| barefaced | With no effort to conceal. <i>His years of working barefaced breathing down dust.</i> |
| brazen | Harsh in sound. <i>A brazen hussy.</i> |
| clamorous | Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>The clamorous radical wing of the party.</i> |
| conspicuous | Clearly visible. <i>He showed conspicuous bravery.</i> |
| effrontery | Audacious (even arrogant) behavior that you have no right to. <i>One juror had the effrontery to challenge the coroner s decision.</i> |
| egregious | Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. <i>Egregious abuses of copyright.</i> |
| flagrant | Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. <i>A flagrant violation of the law.</i> |
| flaunt | Display proudly; act ostentatiously or pretentiously. <i>His behavior was an outrageous flaunt.</i> |
| gall | A digestive juice secreted by the liver and stored in the gallbladder aids in the digestion of fats. <i>The trade in animal parts such as bear galls.</i> |
| glaring | Giving out or reflecting a strong or dazzling light. <i>A glaring error.</i> |
| ignorant | Discourteous or rude. <i>An ignorant man.</i> |
| impertinent | Improperly forward or bold. <i>An impertinent question.</i> |

| impudent | Marked by casual disrespect. <i>The student was kept in for impudent behavior.</i> |
| insolence | Rude and disrespectful behaviour. <i>She was sacked for insolence.</i> |
| <u>insolent</u> | Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>She hated the insolent tone of his voice.</i> |
| <u>manifest</u> | Record in a ship's manifest. <i>The buildings in Rome manifest a high level of architectural sophistication.</i> |
| <u>noisy</u> | Accompanied by or introducing random fluctuations that obscure the real signal or data. <i>Noisy pressure groups.</i> |
| obvious | Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession.</i> |
| <u>overt</u> | Open and observable; not secret or hidden. <i>In untreated cases overt psychosis may occur.</i> |
| <u>particularly</u> | Uniquely or characteristically. <i>The team's defence is excellent particularly their two centre backs.</i> |
| pert | Characterized by a lightly pert and exuberant quality. <i>A pert slightly plump girl called Rose.</i> |
| <u>presumptuous</u> | (of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate. <i>I hope I won't be considered presumptuous if I offer some advice.</i> |
| proudly | With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Ray watched proudly from the sidelines as his son won the singles title.</i> |
| shameless | (of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>A shameless imposter.</i> |
| strident | Presenting a point of view, especially a controversial one, in an excessively forceful way. <i>Public pronouncements on the crisis became less strident.</i> |
| <u>unashamed</u> | Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An unashamed emotionalism.</i> |
| unrepentant | Showing no regret for one's wrongdoings. <i>He was unrepentant and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i> |
