Definitions of "Blatant" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “blatant” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious.*
- *(of bad behaviour) done openly and unashamedly.*
- *Completely lacking in subtlety; very obvious.*
- *Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry.*



Synonyms of "Blatant" as an adjective (19 Words)

<u>blazing</u>	Very hot. A blazing indiscretion.
clamant	Demanding attention- H.L.Mencken. <i>The proper use of biotechnology has become a clamant question.</i>
clamorous	Making a loud and confused noise. A clamorous uproar.
<u>conspicuous</u>	Attracting notice or attention. <i>Made herself conspicuous by her exhibitionistic preening.</i>
<u>evident</u>	Capable of being seen or noticed. Evident hostility.
flagrant	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. A flagrant violation of the law.
<u>glaring</u>	Giving out or reflecting a strong or dazzling light. A glaring error.
<u>manifest</u>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>Her manifest charm and proven ability.</i>
obvious	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. <i>It was an obvious remark to make.</i>
open	Open and observable not secret or hidden. <i>She was copying verses from an open Bible.</i>
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. <i>In untreated cases overt psychosis may occur.</i>
<u>palpable</u>	So intense as to be almost touched or felt. A palpable lie.
<u>patent</u>	Made and marketed under a patent proprietary. Patent ductus arteriosus.
strident	Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>Public pronouncements on the crisis became less strident.</i>
<u>transparent</u>	Transmitting heat or other radiation without distortion. <i>Fine transparent fabrics.</i>
unconcealed	Not concealed or hidden. <i>Her unconcealed hostility poisoned the atmosphere.</i>
undisguised	(of a feeling) not disguised or concealed; open. <i>She looked at him with undisguised contempt.</i>

unmistakable Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment.
The ***unmistakable*** sound of his laughter.

vociferous Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry.
A ***vociferous*** mob.

<u>apparent</u>	Clearly visible or understood; obvious. <i>The committee investigated some apparent discrepancies.</i>
barefaced	With no effort to conceal. <i>His years of working barefaced breathing down dust.</i>
<u>brazen</u>	Made of brass. <i>A brazen hussy.</i>
clamorous	Making a loud and confused noise. <i>A clamorous uproar.</i>
<u>conspicuous</u>	Obvious to the eye or mind. <i>Made herself conspicuous by her exhibitionistic preening.</i>
effrontery	Insolent or impertinent behaviour. <i>One juror had the effrontery to challenge the coroner s decision.</i>
egregious	Outstandingly bad; shocking. <i>An egregious lie.</i>
flagrant	(of an action considered wrong or immoral) conspicuously or obviously offensive. <i>Flagrant violation of human rights.</i>
<u>flaunt</u>	Display (something) ostentatiously, especially in order to provoke envy or admiration or to show defiance. <i>His behavior was an outrageous flaunt.</i>
<u>gall</u>	An animal s gall bladder. <i>The bank had the gall to demand a fee.</i>
<u>glaring</u>	Giving out or reflecting a strong or dazzling light. <i>There is a glaring omission in the data.</i>
ignorant	Discourteous or rude. <i>School leavers were ignorant about the range of job opportunities.</i>
<u>impertinent</u>	Not pertinent to a particular matter; irrelevant. <i>Mentioned several impertinent facts before finally coming to the point.</i>
impudent	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>An impudent boy given to insulting strangers.</i>
insolence	Rude and disrespectful behaviour. <i>She was sacked for insolence.</i>
<u>insolent</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>The modern world with its quick material successes and insolent belief in the boundless possibilities of progress.</i>

<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship's manifest. <i>Her manifest charm and proven ability.</i>
<u>noisy</u>	Making or given to making a lot of noise. <i>Noisy pressure groups.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Obvious errors.</i>
<u>overt</u>	Done or shown openly; plainly apparent. <i>In untreated cases overt psychosis may occur.</i>
<u>particularly</u>	To a higher degree than is usual or average. <i>A particularly gruesome attack.</i>
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>A pert slightly plump girl called Rose.</i>
<u>presumptuous</u>	(of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. <i>The duchess would not put up with presumptuous servants.</i>
proudly	With pride; in a proud manner. <i>She proudly displayed her newest creations.</i>
shameless	Feeling no shame. <i>A shameless imposter.</i>
strident	Of speech sounds produced by forcing air through a constricted passage (as 'f', 's', 'z', or 'th' in both 'thin' and 'then'). <i>Public pronouncements on the crisis became less strident.</i>
<u>unashamed</u>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An unashamed emotionalism.</i>
unrepentant	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. <i>He was unrepentant and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
uproarious	Characterized by or provoking loud noise or uproar. <i>An uproarious party.</i>
vociferous	Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>A vociferous mob.</i>
