hot	Very unpleasant or even dangerous. <i>Tony is very hot on local history.</i>
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>Intense desire.</i>
light	Having a considerable or sufficient amount of natural light not dark. <i>Light weapons.</i>
oppressive	(of weather) close and sultry. <i>The day was sunless and oppressive.</i>
parching	Causing dryness through intense heat. <i>A fierce parching heat has set in.</i>
roasting	Very hot and dry. <i>A roasting day in London.</i>
scorching	Very fast. <i>The scorching July sun.</i>
shining	Brilliant or excellent at something. <i>Rows of shining glasses.</i>
sizzling	Very hot. <i>The sizzling summer temperatures.</i>
stifling	Making one feel constrained or oppressed. <i>The loft is stifling in summer.</i>
suffocating	Causing difficulty in breathing especially through lack of fresh air and presence of heat. <i>Some marriages can at times feel suffocating.</i>
sultry	Characterized by oppressive heat and humidity. <i>A sultry French au pair.</i>
sweltering	Uncomfortably hot. <i>Sweltering athletes.</i>

afire	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>Forests set ablaze or afire by lightning.</i>
aflame	Keenly excited (especially sexually) or indicating excitement. <i>He was aflame with desire.</i>
alight	(of a bird) descend from the air and settle. <i>Candles alight on the tables.</i>
bonfire	A large outdoor fire that is lighted as a signal or in celebration. <i>The smell of burning leaves from a garden bonfire.</i>
burn	Damage by burning with heat fire or radiation. <i>The candles were burning.</i>

burning	The act of burning something. <i>The burning question of independence.</i>
combust	Undergo combustion. <i>We combust coal and other fossil fuels.</i>
combustible	A combustible substance. <i>A volatile and combustible personality.</i>
combustion	The act of burning something. <i>Combustion grew until revolt was unavoidable.</i>
conflagration	An extensive fire which destroys a great deal of land or property. <i>Tinder dry conditions sparked fears of a conflagration in many drought devastated communities.</i>
douse	Lower (a sail) quickly. <i>Nothing could douse her sudden euphoria.</i>
drench	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>A worming drench.</i>
erupt	Erupt or intensify suddenly. <i>The lower incisors had erupted.</i>
extinguish	Extinguish by crushing. <i>Socialism extinguished these archaic customs.</i>
fiery	Consisting of fire or burning strongly and brightly. <i>The car was painted a fiery red.</i>
fire	Start or maintain a fire in. <i>He fired up the laptop to find the address of his hostel.</i>
firefighter	A member of a fire department who tries to extinguish fires.
fireman	Play in which children pretend to put out a fire.
flame	Be in flames or aflame. <i>Send out an unsolicited email and you could possibly receive thousands of flames.</i>
flaming	Very intense. <i>You flaming idiot.</i>
flare	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>The bonfire crackled and flared up.</i>
glow	The amount of electromagnetic radiation leaving or arriving at a point on a surface. <i>A fluorescent screen glowed a faint green colour.</i>
igneous	Produced under conditions involving intense heat. <i>Igneous fusion is fusion by heat alone.</i>

- ignite** Arouse or excite feelings and passions.

- macerate** Soften, usually by steeping in liquid, and cause to disintegrate as a result.
*The tissue **macerated** in the water.*
- scorch** A plant disease that produces a browning or scorched appearance of plant tissues.
*A **scorch** mark.*
- smolder** Have strong suppressed feelings.
*A **smoldering** fire.*
- smoulder** Smoke coming from a smouldering fire.
*The controversy **smouldered** on for several years.*
- stoke** Stir up or tend; of a fire.
*He **stoked** up the barbecue.*
