- *Cause (a material such as cloth, paper, or hair) to become white or much lighter by a chemical process or by exposure to sunlight.*
- *Remove color from.*
- *Make whiter or lighter.*

grow pale	Grow emotionally or mature.
grow pallid	Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes).
grow white	Grow emotionally or mature.
lighten	Make more cheerful through the use of color. <i>The room lightened up.</i>

lose its colour	Fail to keep or to maintain; cease to have, either physically or in an abstract sense.
make pale	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages.
make pallid	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
make white	Change from one form into another.
pale	Become pale in one's face from shock or fear. <i>All else pales by comparison.</i>
peroxide	Bleach with peroxide. <i>A face framed in peroxidized curls.</i>
turn pale	To break and turn over earth especially with a plow.
turn pallid	Undergo a change or development.
turn white	Change to the contrary.
wash out	To cleanse (itself or another animal) by licking.
whiten	Make or become white. <i>Snow whitened the mountain tops.</i>

bromine	The chemical element of atomic number 35, a dark red fuming toxic liquid with a choking, irritating smell. It is a member of the halogen group and occurs chiefly in the form of salts in seawater and brines.
cesium	A soft silver-white ductile metallic element (liquid at normal temperatures); the most electropositive and alkaline metal.
chlorine	The chemical element of atomic number 17, a toxic, irritant, pale green gas.
clean	Clean and tidy up the house. <i>Clean your teeth properly after meals.</i>
cleanly	In a manner that minimizes dirt and pollution. <i>She played the piano accompaniment cleanly.</i>
cleanse	Clean one's body or parts thereof, as by washing. <i>This preparation will cleanse and tighten the skin.</i>
clothing	Clothes collectively. <i>Bring warm clothing and waterproofs.</i>
detergent	Any additive with a similar action to a detergent e.g. an oil soluble substance which holds dirt in suspension in lubricating oil. <i>Packets of detergent.</i>
detoxify	Remove poison from. <i>Detoxify the soil.</i>
dioxide	An oxide containing two atoms of oxygen in the molecule.
disinfection	The process of cleaning something, especially with a chemical, in order to destroy bacteria. <i>Instruments must undergo high level disinfection before reuse.</i>
fabric	The walls, floor, and roof of a building. <i>The fabric in the curtains was light and semitransparent.</i>
hydrogen	A colourless, odourless, highly flammable gas, the chemical element of atomic number 1.
iodine	A tincture consisting of a solution of iodine in ethyl alcohol applied topically to wounds as an antiseptic.
laundry	A room in a house, hotel, or institution where clothes and linen can be washed and ironed. <i>Piles of laundry.</i>
liquid	Existing as or having characteristics of a liquid especially tending to flow. <i>Eyes shining with a liquid luster.</i>
napkin	A baby's nappy. <i>She unfolded her napkin and put it on her lap.</i>

rinse	Rinse one's mouth and throat with mouthwash. <i>Rose rinsed out a tumbler.</i>
sanctify	Make legitimate or binding by a religious ceremony. <i>A small shrine was built to sanctify the site.</i>
sanitation	Making something sanitary (free of germs) as by sterilizing. <i>They could afford to erect new dwellings with a reasonable standard of construction and sanitation.</i>
shampoo	Wash something in or out of the hair using shampoo. <i>A shampoo and set.</i>
shower	Wash oneself in a shower. <i>She had a nice refreshing shower.</i>
soap	Wash with soap. <i>The soaps are top of the ratings.</i>
towel	Wipe with a towel. <i>A bath towel.</i>
wash	The erosive process of washing away soil or gravel by water as from a roadway. <i>She hung out her Tuesday wash.</i>
washing	The action of washing oneself or laundering clothes bed linen etc. <i>Her arms were red to the elbow from doing other people's washing.</i>
