### **Definitions of "Blatant" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “blatant” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious.*
- *(of bad behaviour) done openly and unashamedly.*
- *Completely lacking in subtlety; very obvious.*
- *Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry.*



## Synonyms of "Blatant" as an adjective (19 Words)

<b>blazing</b>	Very hot. A <b>blazing</b> indiscretion.
<b>clamant</b>	Demanding attention- H.L.Mencken. <i>The proper use of biotechnology has become a <b>clamant</b> question.</i>
<b>clamorous</b>	Making a loud and confused noise. A <b>clamorous</b> uproar.
<b>conspicuous</b>	Attracting notice or attention. <i>Made herself <b>conspicuous</b> by her exhibitionistic preening.</i>
<b>evident</b>	Capable of being seen or noticed. <b>Evident</b> hostility.
<b>flagrant</b>	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. A <b>flagrant</b> violation of the law.
<b>glaring</b>	Giving out or reflecting a strong or dazzling light. A <b>glaring</b> error.
<b>manifest</b>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>Her <b>manifest</b> charm and proven ability.</i>
<b>obvious</b>	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. <i>It was an <b>obvious</b> remark to make.</i>
<b>open</b>	Open and observable not secret or hidden. <i>She was copying verses from an <b>open</b> Bible.</i>
<b>overt</b>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. <i>In untreated cases <b>overt</b> psychosis may occur.</i>
<b>palpable</b>	So intense as to be almost touched or felt. A <b>palpable</b> lie.
<b>patent</b>	Made and marketed under a patent proprietary. <b>Patent</b> ductus arteriosus.
<b>strident</b>	Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>Public pronouncements on the crisis became less <b>strident</b>.</i>
<b>transparent</b>	Transmitting heat or other radiation without distortion. <i>Fine <b>transparent</b> fabrics.</i>
<b>unconcealed</b>	Not concealed or hidden. <i>Her <b>unconcealed</b> hostility poisoned the atmosphere.</i>
<b>undisguised</b>	(of a feeling) not disguised or concealed; open. <i>She looked at him with <b>undisguised</b> contempt.</i>

**unmistakable** Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment.  
*The **unmistakable** sound of his laughter.*

**vociferous** Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry.  
*A **vociferous** mob.*

<b>apparent</b>	Clearly visible or understood; obvious. <i>The committee investigated some <b>apparent</b> discrepancies.</i>
<b>barefaced</b>	With no effort to conceal. <i>His years of working <b>barefaced</b> breathing down dust.</i>
<b>brazen</b>	Made of brass. <i>A <b>brazen</b> hussy.</i>
<b>clamorous</b>	Making a loud and confused noise. <i>A <b>clamorous</b> uproar.</i>
<b>conspicuous</b>	Obvious to the eye or mind. <i>Made herself <b>conspicuous</b> by her exhibitionistic preening.</i>
<b>effrontery</b>	Insolent or impertinent behaviour. <i>One juror had the <b>effrontery</b> to challenge the coroner s decision.</i>
<b>egregious</b>	Outstandingly bad; shocking. <i>An <b>egregious</b> lie.</i>
<b>flagrant</b>	(of an action considered wrong or immoral) conspicuously or obviously offensive. <i><b>Flagrant</b> violation of human rights.</i>
<b>flaunt</b>	Display (something) ostentatiously, especially in order to provoke envy or admiration or to show defiance. <i>His behavior was an outrageous <b>flaunt</b>.</i>
<b>gall</b>	An animal s gall bladder. <i>The bank had the <b>gall</b> to demand a fee.</i>
<b>glaring</b>	Giving out or reflecting a strong or dazzling light. <i>There is a <b>glaring</b> omission in the data.</i>
<b>ignorant</b>	Discourteous or rude. <i>School leavers were <b>ignorant</b> about the range of job opportunities.</i>
<b>impertinent</b>	Not pertinent to a particular matter; irrelevant. <i>Mentioned several <b>impertinent</b> facts before finally coming to the point.</i>
<b>impudent</b>	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>An <b>impudent</b> boy given to insulting strangers.</i>
<b>insolence</b>	Rude and disrespectful behaviour. <i>She was sacked for <b>insolence</b>.</i>
<b>insolent</b>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>The modern world with its quick material successes and <b>insolent</b> belief in the boundless possibilities of progress.</i>

<b><u>manifest</u></b>	Record in a ship's manifest. <i>Her <b>manifest</b> charm and proven ability.</i>
<b><u>noisy</u></b>	Making or given to making a lot of noise. <i><b>Noisy</b> pressure groups.</i>
<b>obvious</b>	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i><b>Obvious</b> errors.</i>
<b><u>overt</u></b>	Done or shown openly; plainly apparent. <i>In untreated cases <b>overt</b> psychosis may occur.</i>
<b><u>particularly</u></b>	To a higher degree than is usual or average. <i>A <b>particularly</b> gruesome attack.</i>
<b>pert</b>	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>A <b>pert</b> slightly plump girl called Rose.</i>
<b><u>presumptuous</u></b>	(of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. <i>The duchess would not put up with <b>presumptuous</b> servants.</i>
<b>proudly</b>	With pride; in a proud manner. <i>She <b>proudly</b> displayed her newest creations.</i>
<b>shameless</b>	Feeling no shame. <i>A <b>shameless</b> imposter.</i>
<b>strident</b>	Of speech sounds produced by forcing air through a constricted passage (as `f', `s', `z', or `th' in both `thin' and `then). <i>Public pronouncements on the crisis became less <b>strident</b>.</i>
<b><u>unashamed</u></b>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.</i>
<b>unrepentant</b>	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. <i>He was <b>unrepentant</b> and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>
<b>uproarious</b>	Characterized by or provoking loud noise or uproar. <i>An <b>uproarious</b> party.</i>
<b>vociferous</b>	Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>A <b>vociferous</b> mob.</i>
