<b>go pale</b>	Be sounded, played, or expressed.

<b>go white</b>	Progress by being changed.
<b>grow pale</b>	Grow emotionally or mature.
<b>grow pallid</b>	Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes).
<b>grow white</b>	Grow emotionally or mature.
<b>lighten</b>	Make more cheerful through the use of color. <i>The room <b>lightened</b> up.</i>

<b>lose its colour</b>	Fail to keep or to maintain; cease to have, either physically or in an abstract sense.
<b>make pale</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages.
<b>make pallid</b>	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
<b>make white</b>	Change from one form into another.
<b>pale</b>	Become pale in one's face from shock or fear. <i>All else <b>pales</b> by comparison.</i>
<b>peroxide</b>	Bleach with peroxide. <i>A face framed in <b>peroxidized</b> curls.</i>
<b>turn pale</b>	To break and turn over earth especially with a plow.
<b>turn pallid</b>	Undergo a change or development.
<b>turn white</b>	Change to the contrary.
<b>wash out</b>	To cleanse (itself or another animal) by licking.
<b>whiten</b>	Make or become white. <i>Snow <b>whitened</b> the mountain tops.</i>

<b>bromine</b>	The chemical element of atomic number 35, a dark red fuming toxic liquid with a choking, irritating smell. It is a member of the halogen group and occurs chiefly in the form of salts in seawater and brines.
<b>cesium</b>	A soft silver-white ductile metallic element (liquid at normal temperatures); the most electropositive and alkaline metal.
<b>chlorine</b>	The chemical element of atomic number 17, a toxic, irritant, pale green gas.
<b>clean</b>	Clean and tidy up the house. <i><b>Clean</b> your teeth properly after meals.</i>
<b>cleanly</b>	In a manner that minimizes dirt and pollution. <i>She played the piano accompaniment <b>cleanly</b>.</i>
<b>cleanse</b>	Clean one's body or parts thereof, as by washing. <i>This preparation will <b>cleanse</b> and tighten the skin.</i>
<b>clothing</b>	Clothes collectively. <i>Bring warm <b>clothing</b> and waterproofs.</i>
<b>detergent</b>	Any additive with a similar action to a detergent e.g. an oil soluble substance which holds dirt in suspension in lubricating oil. <i>Packets of <b>detergent</b>.</i>
<b>detoxify</b>	Remove poison from. <i><b>Detoxify</b> the soil.</i>
<b>dioxide</b>	An oxide containing two atoms of oxygen in the molecule.
<b>disinfection</b>	The process of cleaning something, especially with a chemical, in order to destroy bacteria. <i>Instruments must undergo high level <b>disinfection</b> before reuse.</i>
<b>fabric</b>	The walls, floor, and roof of a building. <i>The <b>fabric</b> in the curtains was light and semitransparent.</i>
<b>hydrogen</b>	A colourless, odourless, highly flammable gas, the chemical element of atomic number 1.
<b>iodine</b>	A tincture consisting of a solution of iodine in ethyl alcohol applied topically to wounds as an antiseptic.
<b>laundry</b>	A room in a house, hotel, or institution where clothes and linen can be washed and ironed. <i>Piles of <b>laundry</b>.</i>
<b>liquid</b>	Existing as or having characteristics of a liquid especially tending to flow. <i>Eyes shining with a <b>liquid</b> luster.</i>
<b>napkin</b>	A baby's nappy. <i>She unfolded her <b>napkin</b> and put it on her lap.</i>

<b>rinse</b>	Rinse one's mouth and throat with mouthwash. <i>Rose <b>rinsed</b> out a tumbler.</i>
<b>sanctify</b>	Make legitimate or binding by a religious ceremony. <i>A small shrine was built to <b>sanctify</b> the site.</i>
<b>sanitation</b>	Making something sanitary (free of germs) as by sterilizing. <i>They could afford to erect new dwellings with a reasonable standard of construction and <b>sanitation</b>.</i>
<b>shampoo</b>	Wash something in or out of the hair using shampoo. <i>A <b>shampoo</b> and set.</i>
<b>shower</b>	Wash oneself in a shower. <i>She had a nice refreshing <b>shower</b>.</i>
<b>soap</b>	Wash with soap. <i>The <b>soaps</b> are top of the ratings.</i>
<b>towel</b>	Wipe with a towel. <i>A bath <b>towel</b>.</i>
<b>wash</b>	The erosive process of washing away soil or gravel by water as from a roadway. <i>She hung out her Tuesday <b>wash</b>.</i>
<b>washing</b>	The action of washing oneself or laundering clothes bed linen etc. <i>Her arms were red to the elbow from doing other people's <b>washing</b>.</i>
