<b>fulgent</b>	Shining intensely. <i><b>Fulgent</b> patterns of sunlight.</i>
<b>glaring</b>	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. <i>Their <b>glaring</b> eyes.</i>
<b>glary</b>	Shining intensely.
<b>hot</b>	Very unpleasant or even dangerous. <i>Tony is very <b>hot</b> on local history.</i>
<b>intense</b>	Extremely sharp or intense. <i><b>Intense</b> desire.</i>
<b>light</b>	Having a considerable or sufficient amount of natural light not dark. <i><b>Light</b> weapons.</i>
<b>oppressive</b>	(of weather) close and sultry. <i>The day was sunless and <b>oppressive</b>.</i>
<b>parching</b>	Causing dryness through intense heat. <i>A fierce <b>parching</b> heat has set in.</i>
<b>roasting</b>	Very hot and dry. <i>A <b>roasting</b> day in London.</i>
<b>scorching</b>	Very fast. <i>The <b>scorching</b> July sun.</i>
<b>shining</b>	Brilliant or excellent at something. <i>Rows of <b>shining</b> glasses.</i>
<b>sizzling</b>	Very hot. <i>The <b>sizzling</b> summer temperatures.</i>
<b>stifling</b>	Making one feel constrained or oppressed. <i>The loft is <b>stifling</b> in summer.</i>
<b>suffocating</b>	Causing difficulty in breathing especially through lack of fresh air and presence of heat. <i>Some marriages can at times feel <b>suffocating</b>.</i>
<b>sultry</b>	Characterized by oppressive heat and humidity. <i>A <b>sultry</b> French au pair.</i>
<b>sweltering</b>	Uncomfortably hot. <i><b>Sweltering</b> athletes.</i>

**tropical** Of or relating to the tropics, or either tropic.  
*Tropical islands.*

**vivid** Having strong or striking color.  
*A vivid recollection.*

<b>ablaze</b>	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>His face all <b>ablaze</b> with excitement.</i>
<b>afire</b>	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>Forests set ablaze or <b>afire</b> by lightning.</i>
<b>aflame</b>	Keenly excited (especially sexually) or indicating excitement. <i>He was <b>aflame</b> with desire.</i>
<b>alight</b>	(of a bird) descend from the air and settle. <i>Candles <b>alight</b> on the tables.</i>
<b>bonfire</b>	A large outdoor fire that is lighted as a signal or in celebration. <i>The smell of burning leaves from a garden <b>bonfire</b>.</i>
<b>burn</b>	Damage by burning with heat fire or radiation. <i>The candles were <b>burning</b>.</i>

<b>combustion</b>	The act of burning something. <i><b>Combustion</b> grew until revolt was unavoidable.</i>
<b>conflagration</b>	An extensive fire which destroys a great deal of land or property. <i>Tinder dry conditions sparked fears of a <b>conflagration</b> in many drought devastated communities.</i>
<b>douse</b>	Lower (a sail) quickly. <i>Nothing could <b>douse</b> her sudden euphoria.</i>
<b>drench</b>	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>A worming <b>drench</b>.</i>
<b>erupt</b>	Erupt or intensify suddenly. <i>The lower incisors had <b>erupted</b>.</i>
<b>extinguish</b>	Extinguish by crushing. <i>Socialism <b>extinguished</b> these archaic customs.</i>
<b>fiery</b>	Consisting of fire or burning strongly and brightly. <i>The car was painted a <b>fiery</b> red.</i>
<b>fire</b>	Start or maintain a fire in. <i>He <b>fired</b> up the laptop to find the address of his hostel.</i>
<b>firefighter</b>	A member of a fire department who tries to extinguish fires.
<b>fireman</b>	Play in which children pretend to put out a fire.
<b>flame</b>	Be in flames or aflame. <i>Send out an unsolicited email and you could possibly receive thousands of <b>flames</b>.</i>
<b>flaming</b>	Very intense. <i>You <b>flaming</b> idiot.</i>
<b>flare</b>	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>The bonfire crackled and <b>flared</b> up.</i>
<b>glow</b>	The amount of electromagnetic radiation leaving or arriving at a point on a surface. <i>A fluorescent screen <b>glowed</b> a faint green colour.</i>
<b>igneous</b>	Produced under conditions involving intense heat. <i><b>Igneous</b> fusion is fusion by heat alone.</i>

*Marsh gases **ignited** suddenly.*
- macerate** Soften, usually by steeping in liquid, and cause to disintegrate as a result.  
*The tissue **macerated** in the water.*
- scorch** A plant disease that produces a browning or scorched appearance of plant tissues.  
*A **scorch** mark.*
- smolder** Have strong suppressed feelings.  
*A **smoldering** fire.*
- smoulder** Smoke coming from a smouldering fire.  
*The controversy **smouldered** on for several years.*
- stoke** Stir up or tend; of a fire.  
*He **stoked** up the barbecue.*
