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<u>apparent</u>	Seeming real or true, but not necessarily so. The committee investigated some <b>apparent</b> discrepancies.
barefaced	With no effort to conceal. His years of working <b>barefaced</b> breathing down dust.
<u>brazen</u>	Harsh in sound. A <b>brazen</b> hussy.
clamorous	Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. The <b>clamorous</b> radical wing of the party.
<u>conspicuous</u>	Clearly visible. He showed <b>conspicuous</b> bravery.
effrontery	Audacious (even arrogant) behavior that you have no right to. One juror had the <b>effrontery</b> to challenge the coroner s decision.
egregious	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. <i>Egregious</i> abuses of copyright.
flagrant	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. A <b>flagrant</b> violation of the law.
<u>flaunt</u>	Display proudly; act ostentatiously or pretentiously. <i>His behavior was an outrageous <b>flaunt</b>.</i>
<u>gall</u>	A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. The trade in animal parts such as bear <b>gall</b> s.
<u>glaring</u>	Giving out or reflecting a strong or dazzling light. A <b>glaring</b> error.
ignorant	Discourteous or rude. An <b>ignorant</b> man.
<u>impertinent</u>	Improperly forward or bold. An <b>impertinent</b> question.



impudent	Marked by casual disrespect. The student was kept in for <b>impudent</b> behavior.
insolence	Rude and disrespectful behaviour. She was sacked for <b>insolence</b> .
<u>insolent</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. She hated the <b>insolent</b> tone of his voice.
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship s manifest. The buildings in Rome <b>manifest</b> a high level of architectural sophistication.
<u>noisy</u>	Accompanied by or introducing random fluctuations that obscure the real signal or data. <i>Noisy pressure groups.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. Unemployment has been the most <b>obvious</b> cost of the recession.
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. In untreated cases <b>overt</b> psychosis may occur.
<u>particularly</u>	Uniquely or characteristically. The team s defence is excellent <b>particularly</b> their two centre backs.
pert	Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. A <b>pert</b> slightly plump girl called Rose.
<u>presumptuous</u>	(of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. I hope I won t be considered <b>presumptuous</b> if I offer some advice.
proudly	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. Ray watched <b>proudly</b> from the sidelines as his son won the singles title.
shameless	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. A <b>shameless</b> imposter.
strident	Presenting a point of view, especially a controversial one, in an excessively forceful way. Public pronouncements on the crisis became less <b>strident</b> .
<u>unashamed</u>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.
unrepentant	Showing no regret for one's wrongdoings. <i>He was <b>unrepentant</b> and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>



uproarious	Uncontrollably noisy. <b>Uproarious</b> humour.
vociferous	Expressing or characterized by vehement opinions; loud and forceful. A <b>vociferous</b> mob.
