- *Causing injury or blight; especially affecting with sudden violence or plague or ruin.*



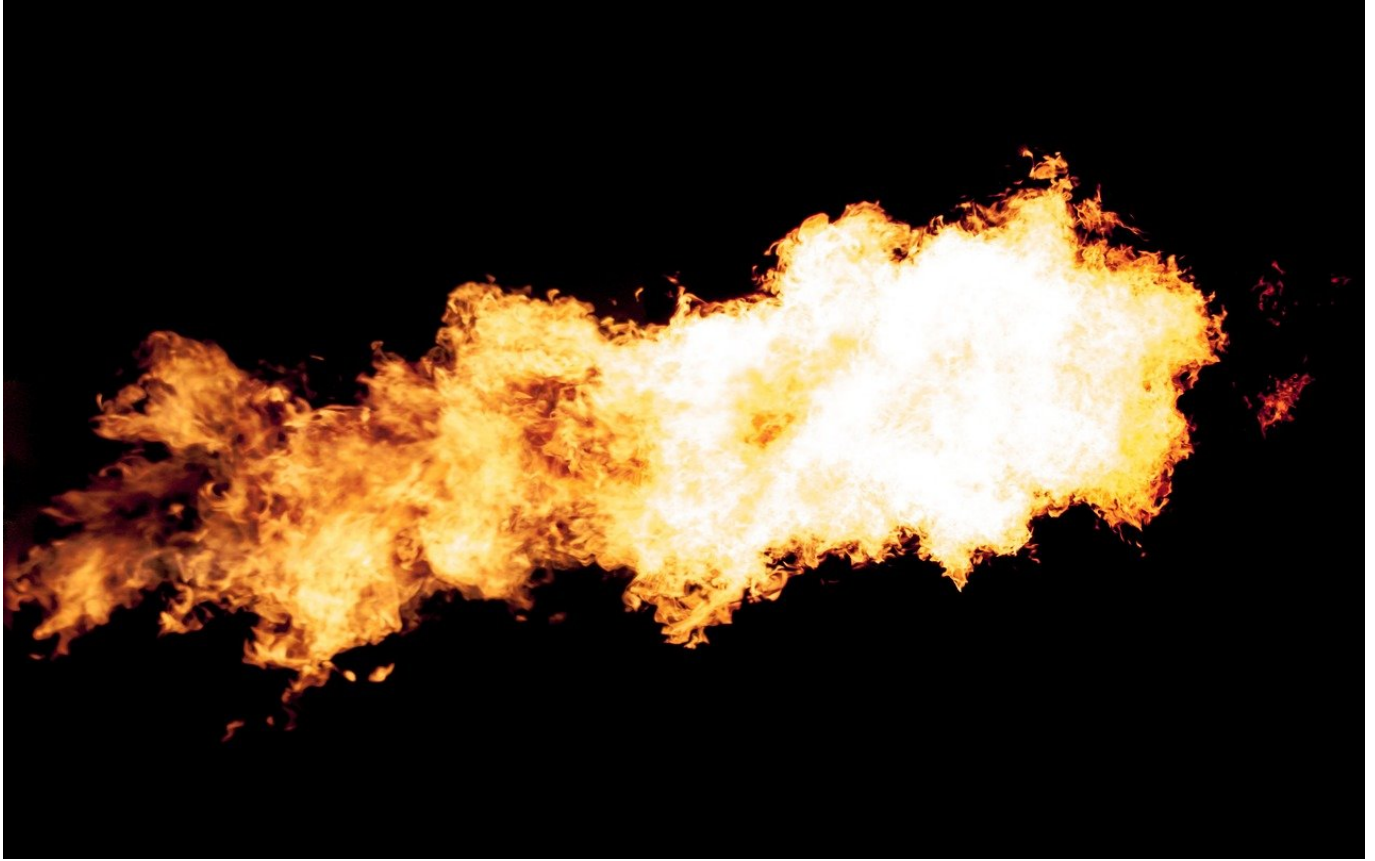
Synonyms of "Blasting" as an adjective (2 Words)

- blaring** Unpleasantly loud and penetrating.
*The **blaring** noise of trumpets.*
- ruinous** Costing far more than can be afforded.
*A **ruinous** effect on the environment.*



Usage Examples of "Blasting" as an adjective

- *Shut our ears against the blasting music from his car radio.*
- *The blasting effects of the intense cold on the budding fruit.*
- *The blasting force of the wind blowing sharp needles of sleet in our faces.*

| bomb | Make someone homeless by destroying their home with bombs. <i>They bombed the city at dawn.</i> |
| burst | Burst outward usually with noise. <i>Bursts of laughter.</i> |
| coke | Become coke. <i>Petroleum oils coke after distillation.</i> |
| combust | Cause to burn or combust. <i>We combust coal and other fossil fuels.</i> |
| detonate | Burst and release energy as through a violent chemical or physical reaction. <i>The bomb detonated at noon.</i> |

| detonation | The premature combustion of fuel in an internal combustion engine, causing pinking. <i>A series of deafening detonations was heard.</i> |
| effusion | Flow under pressure. <i>He studied the rates of effusion of gases.</i> |
| erupt | Erupt or intensify suddenly. <i>His skin erupts with hives.</i> |
| eruption | Symptom consisting of a breaking out and becoming visible. <i>The eruption of Vesuvius.</i> |
| explode | Drive from the stage by noisy disapproval. <i>His anger exploded.</i> |
| explosion | The noise caused by an explosion. <i>An explosion in the adder population.</i> |
| explosive | Likely to cause an outburst of anger or controversy. <i>Stocks of explosives.</i> |
| firework | (usually plural) a device with an explosive that burns at a low rate and with colored flames; can be used to illuminate areas or send signals etc. <i>A firework display.</i> |
| flak | Strong criticism. <i>He has been getting flak from certain quarters lately for pointing this out.</i> |
| flare | Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>She could not control her flare of rage.</i> |
| fulminate | Come on suddenly and intensely. <i>He fulminated against the Republicans plan to cut Medicare.</i> |
| grenade | A glass receptacle containing chemicals which are released when the receptacle is thrown and broken, used for testing drains and extinguishing fires. |
| gush | Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet. <i>The tanker began to gush oil from its damaged hull.</i> |
| ignite | Start or maintain a fire in. <i>He lit a cigarette which ignited the petrol fumes.</i> |
| implode | Burst inward. <i>He lost money when the market imploded.</i> |
| kindle | Cause to start burning. <i>The dried grass of the prairie kindled spreading the flames for miles.</i> |
| nebula | A galaxy. |

| ordnance | Military supplies. <i>Unexploded ordnance.</i> |
| outburst | A sudden violent disturbance. <i>A very dramatic outburst of neutrons.</i> |
| outpouring | The pouring forth of a fluid. <i>A massive outpouring of high energy gamma rays.</i> |
| pyrotechnic | (usually plural) a device with an explosive that burns at a low rate and with colored flames; can be used to illuminate areas or send signals etc. <i>Pyrotechnic keyboard virtuosity.</i> |
| pyrotechnics | The craft of making fireworks. <i>He thrilled his audience with vocal pyrotechnics.</i> |
| supernova | A star that explodes and becomes extremely luminous in the process. |
| volcano | A mountain or hill, typically conical, having a crater or vent through which lava, rock fragments, hot vapour, and gas are or have been erupted from the earth's crust. <i>Clare had been building up a silent volcano of resentment.</i> |
