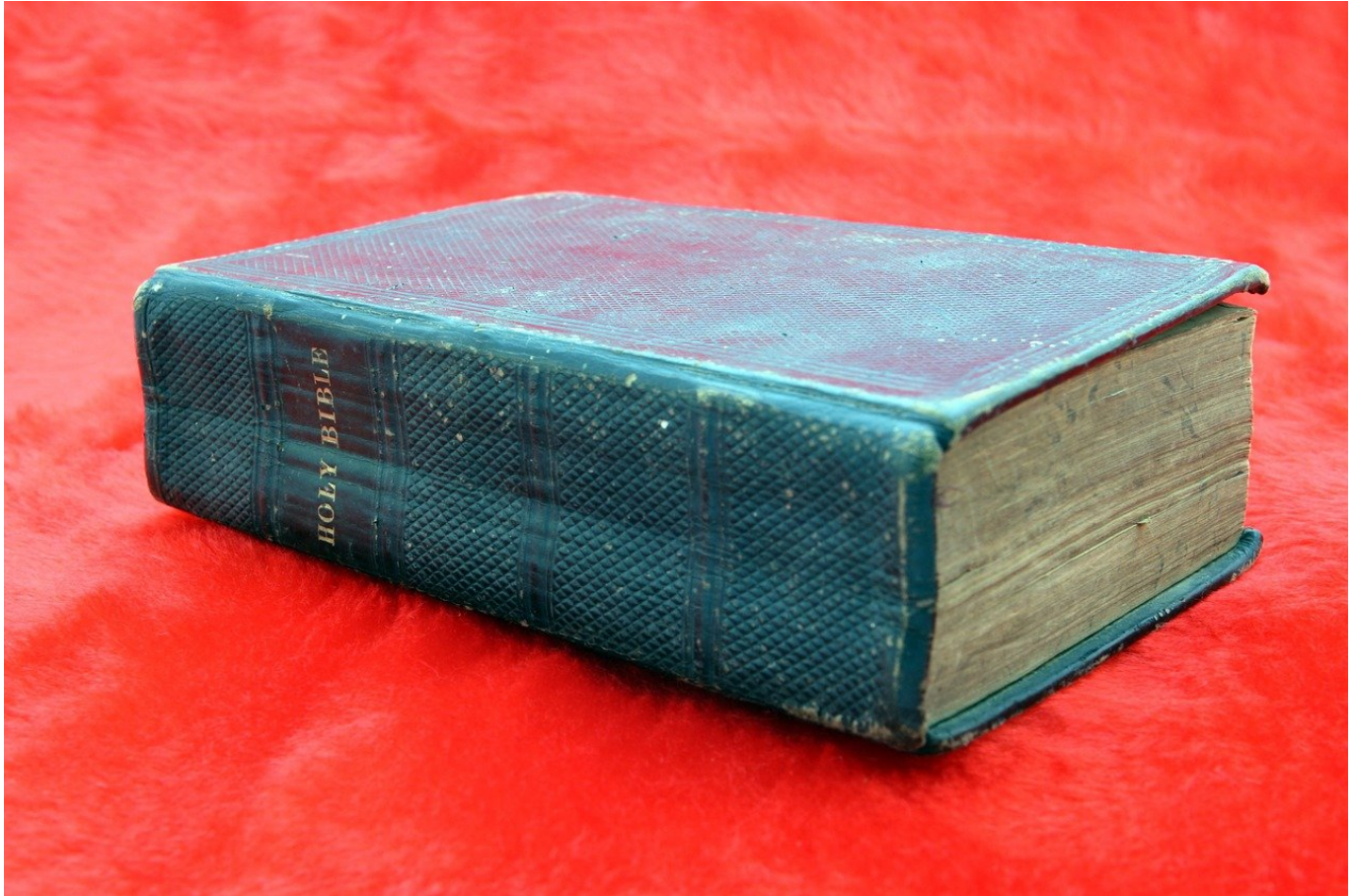

Definitions of "Blasphemy" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “blasphemy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The action or offence of speaking sacrilegiously about God or sacred things; profane talk.*
- *Blasphemous language (expressing disrespect for God or for something sacred).*
- *Blasphemous behavior; the act of depriving something of its sacred character.*

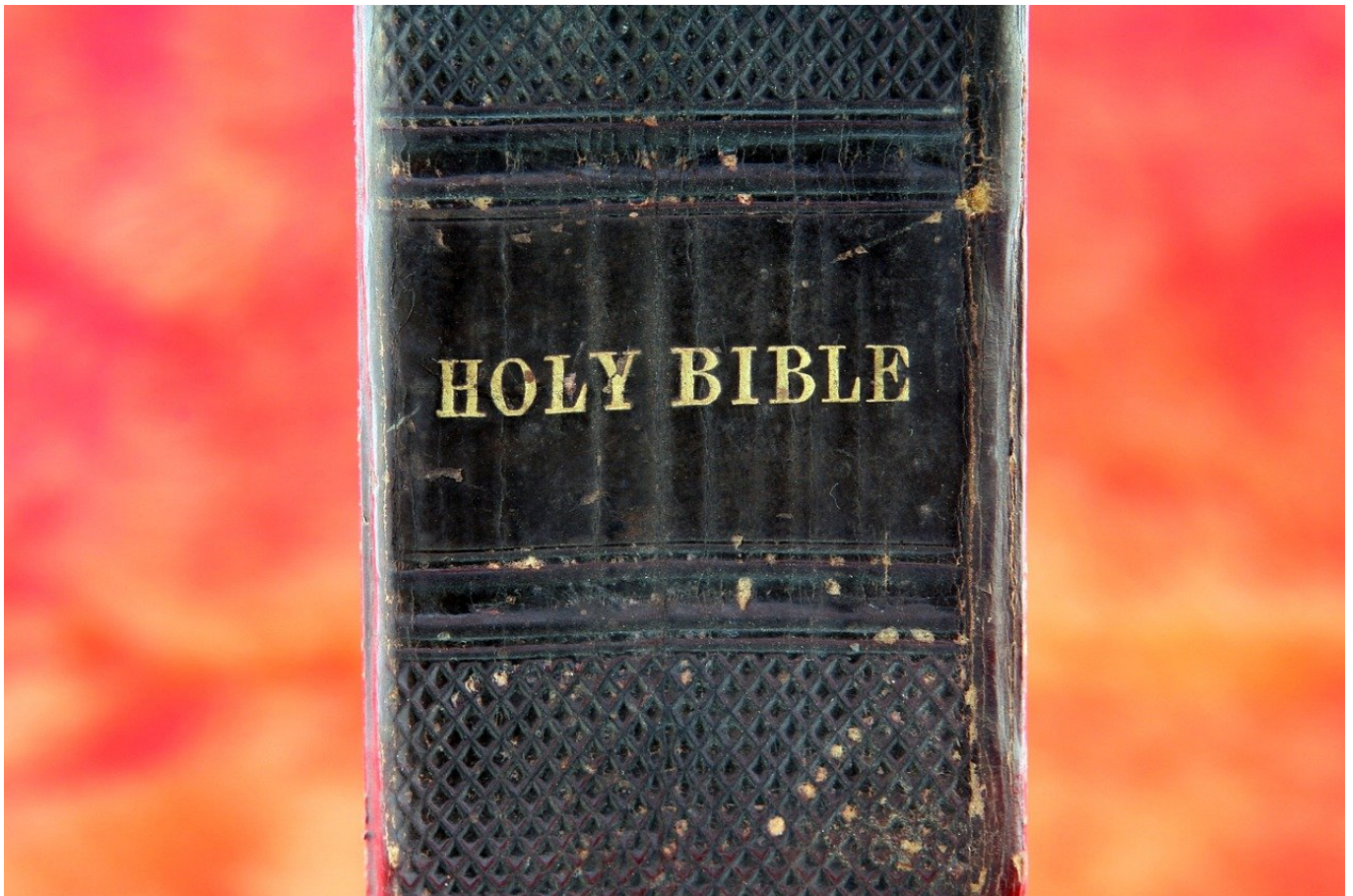


Synonyms of "Blasphemy" as a noun (16 Words)

curse	A severe affliction. <i>She d put a curse on him.</i>
cursing	Something causing misery or death.
desecration	Blasphemous behavior; the act of depriving something of its sacred character. <i>The desecration of a grave.</i>
disrespect	A manner that is generally disrespectful and contemptuous. <i>Growing disrespect for the rule of law.</i>
impiety	Lack of piety or reverence. <i>He blamed the fall of the city on the impiety of the people.</i>
impiousness	Unrighteousness by virtue of lacking respect for a god.
irreligiousness	The quality of not being devout.

Usage Examples of "Blasphemy" as a noun

- *He was detained on charges of blasphemy.*
- *He was screaming incomprehensible blasphemies.*



Associations of "Blasphemy" (30 Words)

- blaspheme** Utter obscenities or profanities.
*He has **blasphemed** against the Holy Spirit.*
- calumniate** Charge falsely or with malicious intent; attack the good name and reputation of someone.
*He has been **calumniating** the Crown and all the conservative decencies.*
- calumny** A false accusation of an offense or a malicious misrepresentation of someone's words or actions.
*A bitter struggle marked by **calumny** and litigation.*

criticize	Find fault with; express criticism of; point out real or perceived flaws. <i>The opposition criticized the government s failure to consult adequately.</i>
curse	Invoke or use a curse against. <i>She d put a curse on him.</i>
decry	Publicly denounce. <i>They decryed human rights abuses.</i>
defamation	A false accusation of an offense or a malicious misrepresentation of someone's words or actions. <i>She sued him for defamation.</i>
disparaging	Expressive of low opinion. <i>Disparaging remarks about council houses.</i>
ecumenism	The principle or aim of promoting unity among the world's Christian Churches.
heresy	Any opinions or doctrines at variance with the official or orthodox position. <i>Huss was burned for heresy.</i>
impiety	Unrighteousness by virtue of lacking respect for a god. <i>He blamed the fall of the city on the impiety of the people.</i>
irreverence	A disrespectful act. <i>An attitude of irreverence towards politicians.</i>
libel	Defame someone by publishing a libel. <i>If a ship does you any injury you libel the ship.</i>
obloquy	Strong public condemnation. <i>Conduct to which no more obloquy could reasonably attach.</i>
opprobrium	A state of extreme dishonor- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>The name was a by word of scorn and opprobrium throughout the city.</i>
rail	Short for railway. <i>The goods train left the rails.</i>
reproach	In the Roman Catholic Church a set of antiphons and responses for Good Friday representing the reproaches of Christ to his people. <i>Words of reproach.</i>
revile	Spread negative information about. <i>He was now reviled by the party that he had helped to lead.</i>
sacrilege	Violation or misuse of what is regarded as sacred. <i>Putting ecclesiastical vestments to secular use was considered sacrilege.</i>
sacrosanct	Must be kept sacred. <i>The individual s right to work has been upheld as sacrosanct.</i>

<u>sanctity</u>	The state or quality of being holy, sacred, or saintly. <i>The site of the tomb was a place of sanctity for the ancient Egyptians.</i>
<u>satire</u>	A play novel film or other work which uses satire. <i>A number of articles on Elizabethan satire.</i>
<u>scold</u>	A person who nags or grumbles constantly (typically used of a woman). <i>His mother was the village scold.</i>
sedition	Conduct or speech inciting people to rebel against the authority of a state or monarch.
<u>slander</u>	Words falsely spoken that damage the reputation of another. <i>He is suing the TV company for slander.</i>
swear	An offensive word used especially to express anger a swear word. <i>I asked him if he would swear a statement to this effect.</i>
<u>tirade</u>	A speech of violent denunciation. <i>A tirade of abuse.</i>
tortious	Of or pertaining to the nature of a tort. <i>Tortious liability.</i>
vilification	A rude expression intended to offend or hurt. <i>The widespread vilification of politicians.</i>
vilify	Spread negative information about. <i>He has been vilified in the press.</i>
